Tuesday, March 18th meeting Using the Router -- Bob Gabor

Bob retired from the Electronics Industry in 1990 and almost immediately began the serious pursuit of his nearly lifelong interest in woodworking. He now carries on his woodworking activities in a shop that he built about 4 years ago. He has presented programs for the last several years, obviously enjoys teaching and prepares his programs so that they are interesting for all skill levels.

The router is one of the most versatile tools available to the woodworker and the addition of simple jigs can take its usefulness to another level. Bob will show you an economical approach to getting started with a router table setup; (expensive fences and tables are not really required to get good results.) He'll also cover the design, construction and use of jigs for perfect joinery, easy to cut hinge mortises, edge trimming, curve cutting and more.

Additionally, he'll show you his fast, simple and foolproof method of building bending/gluing forms for curved pieces. Friday, April 23rd meeting. Furniture Building Chest

Lon Schleining began his career as a professional woodworker in Southern California in 1978 building staircases. To date he has built several hundred projects including many one-of-a-kind designs. A gifted teacher, he taught woodworking classes at Cerritos College for four years. In 1995 he began to write articles for Fine Woodworking and Fine Home Building magazines. He has more than 50 articles in print and was recently named Contributing Editor for Fine Woodworking. Starting in 1998 he began to travel with the Woodworking Shows, teaching seminars on a wide variety of subjects.

Lon will be the instructor for the Sat. Apr. 24 and Sunday Apr. 25 workshops where he will build a small chest. The final design has not been decided yet but the following is an outline of each day.

Saturday: design considerations, glue up techniques without using a jointer, and some assembly.

Sunday: complete assembly, build and fit a door or lid, complete and ready for finish. This is a rather sketchy description of the weekend work but I hope to have a better definition by the March meeting.

In the surveys that Fred Ford did last year there was a high level of interest expressed in building a chest but I have had no input as to what type of chest is of interest so send me your ideas. The price is \$25 for either day or \$50 dollars for the weekend. Noel Butzke will have a sign up sheet available at the March meeting. Remember that you need to pay when you sign up. Dave Mackie is the host and the workshop will be held in his shop.

Chest building workshop with Lon Schleining

The purpose of the workshop is not to build a chest. It's to go over woodworking techniques as they relate to building chests. My personal goal is for everyone in the group who can make both days to be able to not only go back to their own shops and build a chest from scratch, but to teach others to do so.

Beginning bright and early Saturday morning, we'll begin with a blank sheet of paper. We'll work together as a group to design a small chest from scratch, working out the style, proportions, materials and joinery options. We'll discuss wood movement issues, make a cut list and give ourselves until lunch to finalize everything. On Saturday afternoon, we'll rough cut and mill the materials, again as a group. We'll glue up panels covering how to do so from the table saw using cauls like we did before.

Sunday morning we'll sand everything (everyone who wants to is going to get to learn how to really use a belt sander) and do the joinery with the goal of a dry fit by lunch time. (Hope springs eternal.)

After lunch, we'll glue up the chest and hopefully leave some time for Q&A.. –Lon

April Workshop

Plans are coming together for the Lon Schleining workshop. As you can see from the workshop description, it will be a participating workshop to a somewhat limited degree, but bring your ideas for design and whatever woodworking processes you would like to see demonstrated. Lon is a very flexible instructor so he will be able to demonstrate just about anything that is of interest to the group or individual. The important thing will be to learn how to do things and not whether we finish a chest or not. The workshop will be from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM both Saturday, April 24 and Sunday, April 25 and will be in my shop. For lunch, you can bring your own, go out to a local restaurant or order from a menu when you get here and I will arrange to have it delivered. We will have coffee and soft drinks available. This has worked well in the past. I will try to arrange for chairs but bring your own if you have a small one.

Cost: \$30 for one day or \$50 for both days. I encourage you to come for both days to get maximum benefit form a really good instructor. You can sign up at the March meeting or call Dave Mackie, (919) 859-2600, bring or send a check to hold your place.

Directions to my shop: Come to the intersection of Interstate 40 (Exit 290) and Rt. 54 (also called Chapel Hill Road), go 1/4 mile towards Cary and turn right at the light onto Trinity Rd. Vacuum Bags

Now that you have your vacuum generator; it is time to turn your attention to your bag. You can buy commercially made bags from several vendors. You have the choice of polyure-thane or vinyl. Polyurethane is the best, but also twice as expensive as vinyl. Polyurethane bags resist tearing and are better for heavy use. Most bags are 49" x 97" (big enough for a sheet of plywood) and thus are too big for a home shop. Vacuum Pressing Systems sell a 49" x 49" bag (model #404V) for \$76.00.

You can make your own bag with vinyl from a fabric store. Wal-Mar sells 54" wide vinyl for about \$3.50 per running yard. You simply fold your vinyl over to form a "U" and seal the two edges so as to create a bag. You have several choices of adhesives to seal your seams. The simplest is duct tape. 3-M's vinyl-rubber adhesive #80 (about \$12.00 at Home Depot) works well. You can make a hybrid bag using shower pan liner and vinyl from a fabric store. Remember when sealing your seams that capillary action will tend to pull your adhesive. You will need a nipple to connect your bag to your vacuum generator. (Vacuum Pressing Systems item #NPK - \$5.00. Specify vinyl - order several as you will probably make more than one bag.) Into your bag you will need to put a platen. It is a piece of melamine with 1/8" deep kerfs cut in grid pattern. (These help evacuate air.) When setting up your bag and platen be sure it is absolutely level, because what you glue will take the shape of your platen. For more information on building your press, read the "Veneering Book", chapter 4, pages 54 – 669. To seal the open end of your bag, you can fold over and clamp it with tow pieces of wood.

If you aren't doing curved work, then a frame press will serve your needs. It is simply a frame covered with vinyl that is lowered onto your platen. Your platen will need to have a seal around the edge. You can buy vacuum tape (about \$1.00/foot) from vendors. It is the best permanent solution. Next choice is backer rod for caulking. Check Lowes, Home Depot, etc. The third choice is closed cell weather stripping foam. For more information on how to install backer rod, see "Shop Notes" Issue 40. Backer rod is also available from General Materials in large quantities (up to 1000'). You can put a pipe fitting through your platen from the back instead of a nipple on the vinyl.
