Gravely Injured Cat Saved from Suffering on Easter Sunday

On Easter Sunday volunteer June Remley and I were at the shelter late, well after 8 pm, trying to get stories together for this newsletter and working on Facebook when our shelter bell rang. Frankly, we don't always answer the bell when we're here after hours at night for safety reasons but the very fact that it was after hours made us think that it might be an emergency and there were two of us so to the door I went.

The gentleman at the door said that he and his wife had found a seriously injured cat in front of their house and didn't know what to do so they left it in a box at the Paws and Whiskers shelter across the street. When they pulled out they saw our sign and stopped to see if we could take the cat. Again, to be honest many people who tell us that they have a seriously injured cat, because they don't have experience assessing animals, are sometimes more worried than they need to be, but the thought of any cat, healthy or otherwise, sitting in a box overnight exposed to any kind of danger was too much to

Unable to immediately reach shelter manager, Lisa, I asked June what she would do and after a very short time to think, she said, "Take the cat." My thought exactly - we'd just have to explain to Lisa the next day and we were pretty sure she would do the same thing. So back the couple went to retrieve the cat and when we saw it we knew the decision was right the cat was near death, sadly probably nearer to death than life from some type of injury to the mouth.

As I type this Sunday night, June is rushing the cat to the emergency vet, with instructions to do whatever we can and to give the kitty a name (every animal, no matter if it survives or not, should be given a name and should have someone there to help it cross the Rainbow Bridge and to shed tears for it) and I hope for the best, but if that's not to be then we can give this kitty a painless end without a night of suffering alone and scared in a box. Thank God that on this day special to so many, we were here late, the cat's rescuers saw our sign, and we were able to help.

Addendum: Unfortunately our injured cat (given the name of Grayling to match his beautiful tabby coat) tested positive for feline leukemia, had numerous debilitating mouth ulcers, and was in end-stage kidney failure. We do transfer healthy leukemia-positive cats to a leukemia-positive rescue group, but our vet said that any treatment at this point would simply prolong his suffering with no hope of recovery, and the decision was made to euthanize young Grayling. June stayed with him so that his last memory would be of a loving touch and kind word, and he passed peacefully away.

Fat Cats and Pudgy Pooches


The American obesity epidemic has become a hot topic of news. And with good reason considering we're the fattest nation in the world and we're only getting fatter. But a new study has shown that animals are experiencing the same problem

So what's causing animals to get fatter? Both the study authors and other relevant animal experts came to conclusions about why so many species were fattening up.

- 1. Richer Table Scraps. Animals that feed on our table scraps are getting as fat from it as we are. Fifty years ago our table scraps were less likely to be an extra value meal from your local fast food chain and this is true of household pets as well. If you're feeding them human food and you don't eat healthy, they won't be eating healthy either.
- **2. An Indoor Lifestyle.** Like person like pet, our household pets follow our directions. If you're active and love playing outside, you're more likely to take your pet on walks, throw the ball outside, and take them on hikes. On the other hand, our increasingly indoor society means that animals are spending more and more time asleep on the couch while we watch television.
- **3. Toxins in Our Water Supply.** An EPA survey of 139 streams around the country revealed that 80 percent of samples contained residues of drugs like hormones, painkillers, blood pressure medicines, or antibiotics. Scientists found that toxins in the water supply disrupt the endocrine system of animals, which can literally slow down a mammal's metabolism.
- **4. Spoiling Our Pets.** We tend to spoil our household pets especially if we feel guilty for leaving them alone for much of the day while we're at work. Some pet treats contain too many calories, just like human snack foods. Some of the larger dog chews can contain as much as 600 calories, which for some dogs is more than a daily allowance of calories, according to the Association for Pet Obesity Prevention. Dog treats are nutrient dense and this, coupled with feeding our dogs junk food from the table, makes for an overweight pup.

cate the public about the proper veterinary care of those pets.
