Tuesday, May 18th meeting. Cabinetmaking: Construction Standards and Story Sticks

Following a very successful 2003 program on router jigs, Hal Brown returns to present his own approach to building traditional cabinets. Hal has learned how to efficiently build kitchen cabinets, bathroom vanities, and entertainment centers by standardizing his construction techniques. Only the length, or run, of the cabinets is needed to fit his cabinets to any job site, for which he uses a story pole to record his measurements. Hal will show how he uses his construction techniques and a story pole to build quality products and a rewarding business.

Background: Hal Brown has had a twenty five year career in healthcare. Hal retired in 1995 from Rex Hospital, in Raleigh, as Director of Cardio and Pulmonary Services. With an interest in woodworking stretching back to his childhood in bible school, Hal became a professional cabinetmaker upon his retirement. Bruce explained trying to level his Unisaw in his shop by using a 5/8" flat washer under a carriage bolt. It will fit a standard caster cup and ride up and down on it instead of using the regular \$30.00 levelers

Hal took toys to the Senior Citizens Center to have them painted. Next week he will take them back for the second coat. Tomorrow he has a fraternity coming to help sand. He has decided to make his Saturday workshops 8:30 to 12:30 except when TWA comes so that he can have some time off.

Best Place for Woodworkers to Live



Recent survey of Bruce Wrenn ranks Raleigh/ Durham/Chapel Hill area as #1 place to be a wood worker. First, let's start with toy, I mean, tool stores. We have three premium woodworking stores within 50 miles of each other. There's Klingspor's Woodworking Shop, Woodcraft and Woodworker's Supply, plus Tarheel Filing and Dillon Supply Co. There is Klingspor's, Woodcraft, Raleigh wood? Hardwood Center and Moncure Plywood. Gibsonville Hardwoods and Steve Wall Lumber are about an hour's drive. Want local wood? Try American Wood Yard. Mike Robbins or others. Need metal? Try Dil-Ion Supply or Lee iron and Metal (Sanford & Raleigh) plus TT&E of Garner. Need bolts or screws? Try Agri Supply in Garner or one of the local Ace Hardware's. Need some flex hose for dust collection, try Raleigh Durham Rubber & Gasket. Want used tools? Check out the State Fairgrounds flea market plus several pawn shops. Check bulletin boards at tool stores plus check News & Observer want ads. Want to compare band saw mills, check out Southern Farm Show. Need help? Try Triangle Woodworkers Association or Triangle Woodturners. Where else can you live where commercial cabinet makers will take a few moments to visit and chew the fat. Need a sawblade sharpened, we have both Ashecrofts and Raleigh Saw. Power tool broken? We have DeWalt, ABC Powertool & Specialty Tool Service. Sure RDU doesn't have the pedigree of Baston or Philthydelphia, but this is a great place to be a woodworker and there are some great woodworkers here!

Tip: When making cope and stick frames, leave your blank for the rails big enough to be ripped into two rails. Cope the ends, then rip into two rails. A perfect match for length every time.

Unisaw Leveling -Bruce Wrenn

Recently, I started rearranging my shop. My Unisaw would be put on the left side, instead of in the center bay. One problem, the floor slopes to a floor drain. I priced a set of leveling feet to go under my saw (about \$80 for the cheapest set of r). I considered using carriage bolts as leveling legs, but realized that their small bearing area would soon dig into the concrete floor. Soon the light came on as to how to make an adjustable leveling foot! (See drawing). By allowing the head of the carriage bolt to rest in a washer, the washer would pivot to compensate for the uneven floor. The rubber caster cup prevents sliding and the washer spreads the weight out over a larger area. I could use a wrench on the square shoulder of the carriage bolt to adjust the height and then lock it with the jamb nut.
