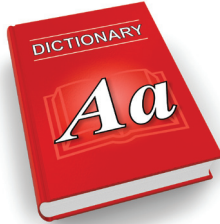

An aphorism is a brief statement of principle or a simple statement of truth. Years ago, aphorisms were used by grownups to teach children about life. They were also helpful in developing values and instilling common sense in youngsters. People felt that if children learned the lessons contained in aphorisms, there was a good possibility they would develop wisdom as a result.

These principles or statements were usually referred to simply as “old sayings.” People learned aphorisms as children, usually from parents and grandparents. Later on, when these children became parents themselves, they used the same aphorisms to teach their own children. Eventually, their children passed them on yet again.

Today, most children have never heard of aphorisms. And yet, the lessons learned and wisdom acquired through aphorisms continue to be valuable. It's my hope that the stories will help keep these wonderful old sayings a part of our daily lives.
