


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Dear Parishioners,

That is the essence and message of Christmas that God cared enough to send His very best into a world in need of a Savior. His beloved Son comes to announce the Good News of God's transformative love for the world yes, but also for each of us who choose to imitate His humility and compassion.

Let us not lose the meaning of Christmas nor store it away till next Christmas. Embrace the truth and the power of Christ's birth for it changed the course of human history and can very well change our own personal history too.

THEOPHANY: WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?




On January 6, as well as the Eve of Theophany on the 5th, Orthodox faithful attend a Divine Liturgy and the Great Blessing of the Water service to celebrate Theophany, also called Ton Photon ("Feast of Lights"), referring to the spiritual illumination of the Holy Spirit. The service commemorates the baptism of Christ and the manifestation of God in three persons. Large numbers of people attend church to be blessed and receive holy water, which they take home in small bottles provided by the church. Some parishioners bring their own bottles often made specifically for holy water. In most churches, the blessing is held indoors, and the water is contained in a large urn. Some communities hold outdoor celebrations by a body of water. In the end, through Theophany, we can participate in His baptismand invite the holy, rejuvenating waters of the Jordan into our homes and hearts.

St. Spyridon - Commemorated on December 12



Spyridon was born in Cyprus. He worked as a shepherd and was known for his great piety. He married and had one daughter, Irene. Upon the death of his wife, Spyridon entered a monastery, and their daughter, a convent. Spyridon eventually became Bishop of Trimythous, in the district of Larnaca. He took part in the First Ecumenical Council of Nicaea (325), where he was instrumental in

countering the theological arguments of Arius and his followers. He converted a pagan philosopher to Christianity by using a piece of pottery to illustrate how one single entity could be composed of three unique entities (fire, water, and clay); a metaphor for the Christian doctrine of the Trinity. As soon as Spyridon finished speaking, the shard miraculously burst into flame, water dripped on the ground, and only dust remained in his hand. After the council, St. Spyridon returned to his diocese in Tremithous. He later fell into disfavor during the persecutions of Emperor Maximinus, but died peacefully in old age. His incorrupt relics may be found on the island of Corfu today.


THE CHRISTMAS FAST

November 15 marks the beginning of the Christmas Fast according to our Orthodox Tradition. Orthodox Christians the world over prepare themselves through prayer and fasting to receive the Savior of all mankind, our Lord Jesus Christ. The spirit of this holy period of preparation is revealed through the epistle and gospel lessons of the day. Orthodox faithful throughout the world are reminded:

"build up your strength in union with the Lord and by means of His mighty power. Put on all the armor that God gives you, so that you will be able to stand up against the Devil's evil tricks. For we are not fighting against human beings but against the wicked spiritual forces in the heavenly world, the rulers, the authorities and cosmic powers of the dark age. So, put on God's armor now! Then when the evil day comes, you will be able to resist the enemy's attack, and after fighting to the end, you will still hold your ground. So, stand ready, with

truth as a belt tight around your waist, with righteousness as your breastplate, and as your shoes the readiness to announce the Good News of peace. At all times carry faith as a shield; for with it you will be able to put out all the burning arrows shot by the Evil One. And accept salvation as a helmet and the Word of God as the sword which the spirit gives you." ~Ephesians 6:10-17

As we approach the glorious birth of our beloved Savior, Jesus, let each of us, in their own way, be well-pleasing to God and have a good conscience. Rid of the evils such as anger, malice, slander, hate, blasphemy, vanity, gossip etc. All of these and more are poison and always distort truth. The word "diavolos" means the one that distorts truth. On behalf of the members of the Holy Eparchial Synod of our Holy Archdiocese I am writing to you concerning the progress in the rebuilding of the Saint Nicholas Church at Ground Zero in New York City. As you have heard and read, construction is proceeding on the beautiful Naos that will be a national shrine and a place of prayer, remembrance, and hope. From the ashes of destruction is rising an edifice for the communion of God and humanity. From the remnants of a violent act of hatred comes a holy place that affirms the power of love and faith.

The National Shrine will also be a vibrant and beautiful witness of Orthodox Christianity and our Hellenic heritage. Inspired by the architecture of Hagia Sophia and the Church of our Savior in Chora, built with marble from the same vein in Greece used for the Parthenon, and incorporating very modern elements and features, the Shrine will engage the attention of the millions of visitors to Ground Zero. The church will invite all of their senses to encounter a faith and tradition that connects human and divine, celebrates life and goodness, and shows the path to salvation and eternal peace.

The Saint Nicholas National Shrine will also be a witness to this nation and to the world of the power of faith and love in response to great tragedy and loss. In the aftermath of a horrific and evil act, Ground Zero became a place of sacrifice and compassion. To complete this sacred task for the glory of God and this powerful witness, your support is needed. We give thanks to Almighty God for the many benefactors who have contributed generously and for the gifts both large and small that have been offered in faith and love. As you give prayerfully and for His glory, may we follow the example of our Holy Father among the Saints, Nicholas the Wonderworker, who gave everything for the spiritual riches and blessings from above, gifts of God that will last for eternity. My brothers and sisters in the household of God,

The Holy Eparchial Synod of the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of America is overseeing the rebuilding of the Saint Nicholas Church which was destroyed in the terrorist attack of September 11, 2001.

The new Saint Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church at Ground Zero will be far more that a rebuilt parish. It will be a National Shrine of our Holy Archdiocese. It is destined to be a place of pilgrimage for our Nation and the whole world. In the next ten years, it is estimated that more than fifty million people will see this National Shrine of our Church. It represents a living embodiment of our Greek Orthodox Christian faith.

Every Priest and Parish Council are encouraged to invite their fellow Parishioners, to make a one year commitment of \$100 or more to raise the necessary funds to assist with the rebuilding of this National Shrine by 2016.
