Birth of a Swan

Forging a Finial

by Burke Hobba, Queensland, Australia

Nice touch for curtain rods or towel racks.

- 1. On <sup>5</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" (16mm) round stock, draw out a short point.
- 2. On the edge of the anvil, draw out a leaf shape and ensure a sharp shoulder. *Careful! Do not thin too much where the head will be.*
- 3. Mark with a hot chisel the material for head and neck.
- 4. Clamp the rod in the vise, and with a chisel split off the wings and spread them as wide as possible without weakening the bottom of the split.
- 5. Draw the inside edges thin, like a knife blade.
- 6. Mark feathers using a hot chisel. Go as deep as possible without weakening the split.
- 7. Cut hash-markings for body feathers on the sides and back of the rod behind the shoulder for a distance equal to the length of the wings.
- 8. Get the wing joints hot without burning the thinned edges. Twist and bend at the joint to fold the wings back.
- 9. Dress the head, breast and neck, and position as desired.
- 10. If the swan will remain on the rod, chisel and peen tail feathers to define the swan from the rod.
- 11. To remove the swan from the rod, cut off on a sharp angle using a hacksaw.
- 12. Shape and dress the tail end and chisel tail feathers.

At the SVBG December 2015 Monthly Meeting, discussed was a chance to be involved in an international blacksmithing event. The website listed above will give more information than I will have put in here. In September 2016, a new World War I Cenotaph will be created in Ypres, Belgium. It will commemorate everyone involved in the conflict, both military and civilian on all sides - all those who died, all those wounded, all those displaced - and of equal importance, their families and their communities. In the War of 1914 - 1918 blacksmiths and farriers were indispensable in sustaining the war effort on all sides. In September 2016, hundreds of blacksmiths from around the world will come together in Ypres to remember all those affected by the war and to create in one week, a Cenotaph based on the international recognized icon, the Flanders Field Poppy. Attached on the next page is the poppy pattern that was passed out at the meeting and as stated then, your finished poppy must be sent to England by May 2016.
