

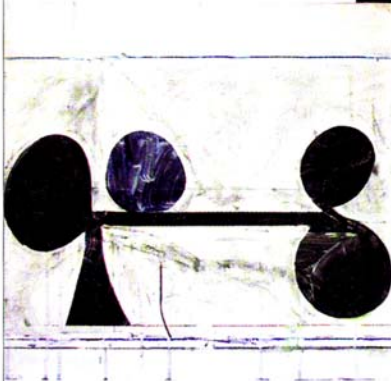


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Dallas Hosts Its First Art Fair

In years past, if you were a lover or collector of modern and contemporary art and lived in Dallas, attending a world-class art fair generally meant a trip to New York or perhaps Miami. This February 6 through 8 that's all changing, with the inaugural Dallas Art Fair. More than 25 of the country's top dealers (Pace Prints, James Kelly Contemporary and Rhona Hoffman Gallery among them) are participating, exhibiting paintings, sculpture and works on paper by some of the legendary names in postwar art as well as pieces by emerging



talents. The show will be held at the Fashion Industry Gallery, just across the street from the Dallas Museum of Art, in the newly thriving Arts District. Special events are planned to complement it, including an opening gala, symposia and tours. For the city's residents—and art lovers throughout the United States—the fair promises to become an institution.
