

SEPTEMBER PROGRAM AND TOUR

September 18 meeting---Dr. Tom Culbreth, Professor of Industrial Engineering and, Director of the Furniture Manufacturing and Management Center at N.C. State University will be our speaker. The furniture industry is experiencing a period of rapid, sweeping change. Imported merchandise is affecting the technology, operational policies, and even the fundamental business models employed by the industry. Additionally, customer expectations are placing increased pressure on manufacturers to deliver customized product in shorter periods of time. The state of the industry will be discussed, with emphasis on how the industry is responding to these pressures. Current trends in machinery, materials, and automated processes will be presented via digital photos and video. Finally, a brief overview of the Furniture Manufacturing and Management Center at NC State will be provided.

September 22- tour --- On Saturday Mr. Bill Bryan of N.C. State University, with the aid of other faculty members, will conduct a tour of the Hodges Wood Laboratory. This lab, a 20,000 square foot facility, is involved in research to aid in the processes for secondary manufacture of wood products. Secondary manufacture is the step after wood preparation, sawing logs, kiln drying, etc. The tour will start at 11:00 AM and last one to two hours. The attendance is limited to 20 members. Fred Ford presented his "Vice President Mission Statement", which details the mission and responsibilities of the Program Committee listing specific duties of the host including a model letter to guest presenters with a guideline for fees. This was followed by Fred's report for upcoming programs.

Fred also brought up the possibility of TWA acquiring liability insurance. He presented the information from one company but it was decided that Ed Karolak would research for comparisons and report at the next board meeting.

The board voted to not have an annual banquet in the upcoming year but rather to invite spouses to the Toys for Tots meeting in December and have some type of refreshments.

The board also voted to approve the workshop to be held September 8, 2001 by Bruce Wrenn and Bob Gabor at the Cary High School Shop. The fee for attendees will be \$15.00 per person with the hosts being paid a stipend. Many options will be available including such possibilities as tuning up a bandsaw, setting joiner knives, table saw jigs, etc.

Ron Johnson discussed mailing vs. e-mailing the newsletter to the members. The board voted that for members agreeing to receive the newsletter by e-mail their membership fee will be reduced by \$5.00. The group thanked Mark Keglers for his work on the banquet held in June.

Our own Dave Bubacz presented a program on finishing giving much information comparing dyes and stains, sanding of different woods and grit numbers to use. Dave, having been a chemist (in his previous life) has a very good understanding of the chemistry involved in finishes. He explained about binders and how to apply an oil based or polyurethane finish on top of a water based finish by using a barrier coat in between and much more useful information. It was a very informative program.
