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Fr. Nick's Message

PENTECOST

On Sunday, May 27th, we celebrate one of the major liturgical feasts of the Church year, the Feast of Pentecost. On this day we recall the day the Apostles received the Holy Spirit and, under the guidance and inspiration of the Spirit, courageously left the safety of the upper room to go into the world to preach the Gospel of Christ.

It took courage to preach the gospel to the crowds first assembled in Jerusalem because, as St. Peter told them, he wanted to talk to them about Jesus whom they had crucified. People do not like to be reminded of their transgressions and they could have reacted by doing to His disciples what they had done to Jesus. St. Peter went on however to tell them that the Apostles, in obedience to Christ's command, came to the crowds not in spirit of condemnation for their past actions but to offer them forgiveness and to become one with Christ through Baptism.

While Peter's first proclamation was met with great success, he soon realized that as time went, on his imitation of Christ would bring rejection and finally even death to him and to almost all of the Apostles.

As baptized Christians, as Chrismated Christians, we too have received the Third Person of the Holy Trinity, the Holy Spirit, and we too are called to be courageous in living and spreading the Faith.

As we seek to proclaim the Gospel of Christ, our pulpit will be our home, our places of work and recreation. Our "crowds" will be members of our families, our neighbors, and our fellow workers. We must not condemn, but by our personal example following that of Jesus, must manifest love and forgiveness. We may not be required to give our lives, as did the first apostles and martyrs that followed them but we will be asked to sacrifice our pride. We may not be required to suffer physical pain but we will be asked to make other sacrifices by striving to obtain humility and show unconditional love.

Let us not forget that we, who call ourselves Christians, are often guilty of similar offences and injustices that we so casually judge and see in others. Too often we seek to justify our anger and resentment, claiming our response is normal if not human.

The Apostles became more and more courageous as they recognized God dwelling within them because of their Pentecost experience which filled them with the Holy Spirit. May all of us who call ourselves Christians become more and more aware of the presence of God through the Holy Spirit in this world and courageously live as Jesus would have us live and not as the world dictates.

PENTECOST



This unique icon for the feast of Pentecost has traditional elements that teach the spiritual structure of the Christian church. Against the background of a temple, itself made around the huge central dome, the Apostles are depicted in a circular form giving the impression of unity.

But if the icon is a representation of the Church, then it must have more than Apostles depicted. And this is the case. Among the twelve, are a number who were not of the original Twelve. There is St. Paul and there are the Evangelists, Luke and Mark (who hold Gospels). The Apostles bear scrolls for they are essentially teachers of the Good News.

The Acts, describing the historic Descent of the Spirit, speaks of the multitude present on that occasion. Ancient icons did, in fact, depict multitudes in the lower central portion of the icon. This has been replaced by strange symbolic figure of a king. The man is in a dark place for the world before Christ was without faith; he is depicted aged for the sin of Adam has aged him; the crown signifies sin, which ruled the world; the cloth he holds, with the twelve scrolls, signifies the Twelve Apostles who brought light to the world through their proclamation of the news of Jesus Christ.

Because Pentecost was the baptism of the Church by fire, we see the rays and tongues of fire descending upon the gathered group. And so we have, finally, the fulfillment of the revelation of the Holy Trinity: the Father as Creator, the Son as Savior, and now the Holy Spirit, come as Comforter, as Sanctifier, as Indweller of the Church.

ASCENSION OF OUR LORD- MAY 25



The story of the Ascension of our Lord. celebrated as one of the Twelve Great Feasts of the Church, is found in the book of the Acts of the Apostles 1:3-11. It is also mentioned in the Gospels of Mark

(16:19) and Luke (24:50-53). The moment of the Ascension is told in one sentence: "He was lifted up before their eyes in a cloud which took Him from their sight" (Acts 1:9).

Christ made His last appearance on earth, forty days after His Resurrection from the dead. The Acts of the Apostles states that the disciples were in Jerusalem. Jesus appeared before them and commanded them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the "Promise of the Father". He stated, "You shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now" (Acts 1:5).

After Jesus gave these instructions, He led the disciples to the Mount of Olives. Here, He commissioned them to be His witnesses "in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth" (Acts 1:8). It is also at this time that the disciples were directed by Christ to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 28:19). Jesus also told them that He would be with them always, "even to the end of the world" (Matthew 28:20).

As the disciples watched, Jesus lifted up His hands, blessed them, and then was taken up out of their sight (Luke 24:51; Acts 1:9). Two angels appeared to them and asked them why they were gazing into heaven. Then one of the angels said, "This same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as you have seen Him going into heaven" (Acts 1:11). ...but set an example for the believers in speech, in life, in love, in faith and in purity" (1 Timothy 4:12)

STEWARDSHIP

Those who follow the Hindu religious teachings must bring their thank offerings to their local priest. The ceremony goes like this: they fall to their knees, close their eyes, and then place the offering in the open hand of the priest. When asked the reason why they do this they reply, "we close our eyes because we are ashamed to bring so little, and we fall on our knees because then this act humbles us."

A gift does not need to be large in order to be significant. It is great or small in proportion to the amount of other things we possess. One of the greatest of all examples of Christian stewardship is the woman who came in to the temple one day and gave "all that she had." It wasn't very much, just a fraction of a cent, but it caused the treasury bell to ring and Christ to give her a commendation that keeps ringing down the centuries.

There was another who came to the Lord whom the evangelists call a rich young ruler. He had been greatly blessed, but was unwilling to pay the price of discipleship – to dedicate all he had to the service of the Lord. Scripture says that he went away sorrowful.

Are we giving to God in proportion as He has given to us? Are we giving Him not only our money, but our time and our abilities, and even our very lives? How much time do we spend working and doing things for Him in comparison to the time we spend to satisfy our physical needs? No matter how much we give Him, We ought to close our eyes and drop to our knees because we bring so little, and are therefore humbled as we think of how He gave His life for us upon the cross.

2. We must never be selfish in our prosperity. When God permits us to obtain wealth, He does so in order for us to share it with others and to make life more hospitable for those we can reach out and touch in love. "THe love of money is the roots of all evils."

3. We must never be self-righteous in goodness. Our Lord came down hardest on people who thought highly of themselves. The Parisee epitomized this attitude when he said, "I thank you God that I am not like the other men." God can do nothing for the person who thinks he/she is good enough. "I came for sinners not the righteous," Jesus said in he face of self-righteousness. True goodness implies humility. "God opposes the proud, but gives grace to the humble."
