Ages 4 -99

Along the journey participants will be encouraged to discuss what modern lessons they are learning from these traditional tales. At the end of the workshop Caren and her drummer will lead participants in a brief African Dance lesson.

Curriculum Connections: Segregation, Civil Rights Act, Montgomery Bus Boycott, non violent protest, NAACP, "I have a dream" speech

Curriculum Connections: folklore, imagination, immigration


The Peanut Prince: George Washington Carver

The play also examines how her actions affected future generations and policies. *(Available beginning Jan. 1)*

Audience members will actively participate and offer suggestions to help these two characters address the problem and save their friendship. Curriculum Connections: Teaches awareness of other cultures, communication between friends, and problem solving

Warriors Don't Cry ◆◆

By Eisa Davis (Pulitzer Prize Finalist)

For ages 10 and up. Strong language

Based on the novel, *Warriors Don't Cry*, this play chronicles the true story of Melba Pattillo Beals, one of the Little Rock Nine. In 1957, with the help of Eisenhower's troops, Beals marched with eight other students through segregationist picket lines to attend Central high School, marking the beginning of American integration.

Curriculum Connections: *Little Rock Nine, Segregation in the South, Desegregation of Public Schools, nonviolent protest, taking a stand for one's beliefs.*



The Whole World's A Talkin' ◆◆

For ages 3-10,

Three Counties, Three Folktales, Twenty Two Characters, and one show! Travel to India, Korea and Ghana with master storyteller Patrick Richwood and watch as he transforms into multiple characters to bring three folktales to life using innovative props and songs.

Curriculum Connections: *Cultural Diversity, Folklore, Geography.*

WORKSHOPS

African Dancing ◆◆◆

Ages 4 – 99

Get up and feel the rhythm! Learn the styles and history of African Dance! Master Storyteller/Dancer Caren Calder, along with a live drummer, will have you out of your seats and shaking a leg. Caren's dynamic style of teaching promises a good time for everyone involved and welcomes all ages and dance levels: no experiences necessary.

Skills Developed: Movement/ body awareness, rhythm, counting, spatial awareness, African dance history

Art of Mime ◆◆

Great for all ages, 4-99!!

Join Bill Bowers (*Broadway actor and former student of famed mime Marcel Marceau*) as he shows how the world of mime is much larger than being stuck in a box! Mr. Bowers will perform short mime scenes and lead participants in workshops to build their imaginations and mime skills. (Available as a one-time workshop or as a residency series)

Skills developed: visualizations, fine motor skills, imagination.



Blown Away By Poetry ◆ **New!!!**

Ages 6-10

Wendy Windstorm has accidentally blown all the poetry out of Poetsville! You can help her solve this problem by traveling with Wendy on a quest filled with song and movement. Along the way, poetic puppet creatures will use songs to teach key elements of poetry. A closing writing workshop will encourage children to write poems of their own! (Available beginning Nov. 15)

Curriculum Connections: Expressive language, rhythm, rhyme, similes, alliteration, plot, song, movement, problem solving

Counting With Steven



For ages 3-6.

Steven leads a double life as a musical performer and certified public accountant. He is certainly familiar with numbers and aims to help children feel the same. Using songs from his award winning educational CD's (I-Parenting Award and review in School Library Journal) he will help young children build their counting, recall, and musical skills as part of a fun sing-a-long.

Curriculum Connections: Counting, Singing



Jungle Explorers

For ages 3-6. Morning and Early afternoons are ideal!

Gather your hats and become a jungle explorer! Join us as we sing and dance in this interactive session. Participants will travel on a journey through the jungle as they identify colors, letters, and various jungle animals while using music and movement. (Available beginning Oct. 15)

Curriculum Connections: Participants will develop their coordination, event recall and recognition skills.



Laugh & Learn: Clowning



For ages 4-9.

Dot Dash is a speed-reading clown who cannot slow down. She needs your help to learn how to take it easy and enjoy her books! Join Dot in her reading quest and along the way learn how to become a clown yourself. After a short comedic performance as Dot Dash, Master Clown Barbara Ann Michaels teaches basic clowning techniques as part of this workshop while stimulating a love of reading.

Skills developed: Clowning techniques, juggling, fundamentals of comedy

Rhythm and Sound in Theatre ◆◆

For ages 6 and up. Afterschool and Family audiences

Do you have what it takes to become a Broadway percussionist? Join veteran Broadway and international percussionist Jon Berger as he shares his love of music and teaches young people how to play various percussion instruments from all over the world. By the end of the workshop participants will learn how to use music to create moods, add humor, and enhance movement on stage.

Skills developed: geography, musical awareness, fine motor skills,



Spoken Word ◆◆

For ages 9 and up.

Do you want to perform Spoken Word poetry? In this workshop, Spoken Word artist Shaun Nesbitt performs his craft, teaches the history of the genre, and leads participants in creating their own spoken word poem.

Skills developed: self expression: articulating opinions & feelings, poetry & performance techniques

SPECIAL OFFERING

Theatre Residency/Workshop

For age specific groups: 6-10, 11-14, 14-18

Students will meet with a teaching artist once a week to develop theatre and playwriting skills. They will use their own ideas and stories to craft a final theatrical event that is performed for friends, family and library visitors.

Skills gained: Theatre/Playwriting techniques, outlets for self-expression, articulation of one's beliefs and opinions, collaborative skills of creating theatre in a group process, communication skills
