Lon Schleining - A Woodworker's Story (As told by Lon on his web site <u>www.woodbender.com</u>)

After a stint in the Air Force and acquiring a degree in Government, thanks to the GI Bill, I came to woodworking albeit fairly late in life as a carpenter. One day a cabinet maker friend called to see if I'd like to build a staircase. I, of course, said sure and launched my woodworking career as a stair builder. I began building staircases in Southern California in 1978. I've built several hundred projects so far, including my share of one of kind custom designs.

Starting in 1995, I began to write for Fine Woodworking and Fine Homebuilding Magazines. I didn't realize how much I love writing. Thanks to Mavis Beacon, I can even type! I have some 30 or so articles in print now, including a replica of Thomas Jefferson's writing desk for Fine Woodworking. My first book from Linden Publishing called *Curved Woodworking* is due out winter of 2001. It covers steam bending, bent lamination and curved milling encompassing much of what I've learned the hard way about working with curves for almost 30 years. I'm

nearly finished with my second for Taunton Press titled Treasured Chests; The Legacy of Extraordinary Boxes due in bookstores fall 2001. I've been traveling the country studying chests and cases of all kinds for going on three years now, from the Smithsonian in Washington D.C. to an Indian reservation near the western Canadian border where they build traditional bent wood boxes. Just this past summer, I've begun taping videos, the first on steam bending and the second on building a wooden briefcase. For four years I taught woodworking classes at Cerritos College. It was great fun. I miss it a lot. Starting in 1998, I began to travel with the Woodworking Shows teaching seminars. I hadn't realized how much I love to travel. I just never had the time or the money. Look for me in a city near you this winter. If that weren't enough, I maintain my own woodworking shop in Long Beach, CA specializing in staircases, furniture, boats and assorted gizmos.

LON SCHLEINING WORKSHOPS

Router Workshop, Saturday, May 19, 8:30 - 4 In this workshop you will learn how to use a router to safely cut straight lines, free form curves, circles, dados, mortise and tenon joints, drill holes for cabinet making and much more. Also covered will be router tune-up, different types of routers and router bits, equipment including the latest in dust collection, accessories like power feeders and jigs you can build or buy as well as how to easily turn a work bench into a router table. Location to be announced; Fee is \$30 for TWA members, \$45 for nonmembers.

Table Saw Workshop, Sun, May 20, 8:30 - 4

Learn to use a table saw to safely rip, crosscut, run dados and rabbets. Although it is primarily a saw designed for ripping, you will learn that with the right set up, (not the miter gauge) it will very accurately crosscut as well. Also covered will be surveying the machine to see it's tuned properly, the importance of guards and out feed tables and how to avoid kickbacks. In the hands-on portion, continuous rip cuts, proper hand position and how and when to use a push stick will be covered. Location to be announced; Fee is \$30 for TWA members, \$45 for nonmembers.

At the present time blade widths run from 1/16" thru 1 1/4". Their blades run purposely with 35% to 50% less tension than the competitors carbon blades. Being very stable at low tension, over 70% of the rotation fatigue effect is eliminated, increasing band body life dramatically, and 20% LESS HORSEPOWER IS REQUIRED.
