April Meeting – Furniture Construction

Garrett Hack has been a furniture maker and one horse farmer in Thetford Center, Vermont since the late seventies. He specializes in making contemporary interpretations of Federal style furniture with an emphasis on delicate and graceful design, understated surface decorations and a complete dedication to superior joinery and craftsmanship. He is a Contributing Editor for Fine Woodworking Magazine, the author of The Handplane Book (Taunton Press, 1997) and Classic Hand Tools (Taunton Press, 1999) and teaches at a number of woodworking schools throughout the country.

Garrett will give a presentation on furniture construction and a couple of weekend workshops that discuss the topic. Potential workshop topics are precision in furniture making, where Garrett will guide us through a series of exercises with hand tools that will help develop our capabilities - and show us possibilities. The second workshop might entail decorative details such as inlay, fans, ellipses, cockbeads, gold leaf, and using silver in our furniture. Host: Jeff Leimberger

The Presidents Corner

The results of the survey we conducted are in and analyzed. I presented the results to the general meeting and on February 27 then to the board. The board has taken some actions to conform to the priorities expressed in the survey.

You can find some of the detail numbers below, but I would like to focus on only two areas: increased dues and increased membership.

I was asked during the meeting why we are having a problem with expenses now and have not in prior years? I do not think I answered that completely at the meeting. There are three key factors acting on our expense and revenue situation. The major factor is membership. We have just dropped below 200. In 1992 we were at about 400. A second factor is that we have seen the increase in the impact of the general inflation and particularly fees required to bring in guest speakers. These two factors have been pulling on our budget since we reduced the dues from \$35 to \$30.

The board has elected to return the dues to \$35 for renewals, hold the dues at \$35 for new members and still maintain the \$5 reduction for members choosing electronic news letters.

The second action I would like to discuss is the setting of a goal of 250 members by the end of 2006. Increasing membership has more of an impact on revenue than raising dues and most of what we do to achieve this goal makes for a better club. The survey seems to indicate that we need more educational and hands on programs and workshops. Redirecting our programs and workshops will improve our club and attract new members at the same time. We also decided to enhance our Toys for Tots workshops by adding an element of instruction of basic skills at each workshop. Skill building will improve our toy quality and teach us new skills at the same time.

Other areas of focus include possible reinstatement of our annual dinner meeting where we invite spouses and guest to join us, more participation in public activities, increased publicity committee activity, and enhancement of our sponsor list.

I have saved the most important element for increasing membership until last. I am asking each member to recruit one potential member and bring them to a general meeting. If we all do this and we only net a 25% acceptance we will be at our goal of 250 members. As you talk to your friends and neighbors, bring up woodworking. There are hundreds if not thousands of potential members who can benefit from joining our club. Do them a favor and introduce them to Triangle Woodworkers. (*continued on page 4*)

Shop First Aid Hint

When you get a splinter, reach for the scotch tape before resorting to tweezers or a needle. Simply put the scotch tape over the splinter, then pull it off. Scotch tape removes most splinters painlessly and easily.

Lazy Susan Tool Caddy

From the online ShopNotes eZine:



I needed a way to keep small hand tools organized, so I built the caddy shown in the photo at right. And to make it even more useful, it's mounted to a lazy Susan. The lazy Susan is sandwiched between a hardwood base and a piece of $\frac{1}{4''}$ hardboard, as in the drawing below. The caddy is made with pegboard sides held in grooved corner posts. Note: You'll want to make sure the holes in the sides

line up with each other. A ³/₄"-thick bottom screwed to the caddy keeps it square. To divide the space inside the caddy, push ¹/₄"-dia. dowels through the sides. Note: Depending on the size of the dowels, you may need to enlarge the holes in the sides slightly. The extra length of the dowels makes a great place for hanging tools (like the wrenches shown in the photo above) on the outside of the caddy. Finally, I attached a pair of self-adhesive magnetic strips to the outside to hold the smallest tools like small driver bits, a riffler, or a short, metal rule.
