Christ: The True Light

Dear Parishioners,

The days have grown shorter and the chill in the air, it seems, is here to stay for awhile in New England. December and January are especially stark and dreary months. But, then there is Christmas- the birth of our Lord- followed by Theophany and the feast of lights revealing God in all His Glory. Perhaps the decorations of our homes inside and out, dressed with lights, wreaths, candles, and colorful ornaments reveal the deeper truth and reality of God's illuminating presence in the world.

While our attention is on the tangible gifts and our emphasis on the natural external world, Christmas- the Birth of Christ- comes to remind us of the eternal inner life that God also occupies. While we hear much about God's creation and the beauty of nature, there is a danger of worshiping His creation and not Him the Creator.

The main hymn of Christmas emphasizes that Christ's birth brings with it God's plan to reconcile humanity and transform the world. "Your Nativity O Christ our God, has shone to the world the light of wisdom..." It is Christ- God's Son- that is light and wisdom that is at the heart of this glorious season! It is His message of love that provides every answer to every question that a broken world needs to heal our wounds and bridge our differences. As we are reminded in the Gospel of John, "for in Him was life, and the life was the light of men... the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." (John 1:4-5)

And so the hymns of Christmas emphasize "That God eternal is born as a little babe." Perhaps children can perceive the mystery of this event better than adults and this wisdom is best understood by them because of their innocence and wonder. The light overcomes darkness because of Christ's birth and not by the many lights that soon will be taken down and stored till next year.

Let us therefore embrace the **lights and wisdom** of Christmas that is beyond understanding by welcoming the newborn child into our hearts and home. Let us say **yes** to God's plan of love that has the power of becoming the gift of new life for us and our broken world. Let us then joyously proclaim that the child born on Christmas is no other than the **Son of the Most High, Prince of Peace and our Savior.**



St. Herman of Alaska-December 13



In 1793 St. Herman (1751 - 1837) traveled from Valaam Monastery in Russia, with eight other monks, to bring the Gospel to the Aleutian Islands. As part of the Russian colonization of the Americas, Russians had been exploring

and trading there since at least 1740. He built a school for the Aleutian people, and he often defended them from the injustices and exploitation of the Russian traders. He was known to them as "Apa" which means "Grandfather." He lived most of his life as the sole resident of Spruce Island, a tiny wooded sanctuary near Kodiak Island. He was a man of great faith, courage and compassion; he truly changed the lives of the people he served.

Making it real: Not all saints lived in ancient times. Many, like St. Herman, lived in fairly recent times! This month, make a point of teaching your family that God has not stopped "talking to us" through His saints. Look up the lives of recent and modern saints like St. Nektarios and St. Raphael of Brooklyn. Make it a game to see who can find the most modern saints by doing some internet research (orthodoxwiki.org might be a good research tool). The point? The Holy Spirit was at work in our Church 2,000 years ago, 1,000 years ago and today! We're all called to live holy lives, aspiring to the lives of the saints and taking inspiration from their brave words and deeds.

EPIPHANY: JANUARY 6, 2017

The Feast of the Holy Theophany of our Lord is celebrated each year on January 6.

The Feast commemorates the Baptism of Christ and the divine revelation of the Holy Trinity. At the Baptism of Christ, all three Persons of the Holy Trinity—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—were made manifest. Thus, the name of the feast is Theophany, meaning manifestation of God.

Join us Friday, January 5th, 6 pm, for Liturgy on the eve of this great feast as well on Saturday January 5th at 8:30 am




HYMN OF HOLY THEOPHANY

St. Athanasios - Commemorated on January 17



St. Athanasios was born to pagan parents. When he was in school he saw a group of Christians acting out services and when he asked to join them, they refused. From then on he declared himself Christian. The patriarch at that time, Pope Alexander, predicted that he would eventually hold a great position. Before reaching the age of 20, Athanasios wrote a treatise entitled On the Incarnation, affirming and explaining that Jesus Christ was both God and Man. In about 319, when Athanasios was a deacon, a presbyter named Arius began teaching that there was a time before God the Father begat Jesus when the latter did not exist. Athanasios responded that the Father's begetting of the Son, or uttering of the Word, was an eternal relationship between them, not an event that took place within time. Thus began Orthodox Christianity's fight against the heresy of Arianism. Athanasios is also the first person to identify the same 27 books

of the New Testament that are in use today; up until his Easter letter, various similar lists were in use. However, his list was the one that was eventually ratified by a series of synods and came to be universally recognized as the New Testament canon.

St. Dionysius of Zakynthos -Commemorated on December 17



The holy hierarch, Saint Dionysius, who was born and reared on Zakynthos, was the son of pious and wealthy parents,

Mocius and Paulina by name. In his youth he entered the ancient monastery of the Strophada Islands, which lie south of Zakynthos, and there he donned the monastic habat. Later, he was appointed Archbishop of Aegina, and adorned its throne for a considerable time. Thereafter he returned to his homeland. One incident in his life especially reveals to what virtue he attained. A man came to him in desperation, witnessing that he had committed a murder, and was being pursued by the slain man's family. He asked Saint Dionysius to give him refuge. The Saint agreed to this, upon learning that it was his own brother whom the man had slain, he said nothing, but concealing the agony of his grief, hid him. When the Saint's kinsmen arrived at the monastery, he told them that the Murderer had gone by such and such a way. When they had departed, he admonished the man concerning the gravity of his sin, instructed him in repentance, and sent him off in peace having forgiven him his brother's murder. According to local tradition, this man later returned and became a monk at this same monastery. Saint Dionysius reposed in peace in 1621, leaving behind his sacred and incorrupt relics as a treasure for his fellow citizens.

Dear Friends and Fellow Parishioners,

The Stewardship Committee and the Parish Council would like to invite you to our annual <u>Stewardship Brunch</u> to be held immediately following Liturgy on <u>December 10</u>. We hope that all of you can join us for this fun event.

2018 Stewardship Materials. At the end of November, we mailed out stewardship materials for 2018, including a brochure about the meaning of stewardship, a letter from the Stewardship Committee, and Commitment Cards where you can indicate how you plan to offer your time, talent, and treasure in support of our Church and its ministries.

Time and Talent. Today, we at St. Demetrios support more than 20 different ministries tailored to meet the needs of a wide range of groups. From Church School to the Senior Guild, these ministries are supported by a dedicated group of volunteers who devote many hours of their time and their immeasurable talents in the service of God. We have teachers, bakers, quilters, carpenters, cleaners, writers, accountants, lawyers, dishwashers, coffee makers, coaches, dancers, singers, visitors, and people who set up tables and clean up after events. Each of our many volunteers is fulfilling St. Paul's message to the Colossians by working at whatever they do with all their hearts as working for the Lord, not for men. (Colossians 3:23).


With this new year, I ask each of us to consider not only what we may offer of our treasure, but also what of our time and talents we will offer in service of God, his Church, and the many ministries of our parish.

Financial Update. At the beginning of the year, we projected that total donations to support annual operating expenses would be \$552,000 out of a total operating budget of \$875,000. So far, this year, our generous stewards have donated approximately \$403,000 to support our parish's operating expenses (or about 73% of the projected amount). That means that an additional \$149,000 in donations before year-end is needed to meet our annual goal.

Thank you to our many generous stewards for your continued support of our Church and its many ministries.

Book of the Month:

The Virgin Mary by Dennis Michelis

Why do Orthodox Christians throughout the world venerate the Blessed Virgin Mary so

CHRISTMAS AND EPIPHANY: A NATURAL CONNECTION



During the early Christian centuries Christmas and Theophany or Epiphany were celebrated together. The liturgical tradition concentrated on Theophany which marks the baptism of Jesus and the beginning of His adult ministry as the initial great event revealing Jesus' significance to humanity. During the early fourth century the Church of Alexandria observed both Christmas and Theophany on January 6th. In due time Christmas began to be celebrated separately—first in Rome (354), then Cappadocia (380), Antioch (386), Constantinople (400), and gradually everywhere on December 25th. By choosing this date the church wished to Christianize the "Feast of the Invincible Sun," a popular observance making the shift in the sun's cycle in late December

when the days again became longer. For the church Fathers, Christ was the only invincible Sun of Righteousness Who by His birth illuminated the world and inaugurated the dawn of a new age. In the liturgical year it is still natural to observe the period from Christmas to Theophany as a continuous celebration of Christ's coming to the world. On Christmas we celebrate the incarnation of Christ while Theophany we remember His public appearance as the Son of God. To think of the period between these two holidays as having the same significance, that is, Christ's coming to the world, may help us to appreciate more deeply the meaning of Christ's coming to our own live. May it always be so.
