Triangle Woodworkers Association Meeting Minutes for October 18, 2004

Hal Liberty called the meeting to order at 7:30. Attendance was approximately 71

Two guests were present. One was Neal Kinney, city unspecified. The other individual was unidentified.

Agenda Items:

- Student memberships should be considered. The membership agreed with this concept by a show of hands. Hal indicated that the fee would be determined at the next Board Meeting.
- Fred Ford is in charge of the Toys for Tots program. The next workshop is this Saturday at Hal's workshop. There will be additional workshops on 11/15 (Friday) at Home Depot and at Hal's workshop on 11/20. Please email Fred and get on his mailing list for notifications of workshops.
- 3. Bob Gabor indicated that an individual has 4/4 and 8/4 planks of cherry, walnut, maple and cedar which he needs to unload. Bob will send an email to the membership shortly with details.

Program highlights:

The program was on jigs, presented by the membership at large

- 1. Bob Gabor presented router jigs:
 - a. A router jig to cut slots in a cradle headboard to fasten the sides
 - b. A wheel making router jig
 - c. A series of router jigs to make curved table legs
- 2. Bruce Wren:
 - a. A tablesaw taper jig for table legs
 - b. A trammel jig for the router
 - c. 32 mm Euro jig for cutting shelf standard support holes with a router
 - d. A radiused corner router jig for countertops
 - e. A circle cutting jig for the bandsaw
 - f. Eight sided knobs for jig parts
- 3. Hal Liberty:
 - a. A doweling jig for assembling cradles
 - A mortising router jig to cut mortises for the arbor bench project he is leading (34 mortises per bench!)
 - c. A drill press jig for drilling holes in toy car bodies for wheel assembly.
- 4. Alan Leland:
 - a. An angled drill press jig to cut leg holes for stools, chairs
 - b. A router table fence with dust collection,

and raised panel auxiliary fences.

- 5. Mike Last Name Unknown presented a table saw sled for cutting miters
- 6. Dave Bubacz
 - a. Router table templates make of ¼" hardboard, to cut curved cabinet bases
 - b. Straightedge guides for the circular saw and router in 4 and 8 foot lengths
 - c. A jig to accurately locate the position of keyhole slot on the back of a picture frame, for handing pictures.
- 7. Bill Anderson
 - a. One of a pair of adjustable rollerstands, calibrated to all of the shop power tools, with sand ballast for stability.
 - b. A figure eight jig for the router to cut slots in the top of a carcase for mounting metal brackets to hold a table top to the case.
- 8. Fred Ford
 - a. A drill press jig to square the bit to the table top, being essentially a double bend metal rod chucked into the drill press for calibration.
 - b. A minimalist router fence
 - c. A tablesaw tapered leg jig
 - d. A mortising jig for the router to cut loosetenon joinery.
 - e. A router jig designed to be mounted on the lathe bed and used to cut rolling pin
 - f. A router jig to cut flutes on each side of square columns

Discussion: Hand Finishing Presentation and 2 workshops (hand & spray finishing)

We are pleased to have Alan Noel presenting a topic on finishing at the Friday meeting. On Saturday April 23 Alan will host a hand finishing workshop and Sunday April 24 he will host a workshop on spray finishing. Alan has a furniture refurbishing business in Atlanta and teaches at a number of woodworking schools including Highland Hardware and The Marc Adams School of Woodworking. Host: Cecil Raynor

Discussion: Bowl Turning

Alan graduated from East Carolina University in 1974. He spent 19 years making furniture and helping to build This End Up Furniture Company. His interest in finely crafted furniture continues today and includes very finely crafted lathe turnings. He is a member of several local woodworking organizations including a term as Vice President of the Woodturners Guild of NC. He has attended and taught at National and State Symposiums and demonstrated turning at the 2004 National Woodturners Symposium in Orlando, FL. Alan is currently teaching at the Woodcraft Store in Raleigh and will be conducting a class at the John Cambell Folk School during April 2005. Alan is a professional woodturner and an active member of TWA. He has demonstrated turning very finely crafted tree ornaments at a previous TWA meeting and in May 2005 will be demonstrating bowl turning. Host: Dave Mackie

June - George Holmes

Discussion: Spray Finishing

Mr. George Holmes, a representative of the ML Campbell Co., will be giving a demonstration on spray finishes and techniques with a heavy emphasis on water-borne finishes. Host: Bruce Wren

July - Jim Smith, Paul Rolfe & Kevin Pearce

Discussion: Sharpening, stones, sandpaper, machines Presentation and 1 half day workshop Jim Smith operates a business constructing traditional Japanese furniture, using traditional Japanese methods. Working in the furniture business since 1975, Three workshops will be scheduled, accommodating five people each. All three of these workshops will be the same and will focus on preparation of wet stones for use and on sharpening chisels. These workshops will be very much hands on. The workshops are now set for July 23rd, July 30th, and August 6th, and will go from 9 AM to 4 PM. If members want to follow up with additional subjects, Jim has other workshops he features.

Paul Rolfe is a professional wood carver, the manager of the Woodworking Store, and a TWA member. Paul will discuss and demonstrate sharpening with a machine. The Tormek sharpening system will be featured as an example of machines employed in sharpening. He will show and explain the various jigs used to sharpen various tools. The jigs bring accuracy and repeatability to the sharpening process.

Kevin Pearce hails from England, where he apprenticed and graduated from the London Collage of Furniture in 1977. Since then, he has been a professional cabinetmaker, now residing in Raleigh. Kevin will demonstrate a method to get a razor sharp edge on your scraper. The scraper, although a very simple tool, is versatile and is used by all or most professional cabinetmakers. If you do not have a scraper in your shop, you should!

2004 Auction Rules and Guidelines

The auction will be at Woodworking Shop, 3141 Capital Blvd., 0.9 mile north of the Beltline. Exit 11. with set-up starting at **6:00 pm**, on Nov. 16, 2004.

The auction will be conducted by Phil Bright, a retired professional auctioneer, and by Dick Snow. a computer expert who will record the auction proceedings on his laptop computer. They have conducted many auctions and are very knowledgeable woodworkers. We are fortunate to have their services. With the help of Phil and Dick. we have formulated the following rules and guidelines:

1. Each item or lot must have a potential value of at least \$10 or more. Any number of items can be combined to make a box lot. You may not bid on your own items.

2. Each member can submit up to eight (8) items or lots.

3. A minimum bid (reserve) of \$35 or more can be placed on up to two (2) lots. (A reserve is the minimum sale price you will accept for that lot.) This should be used only for higher value items that are expected to sell for at least \$35.

4. All lots will be sold as is. so the potential buyer should examine the items prior to the auction.

5. All tots should have some relation to woodworking: tools, materials, books, finished craft **or** furniture items.

6. There will be no premium charged, (the full sale price will go to the seller)

7. To make the auction manageable, there is a limit of 80 lots. If your registration does not make the cut, you will be notified to NOT bring your items.

8. All items must be pro-registered with Dick Snow by November 10. This will help you in your planning, and will allow Dick to have everything in his computer and ready to go at the auction. Items will be numbered and sold in the order which they are received by Dick. Phil tells us that early items sell better and bring a better price.

9. Only current members of TWA are permitted to participate (buy or sell) in the auction.

10. Send your pre-registration form to Dick Snow (see form for details). It must be in his hands by November 10.

11. If you have questions, call me, Ed Karolak, at 919-383-4233. 1. The time schedule at the auction site will be the following:

- 6-7 pm Bring your pre-registered items and have them tagged.
- 6-7:30 pm Time to examine the items
- 6-7:30 pm Sign up for your bidding number. Bidding will be by number only.
- 7:30 pm Brief business meeting.

7:45 pm (approximately) Start of auction.

If possible, try to pay for items purchased by check, however cash will be accepted, No Credit Cards.
