Tool Talk – by Bruce Wrenn

<u>Do I need a metal detector?</u> We all have seen Norm use a metal detector when using recycled lumber, but I only use new lumber, so do I need a metal detector? Recently while making a window frame I heard a loud "pop" as I was ripping some boards. It turned out to be a 30 cal. Brass jacketed slug. Luckily it wasn't a steel coated slug. I still have the slug. Thankfully I was wearing my safety glasses.

Let the rust begin! Well, it is summer in good ole North Carolina, so it's time for high humidity and rust is soon to follow. Now is the time to check the steel and cast iron surfaces of your tools, (Table saw, drill press – including the column, radial saw column, bandsaw) for rust. Light amounts of rust can be removed with a Scotch-Brite Pad or 200 or higher grit sandpaper. The newly cleaned surfaces should be either waxed or treated with one of the commercial spray coatings.

<u>Saw Blades.</u> Summer is a good time to check your saw blades. If they are rusty, treat as above. If they are covered with burnt pitch, clean them. I use the lids from a 5 gallon bucket and Wesley's Tire Bleach to clean mine. After rinsing and drying, I use paste wax on them to prevent more rust. If your blades need sharpening, this is also a good time to do that. We are lucky to have two good sharpening services in Raleigh – Ashcroft (a TWA sponsor!) and Raleigh Saw. Don't have the time to take them to either place? Then go by your favorite woodworking store, as both Klingspor's Woodworking Shop and Woodcraft offer these services. Both sharpen router bits, too. Apex Ace Hardware also offers sharpening service.

<u>Power of Electricity.</u> Now that you have found that old Stanley #4 that you have been looking for, how are you

going to get the rust off? Use the power of electricity. I don't mean a wire brush on a drill or grinder either. Get a plastic container (5 gallon bucker), battery charger (10 amp or less), old piece of iron, vinegar and water. For the iron, I use an old saw blade. Take your bucket and will it with enough water to cover the object from which you want to remove the rust, and add 1/2 cup vinegar. Strip your plane down to the cast iron body. Connect the negative lead from the battery charger to the body and connect the positive lead to your old piece of iron. Lower them into the vinegar water solution until your plane is covered, making sure that they don't touch. Plug the charger in and relax. When you come back the next day, you will see some of the most terrible looking foam on the solution. Unplug the charger and remover your plane body. Using running water and an old toothbrush, remove the black coating (formerly rust) from your tool. If the rust is still there, do it again. Because the solution turns anything it touches black, don't borrow your wife's plastic dishpan. The solution also stains concrete! Use common sense. If you have something as big as a top for a saw to do, use a plastic wading pool.

Closing Thoughts: Do you know why manufacturers include a ten dollar guard on a \$1600 saw? Simple – no one makes a five dollar saw anymore!
