March Meeting Program Router Techniques and Jigs

Hal Brown ,a TWA member, retired from Rex Hospital as the Director of Cardio and Pulmonary Services after a twenty five year career in the medical field. He started his woodworking as a child in bible school. He turned professional in 1995, when he retired from the medical field. Working on commission jobs, Hal turns out everything from custom kitchen cabinets to special furniture pieces. At this meeting, Hal will explain, the basics of a router, the bits to use, and how to use them. He will also share with us how he makes some items used in his profession. Making things from simple rabbit cuts the raised panel doors will be explained. Router fences and jigs will be discussed. Learn some new tricks to do with your router. The fence ,the most important accessory for the router, will be covered in some detail. Learn from a master what to look for in a fence. The router is probably the most versatile tool in your workshop. Come and learn how you can improve your use of your router. Hosted by Fred Ford.

April Meeting Dovetail and Mortise Tenon Joinery

Michael Joerling is a professional furniture maker from Chapel Hill and becoming somewhat of a regular at TWA meetings. He has operated his own studio near his home since 1984. He creates both commissioned and gallery pieces that are sold and exhibited across the nation. Besides creating beautiful objects in wood, Michael has taught woodworking classes over the last several years and is currently teaching classes at his studio.

Michael will talk about and demonstrate the use of dovetail and mortise tenon joinery. This discussion will touch on the proper use of joints to avoid problems with wood movement. Michael cuts his dovetails by hand and will show us how he does it! He will also show us how he lays out M&T joints to be cut by hand and talk about how he actually does it these days.

A lot of the members are just starting in wood working so a simple idea will be of as much interest as a true work of art. Arches are used for the tops of book cases, doors and on mission style furniture. If you know the radius they are the a router and trammel. Most often we

easily cut with a router and trammel. Most often we know the length and height, but not the radius. To determine the radius use the following formula.

$$R = \frac{\frac{(length)^2 + (height)^2}{2}}{2(height)}$$

Servicing Your Air Compressor—submitted by Bruce Wrenn

Your air compressor needs regular serving. When air is compressed and then cooled, the moisture in it condenses and collects in the air tank. Do you remember the last time you drained the water from your compressor's tank? Take your compressor outside and open the petcock located on the bottom of the tank. Do this on a surface that won't stain—not the walk or driveway. Be prepared for a rusty mixture of water, rust and oil. Check the oil in your compressor while you have it out. Does it look like there is mil in it? Is it low? Check you owner's manual for the recommended type of oil. You should also check the filters on the inlet side of the compressor. Check the drive belt for cracks and wear. Change the oil, service the filters and tension the belt and your compressor will last a lot longer. Don't want to go

through the hassle of draining your compressor? Then install an automatic drain (Harbor Freight Item #42005, on sale for \$8.97, through 03-24-03.
