Fr. Nick's Message

Setting Aside the Cares of this Life

There is no question that the pace of life has quickened both at work and at home. More and more is being added on to our plate and more is expected from us. Although we are told that in this era of ipods, voicemail, and email our lives would be easier, we suspect otherwise. We also see this with our children's activities which often exhaust us and our resources, turn us into chauffeurs and activity coordinators. Managing our busy lives, worrying about tomorrow and overseeing the "cares of this life," can be truly challenging.

The Lord knows this. He knows our needs and knows the challenges we face in our everyday lives. For this reason, He set a day for rest. The Lord's Day, the Sabbath, the Seventh Day, was set aside to rejuvenate the body and fill the soul. It is a day when we are to "set aside the cares of life," as the beautiful hymn of the Divine Liturgy reminds us, and to focus on our relationship with God and each other. It is the one day the Lord has set aside to be



fully present in Him, and we are invited to be with Him.

Sunday worship and the Divine Liturgy are important ingredients toward realizing this goal. However, some feel that "going to church" is a chore and feel more "compelled" to go rather than in the spirit of the psalmist, be able to say, "O Lord, I have loved the beauty of your house and the place where your glory dwells." We come to His house each Sunday to hear His word, to pray with others who share the faith, to receive and be reminded of His many blessings. If we come fully prepared, we will stand ready before Him asking that He stir our hearts as we commit our whole life to Christ, who now seeks to dwell within us through His Body and His Blood!

What then are we missing when all that is said above never settles into our hearts and our minds? What benefit is gained when we arrive, sadly, at the last moment? How have, indeed, "the cares of this life" crowded out that "one needful thing," the desire to be with God? We expect and ask so much from Him as we offer up our requests and prayers especially in times of trouble and need, yet He does not occupy the place of honor and priority that He truly deserves. "I am the way and the truth and the life," He tells us. Is He really the "way and the truth and the life" for us?

Perhaps this New Ecclesiastical Year, we can reclaim Sunday to be His day—the Lord's Day. "Let us set aside the cares of this life" and begin by coming to Church at the very beginning to experience what God desires of us, to Worship and Glorify Him. Let us not neglect what is most beneficial, most important to our souls, by choosing the fleeting and material over the eternal and spiritual. Only God's Presence can help us do that.



And so, let the Cross of Christ be our guide in life. Let us elevate it within our hearts, seeking guidance, help and direction as we make our way through the years of our earthly journey.




PROSFORA MINISTRY: A HOLY OFFERING

When we turn our gaze upon our young ones, what do we consider our Greek Orthodox parish will provide for them? What role do we expect our Church to play in their spiritual growth and development? There are over 600 families, stewards of St. Demetrios Church, that have not yet pledged. The budget approved by the General Assembly is \$6.2 million of which over 47% is already pledged. We ask that you make your pledge payable up to three years in order to invite the most significant gifts that you and your family can make. Understood in this manner, it is abundantly clear that WE WILL DO THIS. Please make the most generous pledge in accordance with your means this month. On your pledge card, you may choose to be recognized or remain anonymous. Very simply, there is no greater cause as Orthodox Christians that bears more directly on our lives than this once in a lifetime pledge towards building our new St. Demetrios Church.

ST. HERMIONE Commemorated September 4

St. Hermione was the daughter of one of our greatest saints, St. Philip the Deacon. Early in her life, it became obvious to her family and friends that she had amazing skills as a healer. In the coming years, she dedicated all of her time, energy and creativity to healing sickness, both physical and spiritual.

When the Roman Emperor Trajan heard of her gifts, he attributed them to witchcraft and commanded that she appear before him, thinking he

might put her abilities to use for his own selfish reasons. When she refused to be exploited by him, he had her publicly flogged. Trajan's successor, Hadrian, had a similar dislike and fear of Hermione's gifts. She suffered much under his rule as well and was imprisoned for years, but all the while she stayed faithful, healing and bringing many to the faith—not to mention many prison guards!

And on the day when Hadrian commanded that she be executed, the newly converted guards broke her out of her dungeon and whisked her away to the safety of the local hills. There she lived and ministered for many years, converting those around her, healing and teaching. When she eventually fell asleep in the Lord—most traditions hold that she was eventually martyred—her disciples carried on her ministry for years to come, never forgetting the example she had set for them as a loving, compassionate healer of God's people.

TIME by Fr. Alex



"The sun is the same in a relative way, but you're older. . . ."

In high school, I spent many an hour listening to Pink Floyd's "Dark Side of the Moon." I'd lie around for hours with my Walkman (this is now considered an antique),

taking in every word and note. I knew what I was hearing was important but didn't exactly know why. As I look back, I discover more and more; things become clearer. You may recognize the lines above from "Time," a song that speaks of misspent opportunity and the mystery of aging. Though everything looks the same to us today, not everything is. We're "older." And the journey from 17 to 40 was in the blink of an eye.

Knowing this, we need to become aware of how precious time is—time with our friends, with our family, with our own creativity and interests, and especially with God. As humans, we constantly kid ourselves into thinking we've got an endless reserve of time, that we're going to live forever. That there's always some "other," more opportune time in the future to nurture our relationship with God.

That other time has to be now. Nothing in our lives is forever. We can run out of time tomorrow, one hour from now, several minutes from now. And what does it mean to invest time in this relationship, to reconnect with God? It can mean prayer; it can mean changing our lives; it can mean focusing more on the precious relationships with those we love. It can mean different things to different people. Only God knows our secret hearts. We know what we have to do to make things right.

And a key part of coming closer to Him is recommitting to Divine Liturgy. The hymns, the prayers, the holy vision we share during these services provide answers that can't be found elsewhere. When we come, we build our relationship with Him; when we bring our children and loved ones, we build our relationships with them as well. We share in God's love; we share our love with one another.

This fall, think about time—how much do you have? How much can you afford to waste? How much has already slipped away from you? What can you afford to put off? Start praying hard again. Start talking to Him. Start appreciating what you have right before you.

Come to Liturgy, come on time and teach those who look up to you to come on time as well. Our children and grandchildren look to us constantly, wide-eyed and trusting. Let's teach them well.

You'll be showing them, through your inspired actions, that time is precious . . . and that time with God is priceless.

Barbara Cambus and I recently returned from a mission trip where we spent a week (June 13-20) working with Habitat for Humanity to assist in the construction of a new home for a needy family in the St. Tammany Parish of New Orleans. The trip was sponsored by the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of Boston. With the support of many, we went to assist those individuals who tragically lost their homes by Hurricane Katrina in 2005.

For the majority of the week we were assigned to one house where we worked with a group to put up siding on the outer walls of this home. Our motivation to work through the heat came from the encouraging members of Habitat as well as the locals we worked with that were completing their hours in order to qualify for the home we were working on.

Although we did not complete a whole house, we were able to make significant progress on the one we worked on. In fact, in the East St. Tammany Parish where we worked, which is just outside of Louisiana, there has been a total of 125 homes built through Homes for Habitat.





MIRACLE KITCHEN: VOLUNTEER HELP NEEDED


