## Saturday, October 19th workshop. Finishing

Jeff Jewitt will concentrate on the wide variety of finishes available, with particular emphasis on shellac and varnish. Various techniques for applying different types of finishes-oil based, water based, shellac, and lacquer will be discussed. A particular focus will be on surface preparation prior to finishing. Jeff will also discuss solving some of the common finishing problems such as splotching. ## 2002 Auction Rules and Guidelines

The auction will be at Woodworking Shop, 3141 Capital Blvd., 0.9 mile north of the Beltline, Exit 11, with set-up starting at 6:00 pm, on Nov. 19.

The auction will be conducted by Phil Bright, a licensed professional auctioneer, and by Dick Snow, a computer expert who will record the auction proceedings on his laptop computer. They have conducted many auctions and are very knowledgeable woodworkers. We are fortunate to have their services. With the help of Phil and Dick, we have formulated the following rules and guidelines:

- 1. Each item or lot must have a potential value of at least \$10 or more. Any number of items can be combined to make a box lot. You may not bid on your own items.
- 2. Each member or guest can submit up to ten (10) items or lots.
- 3. A reserve of \$35 or more can be placed on up to two (2) lots. (A reserve is the minimum sale price you will accept for that lot. This should be used only for higher value items.
- 4. All lots will be sold as is, so the potential buyer should examine the items prior to the auction.
- 5. All lots should have some relation to woodworking: tools, materials, books, finished craft or furniture items.
- 6. There will be no premium charged. (the full sale price will go to the seller)
- 7. The purpose of the auction is to provide an opportunity for neglected items to find new homes where they will be loved, cared for, and used. The sellers and buyers will get great satisfaction and tranquility in making this adoption possible.
- 8. Some items will sell for more than you expect, and some will sell for less than you expect. Best results are obtained by submitting many items and the law of averages will be on your side.
- 9. It is strongly recommended that you pre-register your "sell items". This will help Dick Snow to get the items into his computer. Items will be sold in the order they are registered. Phil Bright tells us that the early items sell better and bring a better price. A preregistration form is included in this newsletter.

**Tuesday, January 21<sup>st</sup> meeting. Furniture Design**. Jim Kirkpatrick will give a program on Furniture Design. He will show and tell how he goes from a concept or idea to the finished project. His projects are unique, tasteful, graceful, and just plain beautiful. Tuesday, February 18th meeting. Wood-Carving on Furniture. Paul Rolf. Is a TWA member and professional wood carver. Carved ornament adds so much to a piece of furniture. Unfortunately, when you walk into a furniture store today and look at the furniture that has "carving" on it, it will be a machine generated appliqué that has obviously been simply tacked on to the piece. Personally, I think that the piece of furniture would look nicer if they would have just left it off. Being a carver, I am probably too critical of these things because somebody must think that it's OK or the furniture stores would not be able to sell them. In this program, we will discuss the different ways to incorporate carving on furniture, what tools are required and, in most cases, how easy it can be. Paul Rolfe started wood carving as a hobby in 1974 while attending Appalachian State University. As a student, tools were hard to afford and hard to find. Starting out, Rolfe used pocketknives and X-Acto tools. While at the university, as a senior, Rolfe took two semesters of furniture design and construction from the Industrial Arts department. This is the only formal training that he has had. He graduated in 1980 with a Masters degree in chemistry. In 1982, Rolfe left his full time job as a Research Scientist at Burroughs Wellcome to look after his first of two daughters and to start a woodworking/ woodcarving business. Since that time Rolfe has produced hundreds and hundreds of mostly commissioned pieces. Working under the name of Raleigh Carving Company, he has produced models for industry, carved signs, company logos, church furniture and sculptures, reproductions, realistic portraits in wood, mantels, carousel horses,..... the list could go on and on. For the last twenty years, he has shown and demonstrated his work in the Village of Yesteryear at the North Carolina State Fair. Rolfe has successfully competed in many woodcarving competitions and has occasionally been invited to judge some as well. He is currently working with area woodcarving clubs to organize a woodcarving competition to be held at Klingspor's Woodworking Shop on February 8, 2003. Rolfe started working at the Woodworking Shop when it opened in 1999 and is now the store manager. Hosted By Leon Harkins

**Tuesday, March 18<sup>th</sup> meeting Router Techniques and Jigs** Hal Brown ,a TWA member, retired from Rex Hospital as the Director of Cardio and Pulmonary Services after a twenty five year career in the medical field. He started his woodworking as a child in bible school. He turned professional in 1995, when he retired from the medical field. Working on commission jobs, Hal turns out everything from custom kitchen cabinets to special furniture pieces. At this meeting, Hal will explain, the basics of a router, the bits to use, and how to use them. He will also share with us how he makes some items used in his profession. Making things from simple rabbit cuts the raised panel doors will be explained. Router fences and jigs will be discussed. Learn some new tricks to do with your router. The fence , the most important accessory for the router, will be covered in some detail. Learn from a master what to look for in a fence. **Tuesday, April 15<sup>th</sup> meeting. Mortise & tenon, and Dovetail joints.** ; Michael Joerling is a professional furniture maker from Chapel Hill and becoming somewhat of a regular at TWA meetings. He has operated his own studio near his home since 1984. He creates both commissioned and gallery pieces that are sold and exhibited across the nation. Besides creating beautiful objects in wood, Michael has taught woodworking classes over the last several years and is currently teaching classes at his studio. Michael will talk about and demonstrate the use of dovetail and mortise tenon joinery. This discussion will touch on the proper use of joints to avoid problems with wood movement. Michael cuts his dovetails by hand and will show us how he does it! He will also show us how he lays out M&T joints to be cut by hand and talk about how he actually does it these days.
