Business:

- 1. **Fred Ford.** Memberships can be signed up for on a pro-rated basis. Currently, the cost of membership to complete the year is \$15. Arlen Scott is liquidating his shop. There will be an announcement in the newsletter for the 7th and 14th of March to go out to buy lumber from his shop.
- 2. **Paul Rolfe**. There will be several SawStop demonstrations on Saturday, March 10 at Klingspor.

Program: Cecil Raynor introduced Paul Gianino. Paul is a furniture maker and restored in Greenville, NC. Paul comes from a long line of woodworkers. Paul presented a fascinating talk about his history on woodworking, various tips from the "old master" on glue-up and repair techniques. He had good information on hide glue techniques, which was of interest to several members.

Arlin Scott Liquidates His Shop

Many of you remember Arlin Scott who we all called Scott. He has declining health and is electing to liquidate his extensive holdings in hard and soft woods as well as his entire wood working shop.

His shop is a 40 x 80 foot two story building and it is full of wood and tools. He also has considerable wood stickered outside. Wood includes, but not limited to, red oak, white oak, popular, hickory, and limited walnut and maple. There is also some construction lumber, some treated.

His workshop defies description. I am confident you will find something you want, you may even need it.

Major tools include a professional heavy duty table saw, jointer, new 3 hp vacuum system, scroll saw and others.

We are scheduling two Saturday dates for you to come and see what you can use and help Scott at the same time. The sale will run from 9:00 AM until noon. Dates are April 7 and April 14. Mark your calendar now. These are currently the only open dates because of Scott's health.

Prices will be set at about 35% of current market prices including volume discounts for lumber. One main goal is to clear the property so feel free to negotiate. Also remember that , besides helping ourselves, we also want to help Scott.

To get to Scott's take I 40 to Exit 266 (North of Chapel Hill). Take 86 south and cross over I 40. Go by the ramp to get back on I 40 and go another 200 feet to turn right on to Eubanks Road. Proceed 1.7 miles and turn left onto Rogers Road. Proceed 1.0 mile and turn left on to Puerfoy Drive. Proceed 0.5 mile and turn right on to Sandberg Lane. The third house on the left is 8012 and you are there.

Super-Sized Beam Compass



Received this jig suggestion via email: In the past, when I had to lay out a large circle or arc, I usually resorted to making a compass specifically for that application. Recently, however, when faced with the prospect of making yet another single-use compass, I decided to build this

adjustable beam compass instead.

The compass consists of a 36" steel rule and two hardwood blocks (*Photo, right*). A pivot block, which holds a steel pin (nail), fits over the end of the rule (*Illustration, below*). And an adjustable marking block with a pencil slips over the edge of the rule. Machine screws, threaded into tapped holes in the wood, secure the blocks to the rule

For safety, the blocks are cut from a single large blank. Rip the blank to width to match the rule (1½" in my case). Then, using the table saw, cut a kerf in one edge to allow the blocks to fit over the rule. The depth of this kerf is sized so when the rule is bottomed out in the marking block, you can still see the increments (*Inset Photo*). Note how the indicator (a kerf made with a handsaw) is used to align the marking block on the rule.


Before cutting the blocks from the blank, drill holes for the pivot pin and a nut that holds a pencil stub. For accuracy, make sure the holes are aligned along the same centerline. Then cut the blocks, glue in the pivot pin and nut with epoxy, and "thread" the pencil into the nut.
