DREAMING THE POSSIBLE

The promise of the New Year is that we will be able to start over. This dream of a new beginning has persisted among many different peoples on the Earth for as long as we can remember. In spite of it all, we are a hopeful species. How many times have you been born again?

Much as I wish for a clean slate, my New Year comes full of unfinished business: evergreen needles scattered across the living room rug, still-to-be-answered cards piled on the desk, leftover cake in the fridge. Each child who is born is a holy child, one more redeemer. We've never done it that way, and we're willing to give it a try. All things are possible.
