He said the kind of institution you create reveals your beliefs. Let's explore the family as a metaphor for UUCR and ask how this idea shapes the congregation today.

By now you will have received a copy of the UUCR Mission proposal, which can also be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

The Mission proposal is the result of much hard work this fall by the congregation, first in your all-congregation retreat, where the basic concepts were gathered together in large and small-group discussions over two days. After the retreat, a special Task Force appointed by the Board of Trustees worked with the notes sent by our facilitator to refine and focus the mission.

One member of the Task Force said reading the final product moved him to tears. As you read the Mission for the first time, what emotions did it evoke in you? Which parts resonate with you the most, and what does that tell you about your work in the congregation? Is it nurturing our congregation and our faith? Speaking up for justice? Taking action in solidarity with others in the community? All of these aspects of your mission are essential to what UUCR does now. These ideas can also help shape your plans for the congregation's future.

The Board of Trustees has called a special congregational meeting on Sunday, December 9, at noon for a congregational vote to adopt the new Mission. Please join us for this important celebration.

The winter holidays are upon us with all their potential for joy and aggravation, pleasure and pain, delight and disappointment. How was Thanksgiving? Whenever we gather with family and friends, our hopes rise. Being with those we love can nourish us in our deepest places. And then the culture ratchets up our expectations, urging us to want more and more.
