### JASNA President Claire Bellanti to Speak Sunday, April 23

On Sunday April 23 at Patterson Homestead JASNA-Dayton will welcome JASNA President Claire Bellanti speaking on the topic "You Can Get a Parasol at Whitby's: Circulating Libraries in Jane Austen's Time." As a professional librarian, retired after 35 years at UCLA, Claire is particularly qualified to discourse upon her subject. Her talk will explore an 18<sup>th</sup> century social institution that was important both to Austen herself and to her characters. She will provide a brief history of the circulating library and include citations from Austen's novels and letters to explain the central role of the circulating library and other forms of sharing books in Regency England. Claire's talk is



sponsored in part by JASNA. Be sure to take advantage of this opportunity to expand your knowledge of Austen's England and to meet and talk with Claire herself.

The meeting will also feature shopping with Jane Austen Books, an experience we last enjoyed at our March meeting a year ago. Jane Austen Books handles all kinds of materials having to do with Jane Austen, from scholarly studies through films, fan fiction, and T-shirts; and also a wide range of books on Regency England. They are owned and operated by Jennifer Weinbrecht,



long-time Regional Coordinator of the Ohio North Coast Region, and her daughters, Beth Dean and Amy Patterson (Amy spoke to us last March on "The real Mr. Darcy"). On February 17, 2017 JASNA-Dayton lost a much loved and valued member, Katie LePage. Together with her husband Peter she has been a regular and welcome presence at our programs and reading group meetings for many years. Many of our members will particularly remember the discussion she led at our November 2013 meeting on Austen's villains: "The Ones We Love to Hate: Austen Characters Most Likely to Appear on a Dartboard."

Thinking of Katie, the topic of the program Peter gave us ten years ago comes more to mind: "What do you have to do to be an Austen heroine?" Like Katie, the Austen heroine finds happiness through good sense and good cheer, channeled through her family and social circle.



Katie had a love for all books, with a special fondness for

children's books. She lived her passion as the 'Story Lady' at the Blue Manatee in Oakley where they established 'The LePage Stage' in her honor. After being diagnosed with cancer she traveled the country as an inspirational speaker, addressing other cancer survivors. She faced her illness with exemplary courage, seeming never to lose her gentle wit or her generous good cheer.

Katie and Peter presented us with a picture of conjugal happiness as perfect as we might hope even for Elizabeth and Mr. Darcy. Peter has always said of her, "I married my best friend."



Besides attending our meetings together and dancing together at our balls, Katie and Peter sang in the choir at Mt. Auburn Presbyterian Church for the past 20 years. Since Peter's retirement, they took enviably long vacations to England each spring, sharing their delight in its literature and countryside.

We are grateful to have known Katie, to enjoyed her presence, and to be inspired by her example. Our deepest sympathy goes out to Peter in his mourning.

## **Executive Committee Openings**

The office of **Secretary** entails taking minutes at the board meetings, writing them up promptly, and distributing them to the members. The board meets three or four times a year.

The office of **Publicity Coordinator**, although specified in the By-Laws, has never yet been filled. It would involve disseminating information about JASNA-Dayton and its activities to the wider community, perhaps though newspaper announcements and articles, flyers, and so on.

The **Newsletter Editor** is responsible for putting out a newsletter at least a month before each meeting, of which there are usually three a year. The newsletter serves primarily to publicize JASNA-Dayton events to our own members and also to provides a record of our activities.

# **Regional Dues Eliminated**

As reported in the last newsletter, JASNA has changed its bylaws to discontinue the practice of collecting Regional dues starting with the 2017-2018 program year. In compensation, all but the most prosperous Regions will receive a subsidy based on the number of members in the Region. Financially, this arrangement should be to our benefit, and it will streamline the structure of our Regional organization as well. Henceforth, all JASNA members who live within a two-hour driving radius of Dayton will be members of JASNA-Dayton, and all will receive the same communications and benefits of Regional membership.

# New JASNA Membership Portal

JASNA's membership process has been streamlined this past year by offering online registration. Previously membership was handled entirely through the mail, with the Membership Secretary sending out renewal letters and members sending their checks back in reply. For the last several months, the membership page on JASNA's website has offered the (strongly preferred) option to create an account with JASNA for registering as a new or renewing member and paying on-line. Besides saving time and postage, this system offers the advantage of immediately updating the JASNA membership rolls.

State St., Columbus, OH 43215). Readers can meet 120 Ohio authors representing all genres (fiction, nonfiction, poetry, children's and young adult). The event will include a book fair/book signing, panel discussions, children's and teen

activities, food trucks, and more. Admission is free-no ticket or advance registration required.

"All authors begin as readers," she says. "In our hearts, we're fans just like everyone else at the festival, and I've discovered some wonderful books and authors there."



## July 23: Summer Reading Group Meeting to Discuss Matters at Mansfield



Last year's summer Reading Group session on Carrie Bebris' first Mr. and Mrs. Darcy Mystery, *Pride and Prescience* was a really remarkable experience. With the author present, we were able to ask her directly about the choices she made in developing the plot; in employing Austen characters for her own purposes; in adding new characters. Carrie's answers gave us valuable insights into her creative process. This coming summer we skip to Carrie's fourth Mr. and Mrs. Darcy Mystery, in which Henry Crawford, with his usual devastating effect, meets Anne de Burgh; and Mr. and Mrs. Darcy hasten to the rescue at Mansfield Park.

The meeting will be held on July 23 at Eilanna Price's home, 2334 Lostwood Court in Xenia.

# **Reading Group Continues Lively Interaction with** *Mansfield Park*

Reading Group Coordinator Wilson Palmer, sent me this comment after the last meeting: "There were a number of us that just sighed with delight at the end of the discussion. It is sooo much fun as you well know. It got into a little raucous debate with everyone talking at once at the end such that it was quite humorous. We were out of time and everyone had an opinion to share." Obviously, *Mansfield Park's* ugly duckling status among the Austen novels has been overcome by our Reading Group.

Since the last newsletter, two sessions have taken place. On February 12 (appropriately close to Valentine's Day), we discussed the *Lovers' Vows* section of *Mansfield Park*; and on March 12 we took up the return of Sir Thomas and the fateful consequences it set in train.



Tori Manship was discussion leader for the February session. She led off with a summary of *Lovers' Vows* and how the personalities of the characters in the play reflect on the characters who play them in *Mansfield Park*. This provided much fruit for discussion, especially concerning Henry and his character Frederick, who share an unfortunate lack of foresight and moral compass. The picture of Fanny, quiet and content in her chilly school room while jealousy and lust rage in the theater below, was an outstanding image from this section of the book.

Mariah Busher, discussion leader for the March session, based her approach on Mary Waldron's *Jane Austen and the Fiction of Her Time*. Mariah reminded us to resist equating Fanny's thoughts with the voice of the narrator. She called Fanny an unreliable narrator, judgmental and too much blinded by love of Edmund, jealousy of Mary and repugnance towards Henry to be objective.

In the e-mails he sent out before both meetings, Wilson stressed the importance of the idea of a good marriage and good husbands and wives in *Mansfield Park*. He brought up the comparison of clerical wives in the novel – Mrs. Norris, Mrs. Grant, and ultimately Fanny – setting rather a low bar for our heroine. He also talks, more seriously, about an allusion to *Proverbs* 31:10-30 made by Henry, who says he does not wish to "eat the bread of idleness." That phrase comes from a description of the good wife, whose "price is "above rubies." Could that phrase have inspired Fanny's surname?

Our sincere thanks go to Wilson, Tori, and Mariah for putting these meetings together, and also to Eilanna Price and Marilyn Rueth for serving as hostesses. ## The Real Mr. Darcy

As reported in *The Telegraph*.of February 9, 2017, a group of academic experts, led by John Sutherland, Lord Norcliffe Emeritus Professor of Modern English Literature and University College London, has determined the likely true appearance of Mr. Darcy. The research was commissioned by the TV station Drama as part of its Jane Austen season. The experts took into account both men whom Jane Austen herself admired, such as Thomas Lefroy and 1<sup>st</sup> Earl of Morley John Parker; and heartthrobs of the day such as Lord Nelson, the Duke of Wellington, and Leveson Gower.

Mr. Darcy would not have sported a fine tan or broad shoulders. Those were marks of a laborer. He would have had slender, sloping shoulders; though, as a fine horseman, his lower limbs would have been well developed. "His powdered mid-length white hair…would frame a long oval face and small mouth, a long nose, a pointy chin, and a pale complexion." As a tall man, he would have been about 5'11".



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
