Mama Said - You Better Shop Around

As the holiday season approaches, there are many tool bargains to be found:

Bessey Clamps: Woodcraft, Lee Valley and some others ran an October special. Currently Tool Crib has on sale – buy two and get a 24" free, while supplies last. Sizes are 31" (\$27.94), 40" (\$29.94), 50" (\$37.94), etc.

Lowes will price match, less 10%, but no free clamp. Tumor has it that Rockler will be running a sale soon. Call Woodworkers Supply as they will match this deal.

Pony Pipe Clamps: Tool Crib - #50 - \$8.94 or \$8.99, I saw two different prices. These fit 3/4" pipe. #52 - \$9.99, for ½" pipe. Home depot matches, but no less 10%. Sears does though.

Quick Grip Clamps: Lowes has a pack of four 6" clamps for \$19.99. Home Depot has buy one, get one by mail rebate through December 31st. Look for special labels.

Northern Tools: Drill Doctor, Model #500 - \$94.99. This is the top of line machine, and it does up to ½" bits. (There is soon to be a new model).

{Editor's note - check out our sponsor's list - Professional Tool Manufacturing offers a 25% discount for onine purchase of any Drill Doctor.} Must use coupon code TWAi).

Drill bit sets: American Clamp 1/16" – 1/4" plus magnetic holder and screw driver bits - \$4.99. Northern Tool Brand $1/16" - \frac{1}{4}"$ but with torx bits - \$4.99. They also have wooden screw clamps.

Router Bits: Woodcraft has their \$5.00 bits back. These are store brand, 1/2" shank bits. (I recently bought a rabbiting bit just to get the bearing to put on a 1/4" round over bit. Selection is limited, but in my experience these bits are good quality.

Big Lots has gotten a lot of merchandise from Irwin/Rubbermaid lately. Examples: 15' ratcheting band clamp - \$4.99, Corner clam - \$5.99 (This is similar to Bessey corner clamp.)

Lietz Saw Blades: Originally made for Irwin and Delta (both were bought by DeWalt - Black & Decker). On woodnet.net forums go to classified section and look up xcesstooling. These blades were made to compete with Freud, Forrest and others. These are uncoated blades. In 10", they range in price from \$14 for 24 tooth ripping to \$25 80 tooth melamine blade. Cheaper than sharpening!

I tend to design using two contrasting woods and you will find asymmetry, organic shaping, texturing and sometimes other media — metal, glass, ceramics — in my work. Certainly the woodworking greats have influenced me, especially James Krenov and George Nakashima, but my direction is my own. I am not into ornate decoration or furniture as a doctoral thesis of woodworking gimmicks. I just design pieces that I hope will provide beauty, subtlety and pleasure for their owners, while being used as furniture."
