## TWA Meeting Minutes for April 15, 2003

The meeting was called to order at the Woodworking Shop at 7:30 PM. Dave Mackie was present but his voice wasn't so Fred Ford was the spokesman for the evening.

Chet Nedwidek announced that the Woodturners will be at the Museum of Natural History every Friday night in May.

Jeff Leimberger introduced Michael Joerling who presented the program about joining wood. He discussed different types of wood joints and demonstrated actually cutting a hand cut dovetail joint.

Leon Harkins shared a project he made for his daughter who is a teacher in the southwest area of the United States. The object, which might be referred to as a yoke, was designed to illustrate a children's book called <u>Tree in the Trail</u>. The book tells the story of the history evolving around the tree and spanned from 1600 to about 1850 so the yoke contained such things as arrowheads to depict the history. In the end the tree was made into a yoke.

Another member shared a veneered flag project which he had a picture of, and I shared my first "box". It was made with mitered joints from "scraps" that various woodworker's have passed on to me rather than burning. It is large enough to hold 3" x 5" cards and was cut in half diagonally. The top half is turned over to hold the circulation cards for items being checked out of the library at the current meeting, while I work with the bottom half which holds the cards for the items being turned back in from the prior meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:00 pm.

**Tool Talk**- by Bruce Wrenn

We all have something that bothers us about woodworking tools. Mine are cords on power tools that are too short or that are stiff at temperatures below 50° F. My Porta Cable 330 sander is a great tool except that the cord is only 5.5 feet long. It won't go the length of a sheet of plywood without the plug hanging up. So recently I went in search of a better cord. I went to Lowes and purchased a 15' (16/2) cord for \$5.82. Then I cut the female plug off to create a 10' cord. I added a new strain insulator and installed my new cord. I picked up the strain insulator from ABC Power Tools, 2407 Alwin Ct, Raleigh (832-2802). If they don't have an exact replacement part they can usually find one that will work. Lowes carries three cords that I find useful. They are:

Do you have an older PC 630 or 690 router that doesn't have self releasing collets? You can buy new collets from most woodworking stores for about \$15.00 that are self releasing.

Dust Collection – If you need a custom dust port for a machine, try a 3x4 PVC Floor Flange (Lowes item #181093, \$2.93). A four inch hose fits it perfectly and it already has bolt holes for mounting it to your machine. To connect 4" hose to 4" schedule 20 sewer pipe, use a 3" DWVx4 S&D adapter (Lowes item #23330, \$2.73). Both of the items are in the plumbing department.

The pad on my P-C 330 gave out and I needed an immediate replacement. It was Saturday night, and not wanting to wait until Monday to get a replacement pad, I

put the <u>old</u> brain in gear. First, I removed the pad and backing plate from the sander, then I removed the remainder of the pad from the backing plate (use lacquer thinner to remove residue of old cement). Then I took a mouse pad and cut an oversize replacement, and punched holes for the mounting screws. I used contact cement on both the backing plate and mouse pad (rubber side). After allowing them to dry I carefully placed the backing plate on the mouse pad. I then rolled it like you would a countertop. After using a utility knife to trim the mouse pad to size, I reinstalled it on my sander.

First Aid—Recently I got a splinter in my hand. The next day the area around where the splinter had been was all red and puffy. Drawing my experience as a beekeeper (in a previous life!), I put a drop of honey on the area, and covered it with a band aid. Within two hours the redness had completely disappeared along with the soreness.

Precision table saw alignment for about \$15. All you need is a dial indicator (Harbor Freight item #623, \$13.99 regular price, often on sale for \$6.99) and a couple of scraps of wood. For more information see John White's book, <u>Care and Repair of Shop Machines</u>. It is available from Wood crafters and the Woodworking shop. P.S.—it is in the TWA library, too!

Closing words of wisdom: The best way to make a small fortune in the woodworking business is to start with a large one!
