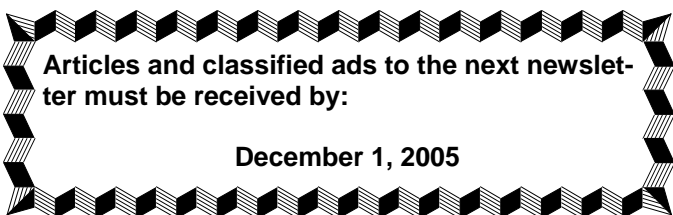

Business:

1. **Toys for Tots.** **Bill Anderson** called for scroll sawyers to cut the jigsaw puzzles prepared at the workshop on October 15. Approximately 70 puzzles were made. By the end of the meeting, all puzzles were taken for cutting. **Fred Ford** indicated that there were 9 and 14 people signed up to work at the Home Depot (Capital Blvd) workshops on November 4 and 5.
2. **Workshop.** **Pete Kasper** announced that there would be a Hinsky Edge Workshop on November 9. Cost is \$150. Contact Pete at 362-0425 for details.
3. **Fred Ford** announced that Charlie Main had had triple bypass surgery and a valve replacement. Fred sent around a card for people to sign.
4. **Mark Keglars** announced that he has an 8: Grizzly long bed jointer with extra blades for sale. Contact mark at 608-7220 for details.

Program: Frank Klausz

Jeff Leimberger introduce **Frank Klausz** who gave a presentation on wood technology, sharpening, and fast and furious dovetails.

Frank presented a concept that woodworking can be viewed as a circle in quarters. The quarters are wood technology, tools (hand and power), joinery, and finishing. One come from the other and leads to the next. Frank stated that cabinet makers were essentially "boxologists", making the point that to a large extent, cabinetry and joinery are the process of making boxes in one form or the other and that joinery is essentially the process of attaching pieces of wood together.

Some tool recommendations from Frank: Marples chisels, Stanley #750 and #20 chisels (he dislikes Sorby chisels!), Japanese saws. For sharpening, Frank recommends Shapton stones (1, 5 and 15,000 grit) and

also Norton stones (1, 4 and 8000 grit). He is getting ready to publish an article on his sharpening techniques and jigs in a forthcoming issue of Popular Woodworking.

Frank gave an amazing dovetail cutting exhibition. In brief:

1. Mark the thickness of the stock on the faces of each board.
2. Cut the pins first. This requires 6 saw cuts. Cut a half pin on the left then on the right, cut a whole pin on the left, divide the rest of the edge in half with a cut, then complete the two hole pins with two more cuts.
3. Equal pins and tails are the strongest.
4. Chisel out the waste between the pins, using an undercut.
5. Mark the tails from the pins using a pencil line.
6. Saw on the outside of the pencil line.

Frank was able to do some very precise dovetails in about 3 minutes with no measurements other than by eye.

President's Corner

The year is fast approaching - how are YOU doing on your Christmas gifts? A while back I listed my goals and though I am making progress, I don't believe I will reach them all. As I write this article I have 4 gifts that are in the processing of having the finish dry.

Club members are continuing efforts towards completing toys for our annual Toys for Tots program. It is our chance to shine as a club by making toys for kids who may not otherwise have something this holiday season. Please try to remember that when it seems like your efforts might be not be appreciated, and toy making becomes real work.

For me, this past month's key activities have been dovetails. It started with the October meeting in which Frank Klausz shared with us not only his technique for making hand cut dovetails, but also some of his unique views on a number of different subjects. This was followed up by a two day workshop with Frank in which went into greater detail of not only hand cut dovetail joints, but also some of the associated skills. (Okay everyone - are your chisels sharp?) Next on my list was fine tuning my Keller Dovetail jig. You may remember a few months ago I shared my experience with the jig. I spent some time making the adjustment, and now have it tuned to produce nice, tight dovetails that stand about 1/16 " proud. Very acceptable and easily cleaned up. I was showing my wife the difference between my first effort with the Keller and the "tuned" version. Her comment was wow! See - you didn't even need to learn how to cut them by hand!

Frank's workshop was very educational in a number of ways. One of several discussions that occurred during the workshop centered around the benefits of learning how to use some of the basic hand tools and related skills. Pointedly demonstrated was the value of knowing how to properly use and sharpen chisels and hand planes. Knowing how to properly use these tools could open up a new world for some of us. I would like to encourage members in our club who are comfortable using some of the basic tools to step up and offer to show others their techniques on essentially a one-on-one basis. I know of one who has volunteered to hold a session for a few members on the different types and uses of hand planes. What a great start. How about you? Might you be able to help other members out as they attempt to learn new skills. It doesn't have to be a big workshop, with 10 or 15 people, but maybe just a couple coming over to visit while you share your skills and knowledge. Even if only one person benefits from such a skill, it means somewhere, someone will be able to complete that special project because YOU took the time to help out. Remember we are in it for our love of woodworking and the enjoyment we should be getting out of our hobby. See you at the auction!

2005 Auction Rules and Guidelines

The auction will be at Woodworking Shop, 3141 Capital Blvd., 0.9 mile north of the Beltline. Exit 11. with set-up starting at **6:00 pm**, on Nov. 15, 2004.

The auction will be conducted by Phil Bright, a retired professional auctioneer, and by Dick Snow. a computer expert who will record the auction proceedings on his laptop computer. They have conducted many auctions and are very knowledgeable woodworkers. We are fortunate to have their services. With the help of Phil and Dick. we have formulated the following rules and guidelines:

1. Each item or lot must have a potential value of at least \$10 or more. Any number of items can be combined to make a box lot. You may not bid on your own items.
2. Each member can submit up to eight (8) items or lots.
3. A minimum bid (reserve) of \$35 or more can be placed on up to two (2) lots. (A reserve is the minimum sale price you will accept for that lot.) This should be used only for higher value items that are expected to sell for at least \$35.
4. All lots will be sold as is. so the potential buyer should examine the items prior to the auction.
5. All lots should have some relation to woodworking: tools, materials, books, finished craft **or** furniture items.
6. There will be no premium charged, (the full sale price will go to the seller)
7. To make the auction manageable, there is a limit of 80 lots. If your registration does not make the cut, you will be notified to NOT bring your items.
8. All items must be pro-registered with Dick Snow by November 8th This will help you in your planning, and will allow Dick to have everything in his computer and ready to go at the auc-tion. Items will be numbered and sold in the order which they are received by Dick. Phil tells us that early items sell better and bring a better price.
9. Only current members of TWA are permitted to participate (buy or sell) in the auc-tion.
10. Send your pre-registration form to Dick Snow (see form for details). It must be in his hands by November 8th.
11. All auction items **MUST BE PRE-REGISTERED!** We use a computer generated inventory list that is printed prior to the meeting. We are unable to add items to it. Please help make this an enjoyable experience for all!
