DENOMINATIONAL UPDATE

General Assembly (GA), which is our yearly national convention, is going to be in Columbus OH in 2016, from June 22-26th. From the UUA website: "The theme for GA 2016 will be "Heart Land: Where Faiths Connect". The faith world is increasingly multifaith. People are crossing borders of religion and spiritual practice to create wholeness in their lives individually and collectively. The labels— Christian, Jew, Muslim, Buddhist, Hindu, theist and non-theist—no longer define who or what we love, or how spirit moves in our lives."

This theme is particularly poignant given the increasingly ramped up exclusionary rhetoric in recent weeks and months. Registration begins in March. Be thinking about whether you are interested in attending, either in person or online. While I would love to go to Ohio (the last time GA will be this close for a while), the timing is prohibitive for me. I am hoping to set up several events to be able to view some of the major content at UUCR and invite people to join me. As more information is available about the programs, I will reach out to gauge interest.

Metro NY District to Central East Region?

Over the last couple years, there has been a move toward having a Central East Region, which includes the Metro NY district along with Ohio Meadville (parts of Ohio, WV and western PA), St. Lawrence (upstate NY), and Joseph Priestley (southern NJ, western PA, Maryland, Delaware and DC).
