February 19th Meeting Surface Decoration of Furniture With Michael Joerling

Michael Joerling is a professional furniture maker from Chapel Hill. He has operated his own studio near his home since 1984. He creates both commissioned and gallery pieces that are sold and exhibited across the nation. Besides creating beautiful objects in wood, Michael has taught woodworking classes over the last several years and is currently teaching classes at his studio.

Throughout his career, Michael has chosen to work with materials or techniques that aesthetically add to the piece, whether in the choice of woods, veneers, paints, or surface decoration. His presentation at the Feb. 18th meeting will focus on the surface enhancement of furniture. He will talk about and demonstrate how one can use paints, carving, distressing of wood, or a combination of these and more to achieve surface appearances that are unique and expressive of the form they adorn. I guarantee that you will take home ideas that you will be tempted to try.

VENEERING WORKSHOP

On Saturday, February 23rd, Michael will host a workshop at his studio on veneering. He will demonstrate and guide members through a veneer project using techniques that can be used in most home shops. This is a hands-on workshop; everyone will take home a panel that they have veneered during the day. He will also demonstrate how you can use a vacuum press to achieve results that would be difficult to accomplish with other techniques. In addition, Michael will demonstrate the preparation and use of scrapers. If you haven't tried to use this tool, or your trials have left you frustrated, Michael will teach you how to use this incredibly simple and useful tool. The workshop is currently filled, but ask Jeff Leimberger about cancellations that may open a spot.

MINUTES FOR THE MONTHLY TWA MEETING JANUARY 15, 2002

The meeting was called to order by Fred Ford at 7:30 at the Woodworking Shop on Capital Blvd. Quite a number of visitors were introduced. Attendance at the November meeting was 95.

Jeff Leimberger reminded the group of the meeting on Feb. 19 with Michael Joerling presenting the program on the surface decoration of furniture.

Irene Joyner spoke about the fun trip planned to the 3M Research Facility in Highpoint on March 5. Forty-two people have signed up and will meet to car-pool.

Bob Gabor announced that the Carolinas Expo, Industrial Woodworking Show will be held in Greensboro on Feb. 14 and 15. Registration can be done on the Internet at

www.carolinaswoodshow.com.

There will also be a show in Charlotte, March 14, 15 and 16.

The program by Bob Gabor, which was scheduled for this meeting will be held in April due to unforeseen circumstances and the April program, was switched to January. Leon Harkens explained his venture of carving a 16 foot totem pole (a commissioned piece). He used a log of bald cypress that was 15" in diameter at the bottom and 13" at the top. The piece was selected with as few knots as possible and was then cut in half and hollowed out. A centering rule was used for placing the design and after it was all carved he figured out a way to put the two halves back together with the joint being hidden in the design. The project took a year and in the end was placed in the entrance of a home with a cathedral ceiling so that the totem pole spanned from the bottom of the first floor all the way to the ceiling of the second floor. Leon is almost as amazed with his carving ability as others are. He brought several other pieces he had carved. One was a beautiful box made of Bass wood with ornamental chip carving; another was a large wall hanging of Indian cliff dwellings in Mesa Verde, Colorado.

The program was adjourned at 9:00.

Directions to 3M Facility

From Raleigh/Durham area

- Take I-40 to Greensboro
- Go South on I-85 about 5.5 miles to Business I-85 exit
- Stay on Business I-85 approximately 6.5 miles until you get to US 311 South (you will go over the bridge around a cloverleaf to the right onto US 311)
- Once on US 311 go South a short distance until you come to a Churches Fried Chicken on the Right. Turn right at Churches onto Fraley Street (Drive?)
- 3M company will be on the Left Go into the 1st parking lot and WAIT until the whole group has arrived.

From Apex/Cary area

- Take US 64 West to Siler City
- Go North on US 421 about 18 miles to NC 62
- Go West on NC 62 approx. 16-17 miles (you will cross over I-85) until it intersects with US 311 in Archdale (this road may also be called Main Street in Archdale)
- Go right on US 311 about 5-10 minutes until you come to a Churches Fried Chicken on the Left. Turn Left at Churches onto Fraley Street (Drive?)
- 3M company will be on the Left
- Go into the 1st parking lot and WAIT until the whole group has arrived.

Woodworking Tip

When applying liquid stains, the stain soaks more deeply into the pores of the end grain than the face grain, darkening the ends much more than the faces, see top photo.

One way to even out the stain color is to sand the end grain with a higher-grit sand-paper than the face grain.

In the bottom photo, the face is sanded with 220-grit and the end grain with 600-grit, resulting is a much better color match.


