

FROM THE PASTOR Bishop and Christian*

As the days continue to get shorter and the hours of light fewer, the busyness picks up. Many people dread the holiday season, because it reminds them of loved ones who have died. family strife, the stresses of buying gifts and preparing meals. But something I love about Advent and Christmas services is that they slow us down. They make us take time out to meditate and think about what these seasons are really about. "Jesus is the reason for the season" may have become a trite, greeting-card platitude, but it tries to get at the importance of the "Christ" in "Christ-mass." And Jesus is not only the reason for this season, He is the reason why there is anything at all, rather than nothing. Even the label "X-mas" cannot get away from Him. The letter "X" is really a Greek letter pronounced "kee." It is the first letter of "Christ" in Greek [Cristovß].

We will have many opportunities for you to celebrate Jesus' coming (and anticipate His coming again), as well as the Mass of Christ on December 24 and 25:

*St. Augustine (354-430 AD), Bishop of Hippo in North Africa, said, "For you I am a bishop [overseer]; with you I am a Christian."

Advent services will be held on **Wednesdays**, **December 2**, **9**, **and 16** at 7 pm. The **children's program** will be on **Sunday**, **December 13 at 4** pm.

Christmas Eve service of Readings and Hymns will be Thursday, December 24 at 7 pm. On Christmas Day, the Divine Service will be at 9:30 am. (If you will have family members in town with whom I have not previously spoken, I would be happy to talk with them prior to Christmas Day service regarding our Communion practice. Thank you.)

On **New Year's Eve** (**Thursday, December 31**), or what is known on the Church Calendar as the Eve of the Naming/Circumcision of Jesus, the **Divine Service** will be at **7 pm**. Join us as we celebrate our Savior's first coming, and anticipate in hope His second coming!

Three Books, a review

The Liturgical Life

Harold Senkbeil, *Dying to Live: the Power of Forgiveness*, Concordia Publishing House, 1994.

Harold Senkbeil, *Sanctification: Christ in Action*, Northwestern Publishing House, 1989.

Alexander Schmemann, *For the Life of the World*, St. Vladimir's Seminary Press, revised edition, 1973.

Dying to Live and Sanctification would both be included in a short list of books that have most influenced me. Dying to Live builds on Sanctification, which is essentially his doctoral thesis. Dr. Senkbeil's project was to investigate how Lutherans could be more like modern day evangelicals. However, the more he explored the differences, the more he uncovered treasures intrinsic to Lutherans.

Dr. Senkbeil divides *Dying to Live* into three parts. The first is the Incarnational Foundation of the Christian Life: God became man and died for all humans. Our life in Christ is the death of our old man buried with the crucified Christ, and the life of our new man in the resurrected Christ. The second is the Sacramental Focus our lives take in Baptism, Absolution of sins, and the Holy Supper.

The third part is perhaps the most thought provoking, the Liturgical Shape of the Christian

Life. Who would think our lives could be shaped liturgically? But what is liturgy but an entering into Christ, a new beginning? Dr. Senkbeil found the insights described by Schmemann, an eastern Orthodox theologian, directly applicable to the Christian Life. Our liturgy handed down to us through the centuries of Christian history and tradition is just that, a structure of an end and the subsequent entering into a life in Christ. When we see our lives as an end, and a new beginning, it takes on a liturgical shape.

Not only do our lives together take a liturgical shape in the divine service, they also take shape in our private prayers. Following the Scriptural examples from Christ, David, and others, our prayers can take on a shape with an end followed by a beginning in Christ.

However, it's in our vocations, our daily lives, the liturgical shape becomes especially relevant, "The love which prompts us to thankful service to others is not our own...It is the life which Christ lives in us. And since it is Christ's life, it is a holy life."

When we realize our life is in Christ, and it involves an end, a death, our old man, and a beginning, a new man in Christ, our lives become liturgical.

A mission field comes to you

While an LCMS communications team was in Germany in mid-November, France fell victim to a multi-strike terror attack launched by ISIS. Yet, in the shadow of these events, the bright light of the Gospel shines in the darkness as our LCMS partner-church body, the Selbständige Evangelisch-Lutherische Kirche (SELK), cares for the stranger in their midst.

With more than a million Middle Eastern asylum-seekers flooding into Europe, a new mission field is growing exponentially for the SELK, a church body that has been actively receiving refugees and catechizing them for decades.

Synod President Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison has authorized \$100,000 from donated mercy funds through the Office of International Mission (OIM) to support SELK congregations in providing food, shelter, transportation, language instruction and the proclamation of the Gospel to people once considered impossible to reach. For good reason, the Church continues to confess that "nothing will be impossible with God" (Luke 1:37).

A mission field comes to you

The Rev. Thomas Seifert, pastor of Paul-Gerhardt Gemeinde (congregation) in Braunschweig, Germany, began his ministry to the refugees in 2012. Seifert said he is happy and amazed for the miracle that is bringing these people from countries closed off to Christianity to Germany, where the Gospel is freely preached.

"It's such a chance as a missionary — you say 'oh, what beautiful times' — they are coming [to Germany] in crowds," said Seifert. "'Go therefore and make disciples of all nations' [Matt. 28:19] — it's easy to do when they are coming to you."

Seifert's efforts are part of the SELK's growing mission work throughout refugee camps, including those in Berlin, Leipzig, Hannover, Düsseldorf and elsewhere in Germany.

We are coming in the season where there may be more food choices all around, some more healthy than others. It is very difficult to always say no to everything. But try to check your calendar and see what is coming up during the weeks ahead. If you can, eat a little less every day, maybe 100 calories. Then, when the family get-togethers happen, you can feel comfortable in choosing some food items or beverages you may not normally have a chance to try, then enjoy. Try not to go anywhere starving, and try sparkling flavored waters. They are quite good. If asked to bring something, nuts, dried fruit plates or fresh fruit are great tasty, and healthy choices-if you so wish. Getting out for a walk around the block will be good for the whole family. Just a reminder, with the little ones and pets, keep the tinsel and glass ornaments up a little higher. They are so tempting to both.

Lots of people like to drink beer, and those with gout may be concerned whether or not they can still drink. Doctors are first concerned that you get your gout under control. That means that your uric acid in the blood is at a safe level. Stay hydrated and then most importantly taking a uric acid lowering medication. When your doctor feels you have done this, you will be able to continue to drink. But remember - everything in moderation.

We all hate getting on the scale, but Reader's Digest printed an article written by the Physicians from "THE DOCTORS."

7 Reason's Your Scale Might be Wrong

- 1. You weigh yourself on different days
- You miscalculate your clothing

- 4. You just guzzled water. It is called water weight for a reason; drinking 16oz of water can add up to about a pound of weight. Don't worry - just temporary.
