Fr. Nick's Message

Dear Parishioners, Christos Anesti!

How quickly Pascha arrived this year bringing with it a longer spring season that we have not experienced in a long time. June 4th we will celebrate another important event, Pentecost. What does Pentecost mean to us and why should we celebrate it? What does scripture say about this and why is the Holy Spirit so intricately woven into this Feast Day? Here are some important facts to keep in mind about Pentecost.

Pentecost was determined by counting the fifty days after Passover. "And you shall count from the morrow after the Sabbath... seven full weeks" (Lev. 23:15). For the Jews, the harvest theme was the predominant element in this feast. For the Christians, however, the harvest feast does not enter the observance. According to the Acts of the Apostles (2:1), the Holy Spirit was given to the new church on the very day of Pentecost.

Today, Pentecost also celebrates the truth that the Holy Spirit is now living in the Church. He is now actively shaping the whole humanity into the Kingdom of God. St. Paul tells us in his Letter to the Romans, "... the Spirit comes to the aid of our weakness. We do not even know how we ought to pray, but through our inarticulate groans, the Spirit himself is pleading for us and God who searches our inmost being knows what the Spirit means because He pleads for God's people in God's own way and in everything, as we know, He cooperates for good with those who love God and are called according to His purpose" (Rom. 8:26-28).

It is the Spirit that gives life. The Spirit of Jesus sent into our hearts that allows us to know His presence. "...you know Him because He is with you, He is in you" (Jn. 14:17). With the help of the Spirit, we realize we are God's beloved children, that God loves us. "The proof that you are sons is that God has sent the Spirit of His Son into our hearts: the Spirit that cries, 'Abba, Father,' and is this that makes you a son. You are not a slave any more; and if God has made you son, then he has made you heir" (Gal. 4: 6-7).

I hope we will celebrate this important day together this year on Sunday, June 4th. May the Holy Spirit guide, protect, be and inspire us all to live as true sons and daughters cognizant of the Spirit that dwells within us.

THE DESCENT OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

This unique icon for the feast of Pentecost has traditional elements that teach the spiritual structure of the Christian church. Against the background of a temple, itself made around the huge central dome, the Apostles are depicted in a circular form giving the impression of unity.

But if the icon is a representation of the Church, then it must have more than Apostles depicted. And this is the case. Among the twelve, are a number who were not of the original Twelve. There is St. Paul and there are the Evangelists, Luke and Mark (who hold Gospels). The Apostles bear scrolls for they are essentially teachers of the Good News.



The Acts, describing the historic Descent of the Spirit, speaks of the multitude present on that occasion. Ancient icons did, in fact, depict multitudes in the lower central portion of the icon. This has been replaced by strange symbolic figure of a king. The man is in a dark place for the world before Christ was without faith; he is depicted aged for the sin of Adam has aged him; the crown signifies sin, which ruled the world; the cloth he holds, with the twelve scrolls, signifies the Twelve Apostles who brought light to the world through their proclamation of the news of Jesus Christ.

Because Pentecost was the baptism of the Church by fire, we see the rays and tongues of fire descending upon the gathered group. And so we have, finally, the fulfillment of the revelation of the Holy Trinity: the Father as Creator, the Son as Savior, and now the Holy Spirit, come as Comforter, as Sanctifier, as Indweller of the Church.

ASCENSION OF OUR LORD- MAY 25

The story of the Ascension of our Lord, celebrated as one of the Twelve Great Feasts of the Church, is found in the book of the Acts of the Apostles 1:3-11. It is also mentioned in the Gospels of Mark (16:19) and Luke (24:50-53). The moment of the Ascension is told in one sentence: "He was lifted up before their eyes in a cloud which took Him from their sight" (Acts 1:9).

Christ made His last appearance on earth, forty days after His Resurrection from the dead. The Acts of the Apostles states that the disciples were in Jerusalem. Jesus appeared before them and commanded them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the "Promise of the Father". He stated, "You shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now" (Acts 1:5).

After Jesus gave these instructions, He led the disciples to the Mount of Olives. Here, He commissioned them to be His witnesses "in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth" (Acts 1:8). It is also at this time that the disciples were directed by Christ to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19). Jesus also told them that He would be with them always, "even to the end of the world" (Matthew 28:20).

As the disciples watched, Jesus lifted up His hands, blessed them, and then was taken up out of their sight (Luke 24:51; Acts 1:9). Two angels appeared to them and asked them why they were gazing into heaven. Then one of the angels said, "This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as you have seen Him going into heaven" (Acts 1:11).

STEWARDSHIP

Sixty minutes is the time we spend watching some genuinely good, interesting and educational programs on TV. Sixty minutes is the time we spend watching one half or one third of a football or baseball game on TV. Sixty minutes is the time we spend watching our favorite detective, comedy, drama, or variety show.

Sixty minutes is the time some spend commuting to and from work. It's less than the time we take to go shopping for something we really need or want.

Sixty minutes is less than the time it takes us to read a good book. Sixty minutes is more than the time most of us take (in one day, in one week, in one month, in one year?) to read the Holy Bible. Sixty minutes is the time it takes to write a letter to the editor or write a lengthy comment on an internet article about something which concerns us. Sixty minutes is the time we spend being mad and frustrated about something which concerns us but about which we do nothing except get mad and frustrated.

Sixty minutes is the time it takes to visit a sick or shut-in friend or acquaintance. Sixty minutes of peace and quiet in the form of silent prayer and meditation each week provide strength, guidance, insights and a measure of peace. Sixty minutes spent doing something for someone else helps us feel like a million dollars.

Sixty minutes is a long, long time for a hungry child awaiting dinner. Sixty minutes is a short, short time in the years of life. And yet, we only have so many periods of sixty minutes allotted to each of us. So our use of them becomes in question language a question of stewardship.

Sixty minutes worth of income, one fortieth of one's average weekly income, is more than many people give to the church with which they are associated with. Sixty minutes worth of time each week is more than most people give to the congregation of which they are members.

Imagine what could be done if everyone gave at least sixty minutes of weekly income and sixty minutes time out of the weeks 10,080 minutes to the church that they belong to.

GREEK FESTIVAL

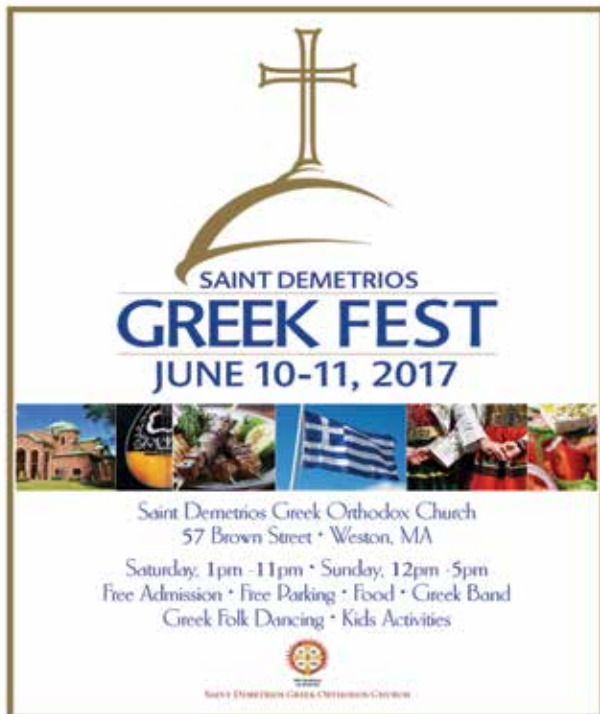


It's festival time again! This year a 2 day event and twice the opportunity to make new friends and work with old ones to showcase our amazing community. Your participation is essential to our success.
