

Larry Favorite April 17th, 2012

Larry crafts beautiful vases, boxes and sculpture in his studio in Mebane, NC. Most have gorgeous inlays of turquoise and/or silver. Larry will describe his techniques.

In his own words:

In the early 1970s, I was a mechanical engineer with a manufacturing firm located in Phoenix, Arizona. A typical senior executive, I was on the "fast track" for success in the business world. But then, after a long period of reflection and listening to my "inner voice", I decided to make a major change in my life. In 1975, I walked away from my business career to pursue my growing interest in


While searching for a medium in which to express myself, I discovered desert ironwood, a species of wood that is found only in the Sonoran Desert of Arizona. I began to make daily treks into the desert to locate chunks of this rare wood, some of which had lain dead in the desert for between 200 and 1500 years. I was intrigued by this wood and began experimenting with techniques for working in this difficult medium.

First, I adapted tools to allow me to shape and polish ironwood like stone, revealing rich wavy patterns of color ranging from a pale cream to a dark mahogany-like grain. Next, I developed techniques for inlaying sterling silver and turquoise into the wood. I have now spent thirty-one years developing and refining techniques for working in this challenging medium.














Go Ahead, Call His Work Wooden

A love of machinery drives a passion that produces beauty

RALEIGH – Mark Keglers loves old machinery. Not just minor pieces of equipment either. He likes industrial-grade woodworking machines, some nearing a century in age and weighing more than 2,500 pounds.

"Yeah, I have an old machinery addiction," he admits, something those with whom he works call an understatement.

Keglers owns and operates Keglers Woodwerks, a specialty woodworking operation that can do just about anything with a piece of wood.

He will finish doors, form archways or build intricate cabinets, but Keglers really enjoys doing architectural molding for historic homes like the ones near his shop on Dupont Circle near downtown Raleigh. This type of work is called "historic reproduction," and Keglers particularly likes it if those exact pieces of trim are no longer available anywhere else.

In one example, a home owner brought a piece of trim about five inches wide to Keglers and asked if he could duplicate it to replace certain sections that had deteriorated. After working with various blades to get the contours just right, Keglers was able to replicate the decades-old molding to the point that even a trained eye would find it difficult to see the differences.

Being a specialty business, Keglers pays close attention to expenses. Instead of maintaining an inventory of expensive wood, builders typically drop off material at his shop and pick up the finished product, paying Keglers for the labor.

Also, he subleases space and equipment to tenants. Their payments cover monthly rent of the space and help pay for the machinery he uses. The sublease side of the business is doing so well that Keglers wants to expand out of the 7,000 square feet he currently occupies and into something about triple that size.

The move would allow him to put some idle equipment to work and to continue to upgrade his machinery. He has been moving from commercial grade equipment to industrial grade, meaning none of the workers are ever slowed by the limitations of a machine. Often that means he actually buys an older tool and upgrades it. "Some of the old American-made equipment is so much better," he says.

Even though the equipment can run nearly a half-century in age, Keglers puts a premium on safety. "We've not had a single

accident that a Band-Aid couldn't fix," he says. "Honestly, a box cutter is probably the most dangerous tool in the shop."

The relationships inside the shop make it easy to work together. Although there are six different tenants – and therefore six different companies – the group acts in harmony. It's not uncommon for one worker to ask another for help, only to return the favor the following day.

Not 15 minutes after explaining the ecosystem in the shop, Lucas House, with Iron House Forge, an architectural metal work shop, stopped in to bring by a part for one of Keglers' tools that he had worked on.

"And I have something for you," he told House, keeping his end of the bartered arrangement.

Keglers' father, Vilis Keglers, immigrated from Latvia and spends much of his time in the shop. "How many guys get to say that they work with their father on a daily basis?" the younger Keglers asks.

As a member of the Triangle Woodworkers Association, Keglers hosts workshops for the Toys-For-Tots program and for Boy Scout troops making pine wood derby cars.

A big plus for him is that he can set his own schedule. If he wants to try something out at 1 a.m., he heads down to the shop to try it out. Sometimes, Keglers says he'll take off for a few days and go fishing to refill the tank before taking on another project.

"I literally have my dream job," he says.


