Toys for Tot's

The third TWA workshop at my shop was very successful. The Home Depot workshop on November 5th had great attendance and great results. The second day was a bit different. The kids came to work on toys and I did not realize that I needed a lot of help. I learned from this one to do only sealing and varnishing. It is a lot easier to correct varnish mistakes than it is to correct over painting.

From Home Depot's viewpoint, it was very successful. It is likely that we will have a workshop at most of the area stores. Home Depot will provide the equipment and space in the stores for us to work on toys. They will set up an area for the kids to varnish and assemble the toys. While I may still have workshops, the main emphasis will be to get TWA members to help at the Home Depot stores.

I still have many toys to finish and my shop will be open Dec. 4 and Dec.12 from 9:00 to 1:00. No sign up is required. Children and spouses are welcome. All the cradles and beds have been completed. Each one has a mattress, doll and blanket. Most of the rest of the toys will be varnished. I have been painting and varnishing wheels so the last operation will be to install the wheels.

I am assembling 30 airplanes to send to Pope Air Force base. We sent down 300 toys and they could use a lot more. The weekend of the 12th would be a good weekend to make toys for Pope. The kids there are not on any social service list so they do not get toys from the "Toys for Tots" program. I would like to get some band saw operators to come out some time to cut out toys so I can use up some of the lumber. The cut toys will take a lot less space. Also, if anyone wants some wood, I have plenty of wood for toys. I also have a large quantity of ¾ pine up to 12". Pleas take some wood, I am running out of space.

The main event of the evening was the annual tool auction. Ed Karolak introduced the auctioneering dynamic duo of Phil Bright (auctioneer) and Dick Snow (spreadsheet wizard). These two have shepherded many an auction in this area, do a great job, and with good humor! Bidding was on 61 items and prices realized ranged from a pittance (\$5.00) to a quite respectable (\$180.00), with the average price being about \$25.



Items for auction included veneer, miter box and saw, books and magazines, a workbench, saw blades, router bits, power tools (both antique and current), handtools, a Tormek sharpening system, a really nice air compressor, a benchtop bandsaw, among others. Discussion: Hand Finishing

Presentation and 2 workshops (hand & spray finishing)

We are pleased to have Alan Noel presenting a topic on finishing at the Friday meeting. On Saturday April 23 Alan will host a hand finishing workshop and Sunday April 24 he will host a workshop on spray finishing. Alan has a furniture refurbishing business in Atlanta and teaches at a number of woodworking schools including Highland Hardware and The Marc Adams School of Woodworking. Host: Cecil Raynor

Discussion: Bowl Turning

Alan graduated from East Carolina University in 1974. He spent 19 years making furniture and helping to build This End Up Furniture Company. His interest in finely crafted furniture continues today and includes very finely crafted lathe turnings. He is a member of several local woodworking organizations including a term as Vice President of the Woodturners Guild of NC. He has attended and taught at National and State Symposiums and demonstrated turning at the 2004 National Woodturners Symposium in Orlando, FL. Alan is currently teaching at the Woodcraft Store in Raleigh and will be conducting a class at the John Cambell Folk School during April 2005. Alan is a professional woodturner and an active member of TWA. He has demonstrated turning very finely crafted tree ornaments at a previous TWA meeting and in May 2005 will be demonstrating bowl turning. Host: Dave Mackie

Discussion: Spray Finishing

Mr. George Holmes, a representative of the ML Campbell Co., will be giving a demonstration on spray finishes and techniques with a heavy emphasis on water-borne finishes. Host: Bruce Wren

July - Jim Smith, Paul Rolfe & Kevin Pearce

Discussion: Sharpening, stones, sandpaper, machines

Presentation and 1 half day workshop

Jim Smith operates a business constructing traditional Japanese furniture, using traditional Japanese methods. Working in the furniture business since 1975, Three workshops will be scheduled, accommodating five people each. All three of these workshops will be the same and will focus on preparation of wet stones for use and on sharpening chisels. These workshops will be very much hands on. The workshops are now set for July 23rd,, July 30th, and August 6th, and will go from 9 AM to 4 PM. If members want to follow up with additional subjects, Jim has other workshops he features.

Paul Rolfe is a professional wood carver, the manager of the Wood-working Store, and a TWA member. Paul will discuss and demonstrate sharpening with a machine. The Tormek sharpening system will be featured as an example of machines employed in sharpening. He will show and explain the various jigs used to sharpen various tools. The jigs bring accuracy and repeatability to the sharpening process.

Kevin Pearce hails from England, where he apprenticed and graduated from the London Collage of Furniture in 1977. Since then, he has been a professional cabinetmaker, now residing in Raleigh. Kevin will demonstrate a method to get a razor sharp edge on your scraper. The scraper, although a very simple tool, is versatile and is used by all or most professional cabinetmakers. If you do not have a scraper in your shop, you should!
