JANUARY PROGRAM CARVING

The Tuesday, January 15th meeting. *Moved from April* **Carving Techniques and Tools** Leon Harkins, a TWA member, is a gifted woodworker and carver. Leon teaches woodcarving at the NC State University Craft Center and at various places around the state as well as at home. He has produced many works of art in the practice of his craft.

Leon retired as Professor Emeritus of Forestry from NC State University where he spent his career teaching. His love of carving dates back to when he was twelve. In 2001 Leon completed a commissioned project to carve an authentic sixteen and a half foot Northwestern America totem pole. He will share with us how he was able to make a totem pole that makes you feel as if you are in the Northwest.

Leon will also share with us his knowledge of the tools and techniques of the carving craft. He will cover tools and techniques used in chip carving, relief carving, and carving in the round. You should go away with a good understanding of the tools needed and some brands that you can trust to be good. You will also pick up some techniques, but if you are serious about carving, I suggest you talk to Leon about his classes. I have attended, and they are excellent.

TOYS FOR TOTS 2001 FINAL REPORT (YEAR 16)

There were sixty-seven active TWA members participating in this year's Toys for Tots program, making 1,753 toys. I hope all of you took a moment on Christmas morning to think of all the children that will be receiving the fruits of our labor. I always do and it is a major part of what keeps me motivated. The other thing that keeps me going is the opportunity to make saw dust with some good friends of whom I grow fonder each year.

I would like to encourage the members who could not participate this year to make a serious effort to participate next year. Even if you only make one toy, you will know you have helped one child in need to have a better Christmas.

The workshop participants have really honed their skills. Each year we have seen improvements in process and products. Many of the toys this year were awesome. We Bob Gabor had seven club-sponsored workshops. sponsored two and made doll cradles. Diane Caudill and Sue Eckard sponsored two and made bears, Pinocchios, and rocking horses. Hal Liberty sponsored two workshops and made airplanes. Hal said he keeps improving his process and design. I will say that this year's were excellent, and the addition of an American flag on each was moving. Our seventh workshop was our annual Cary Home Depot workshop. This was our seventh year of having a workshop at the Cary Home Depot.

I would like to thank Pete Hodges for working all day with me, getting toys ready for the workshop. As usual, we made toys partially finished for every workstation, allowing a full start at 9:00 AM. At the end of the day, thirty TWA members and some assisting assemblers from the public, mostly children, had made five hundred twenty- five Volkswagens. Dave Mackie, along with Jane Main and Charlie Main, took the partially completed toys and finished the job at Dave's workshop. Taylor Hattori, Dave Hattori's daughter, asked to help and completed and assembled an additional forty at home.

We also collected many more toys at our annual meeting. Dick Hall brought in a whopping three hundred sixty cars! GO Dick! Charles Davis delivered his, now famous, cedar trucks and cars. Dick Courtney came in with a box full of pick up trucks. Walt Novinger and Rufus Cotton also made individual contributions that will make any child happy.

The annual meeting was a huge success. We had time for socializing, a guest speaker, and a lot of show and tell. There were one hundred one people in attendance, a record as far as I know. Thank you for all your help. I look forward to actively participating next year under the leadership of Rob Zaccardi, the year 2002 chairman of the TWA Toys for Tots Committee.

MINUTES FOR THE MONTHLY TWA MEETING December 11, 2001

The meeting was called to order by Dave Mackie at 7:30 at the Woodworking Shop on Capital Blvd. New members and guests were introduced and were asked to come to the front at the end of the meeting for just a few minutes of fellowship so others could get to know them.

Bob Gabor brought the books by Lon Schleining that had been ordered for various members. He announced that the Acuset brad nailer made by Senco has been discontinued and there is a special price available at CoastalTool.COM.

Fred Ford announced that after tonight's meeting the new Toys for Tots Chairman will be Bob Zacardi.

Ed Karolak introduced Sam Stroud, his seeing eye dog, Rover, and Sam's wife, Karen. After loosing his sight Sam still pursued woodworking and helped develop "touchable art" for the Duke Eye Center. A special piece that he brought to share was his rocking motorcycle (like a child's rocking horse.

The members who held Toys for Tots workshops shared information about each of the projects. Bob Gabor's group made doll cradles, complete with bedding, Hal Liberty's group made biplanes, the Home Depot group made 525 Volkswagons plus Dick Hall made 360 cars to contribute. Diane Caudill's group made Pinochio ring tosses and teddy bears with movable arms and legs wearing a little vest. Walt Novinger made an intricately designed alligator. The Marines came to pick up the toys for distribution and Channel 5 News was there with their cameras.

Dave Mackie gave a report on the mentor program. His survey included 40 people. Through this year various instructional classes had been given covering shop safety, radial arm saw tune up, sharpening chisels, small jigs, tuning a band saw and European cabinets. There was also a 2 day router and table saw class. Dave's weekly mentor group has completed three projects. The first was a jewelry box that took 30 hours, the second was a child's chair (30 hrs.) and the third was another jewelry box (60 hrs.) Irene Joyner, Jim Morrison and Jimmy Burns were in those classes and expressed their appreciation to Dave for his excellent instruction.

Many members shared items they had made through the year describing how they made the project and any jigs used.

Fred Ford announced a hands-on veneering class to be instructed by Michael Joerling Saturday, February 23rd. The door prizes were a special gift basket put together by Irene Joyner, a Ryobi router including the table, and two specially made heavy-duty clamps donated by Hal Liberty. The meeting was adjourned at 9:00.

MICHAEL JOERLING COMING IN FEBRUARY

Michael Joerling is a professional furniture maker from Chapel Hill. He has operated his own studio near his home since 1984. He creates both commissioned and gallery pieces that are sold and exhibited across the nation. Besides creating beautiful objects in wood, Michael has taught woodworking classes over the last several years and is currently laying plans to teach out of his studio.

Early in Michael's career, he drew inspiration from historical furniture styles and architecture. In more recent times, the influence and inspiration for his work has come more often from nature. This has led to much of his work having a sculptural quality, perhaps to the point that function has receded to yield a piece of sculpture.

Throughout his career, Michael has chosen to work with materials or techniques that aesthetically add to the piece, whether in the choice of woods, veneers, paints, or surface decoration. His presentation at the Feb. 18th meeting will focus on the surface decoration of furniture. He will talk about and demonstrate how one can use paints, carving, distressing of wood, or a combination of these and more to achieve surface appearances that are unique and expressive of the form they adorn. I guarantee that you will take home ideas that you will be tempted to try.

On Saturday the 23rd, Michael will host a workshop at his studio on veneering. He will demonstrate and guide members through a veneer project using techniques that can be used in most home shops. This is a hands-on workshop; everyone will take home a panel that they have veneered during the day. He will also demonstrate how you can use a vacuum press to achieve results that would be difficult to accomplish with other techniques. In addition, Michael will demonstrate the preparation and use of scrapers. If you haven't tried to use this tool, or your trials have left you frustrated, Michael will teach you how to use this incredibly simple and useful tool.
