Now both are preparing to share a year of learning with all of you! Religious Education Sunday will be held on Sunday, June 11th. The service will include a look back on adventures in world religions and famous UU's that our classes embarked on this past year. We will also honor and recognize all those who guided and accompanied our children in the classrooms and beyond. Our service will be followed by an end-of-year picnic, before heading over to the Pride Festival in Nyack.

On June 18th, we will celebrate a Multigenerational Flower Communion with Rev. Dawn Sangrey. This service will also include a bridging ceremony for Basil Bennett-Levy, who is graduating high school and heading to college in the fall. Summer services begin on June 25th; childcare will be provided in the nursery. Older children are encouraged to attend the services and may bring a book or quiet activity.

As we prepare for next year, we have many things to look forward to! There will be an Our Whole Lives meeting on Sunday, June 4th at 1 PM for parents of middle and high school youth to learn about the UUA's sexuality education program, an essential part of faith formation. UUCR will offer the OWL program for youth in grades 7-9 on Sunday afternoons (about 1 per month) according to registered families' schedules. We also hope to offer a shorter program of OWL for youth in grades 10-12. Both programs are open to non-UU's so please spread the word. There is a \$100 registration fee for non-members.

Sign-up sheets for next year's teaching, assisting, and youth advising teams will be available in the worship room in June. Our classes will be focusing
