Principal's News Improvements to the Literacy Program

Reading will occur at the same time of day across grades 1-5 next year. This will allow every student access to the level of reading he or she needs without being constrained by grade. **Developmental Reading Assessments** (DRAs) or STAR 360 assessments will be administered routinely to determine if a reader is ready for the next level, allowing students to move ahead more guickly if they are ready. These assessments will also help us to identify when more intensive reading support is needed. Teachers will be working on structuring this new format through the end of the year and into summer.

Every grade, up through the Middle School, will also have a dedicated time for writing and we will be completing work on the writing curriculum in June.

A more comprehensive description of our literacy program will be sent to parents in June, once teachers have had time to work through the details and the schedule is in place.

The Importance of Phonics and Cursive Handwriting

Although our reading program is robust and our students are strong readers, phonics is an area that we feel we need to strengthen. Phonics has a direct impact on spelling and on decoding in reading. All of our K-3 teachers will be undergoing Orton Gillingham training; this is a multi-sensory approach to teaching language that includes all the senses and taps into the learning styles of each student. Cailey Jerome and Megan Gould have already attended an intensive workshop and have been using what they learned in class. They are very encouraged by the results! Cursive handwriting is often thought of as a dying art these days, but there is solid research that indicates that handwriting improves learning.

The bottom line is cursive handwriting will remain a mainstay in the St Patrick curriculum and will be required in the upper grades beyond grade 4.

STAR 360 Testing

This week will begin a series of adaptive computerized assessments in reading and math for all grades. These assessments are much less time-consuming and less invasive to classroom instruction than the Terra Novas and will give the teachers immediate real-time data about the progress of each student in these areas. The assessments provide detailed information concerning students who need additional support or more challenge. We will also use this information to inform curriculum and instruction decisions.

Curriculum Mapping

The teachers have been documenting the content that they teach, the activities assigned, and the assessments given in each subject each month. This is called curriculum mapping and it creates a broad and, at the same time, in-depth picture of the academic program at St Patrick School. Following the last day of school for your children, the teachers will spend two intensive days looking at these maps, and at the assessment data from STAR 360, the Developmental Reading Assessments, The Readistep exam taken by the 8th graders, and other sources of information. As a faculty, the teachers will identify the gaps and overlaps in the curriculum, and its strengths and weaknesses. Adjustments, overhauls, and, where necessary, new material will be added to create a challenging and rigorous academic program in which we can all take pride.

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Math Curriculum Overhaul

An in-depth analysis of the reading program has been taking place this academic year, and the work on the reading curriculum is well underway. The focus in June will turn to the math program. By looking at the content, skills, and knowledge our graduating 8th graders must have to be successful at the honors level in high school math, the teachers will redesign the math curriculum, starting at 8th grade and working backward down through the grades.

A Year of FAITH

The theme for next year will be a Year of Faith. Every month, the school population will examine, discuss and model a different virtue of faith and work to make that virtue part of their daily lives. I will be sending out this week, via email, a letter explaining the Virtues program which we are implementing school-wide. It is my hope that by intentionally focusing on the virtues; as part of morning meeting, in the classroom and in the daily rhythm of the school, we can strengthen the Catholic culture of the school and its community.

In a couple of weeks, the new St Patrick School website will premiere. I want to thank all the parents and faculty who responded to my request for suggestions for their input. Your ideas helped to craft a website that is useful and flexible. Right now, the timeline for the new website to go online is April vacation.
