HOW TO GET IN TOUCH WITH REV. DAWN AND WHY YOU MIGHT WANT TO

Every Wednesday afternoon from 3 until 6, I come to my office at UUCR to keep my weekly office hours. I'm available to meet with any member who wants to get together with me during this time. Occasionally I spend part of my office hours visiting a member at home or in the hospital, so if you want to be sure I'll be at the church, it's a good idea to let me know ahead of time.

You can call me at home (845-419-5323) or leave a message for me at the church office (845-354-1789) or send me an e-mail (<u>dawnsangrey@gmail.com</u>). In addition to these hours at the office, I'm available between 9 AM and 9 PM on e-mail and by phone for church business and pastoral care six days a week. Thursday is my day off. In an emergency, you can contact me anytime.

During my office hours, I usually spend some time with Mary Holdampf, the congregation's administrator. We put the finishing touches on the order of service for Sunday if it's one of the Sundays I'm preaching, and we check in with each other about whatever the congregation might need. Sometimes people just come by, and we visit.

As many of you know, I am a part-time consulting minister with a year-to-year contract. Recently Diane Bennett, chair of the Board of Trustees (BOT), and I signed this year's contract, which includes a "memorandum of anticipated duties" for the minister.

First on the duties list is preparing and conducting two Sunday services a month, and second is working with the BOT and Board of Worship (BOW). The third item asks me to "provide pastoral care…hold scheduled office hours… and be available by telephone and e-mail for consultation on UUCR business or with members seeking counsel or support."

Pastoral care includes everything from visiting someone in the hospital to sitting with a member in the office and chewing over something in their personal life that's bothering them. I'm not a therapist, but I can help you find one. All conversations with the minister are confidential, and you can be sure that I won't talk about our meeting with anyone else unless I have your permission.

The BOT has engaged me to be your minister so that I can help care for the people in the congregation. I share this responsibility with lay pastoral caregivers, members of the congregation who also provide support for those in need.

I look forward to seeing you this year at the Sunday service and perhaps during my office hours. We might even go out for lunch.
