# Arlin Scott Liquidates His Shop

Many of you remember Arlin Scott who we all called Scott. He has declining health and is electing to liquidate his extensive holdings in hard and soft woods as well as his entire wood working shop.

His shop is a 40 x 80 foot two story building and it is full of wood and tools. He also has considerable wood stickered outside. Wood includes, but not limited to, red oak, white oak, popular, hickory, and limited walnut and maple. There is also some construction lumber, some treated.

His workshop defies description. I am confident you will find something you want, you may even need it.

Major tools include a professional heavy duty table saw, jointer, new 3 hp vacuum system, scroll saw and others.

We are scheduling two Saturday dates for you to come and see what you can use and help Scott at the same time. The sale will run from 9:00 AM until noon. Dates are April 7 and April 14. Mark your calendar now. These are currently the only open dates because of Scott's health.

Prices will be set at about 35% of current market prices including volume discounts for lumber. One main goal is to clear the property so feel free to negotiate. Also remember that, besides helping ourselves, we also want to help Scott.

To get to Scott's take I 40 to Exit 266 (North of Chapel Hill). Take 86 south and cross over I 40. Go by the ramp to get back on I 40 and go another 200 feet to turn right on to Eubanks Road. Proceed 1.7 miles and turn left onto Rogers Road. Proceed 1.0 mile and turn left on to Puerfoy Drive. Proceed 0.5 mile and turn right on to Sandberg Lane. The third house on the left is 8012 and you are there.

#### Program

Fred Ford introduced a number of members who talked for a few minutes each about their current projects or jigs.

- 1. Ed Mastin. Showed a number of "Disney" Mirrors (Chippendale) based on a project in Norm Abrams New Yankee Workshop book. Used templates glued onto masonite, then later plastic. Cut moldings on a tablesaw on a bevel to flatten the profile.
- 2. **Paul Staebler.** Carved bowls. Paul splits the log and cuts out the pit area. He uses a chain saw and straight and curved gouges and cranked gougers, plus various scorps.
- 3. **Bruce Wrenn.** High chair. The chair is collapsible and can be reconfigured as a youth chair as the recipient ages. Based on a design from Woodsmith.
- 4. Bill Anderson. Shooting boards and bench hooks for the workbench.
- 5. Charlie Main. High chair
- Ed Miller. Small blanket chest with handcut dovetails, breadboard ends for the top. The breadboard ends have pinned sliding dovetails. Tea Caddy, English style, made of mahogany

veneer and oak with a brass escutcheon lot. The wood was free but the hardware was very expensive.

- 7. **Hugh Fish**. Mahogany tilt top serving table. A high-style table for next to the dining table. The top rotates (like a lazy susan). Made a lathe jig to cut the leg dovetails, a nd also oa router jig to cut the oval top.
- 8. **Mike Reddyhoff.** Cherry Shaker table with dovetailed drawer.
- 9. **Guy Albert.** Wood clock with wooden gears and mechanisms. This was a scaled down (1:5) version of a clock tower clock from Spain. Ade of black walnut and cherry and maple.
- 10. **Max Hayes.** Flag Box. Developed a tablesaw jig to cut the 67.5 degree corners of the box using a vertically set tablesaw blade.
- 11. **Hal Brown**. Miler sled for the chop saw for cutting picture frame with no error in the angle for different widths of members. Hal has a spreadsheet to calculate the angles for frames where ther two corners are not the sae width,
- 12. **Bob Alpert.** Sam Maloof inspired scaled down version of a rocking chair. This was a result of a 6 day workshop at marc Adams School of Woodworking.
- 13. **Pete Bucki.** Work in progress of a bed made of oak with raised panels in the headboards,
- 14. **Chet Nedwidek.** Segmented bowls. Spent some tome on laying out eac ruing of segments.

# Sponsor Highlight: Raleigh Saw

Raleigh Saw was founded in 1948 and located on McCulloch Street in Raleigh. In 1961, Bill Shields began managing Raleigh Saw and in 1963 he and his wife Mary purchased the business. They retired in the mid-1980s and their son Billy ran the business until 2004 and then sold the business to the present owners Kevin and Jane Reetz. The business is growing at 5% per year and the 6-7 employees have a full benefits package including insurance, 401K, and paid vacation.

Raleigh Saw is a full-service sharpening and sales business. In addition to the woodworking and cabinetmaking fields, Raleigh Saw services many other fields including counter tops, metal cutting, tile, stone, concrete, brick , block, food processing, recycling (especially plastic and copper), printing, leather tanning, scientific labs, wood chipping, stump grinding and many more. They also sharpen Zamboni ice rink machine blades which are 84" long.



They sell carbide blades by Amana, Bosch-DML, Freud, Irwin, and Tenryu; router bits by Amana, Bosch, Freud, and Whitesides; and specialty blades by Amana, American, and Freud and many more.

Blades from about a 150 mile radius are trucked in for sharpening (from Emporia, VA to Lumberton and from Washington, NC to Winston-Salem) weekly. Locally, blades left at Capital City Lumber and Woodcraft are sharpened by Raleigh Saw. They sharpen about 600 saw blades every week.



Raleigh Saw is located at 5805C Departure Drive, Raleigh, NC 27616. Telephone (919)832-2248, Fax (919)832-6820, Email: <u>raleighsawllc@aol.com</u>. A web site should be online by mid-summer. From I540 and Capital Blvd, Forest, go South and turn right at Leith Honda onto Oak Forest, then left on Departure Drive, and Raleigh Saw is in the second building on the right.

Before sharpening, blades are cleaned in an ultrasonic tub using eco-friendly solvents. Here is Kevin lifting a rack of cleaned blades.



The two linear grinders have 11.5 ft. and 13 ft. travel respectively. Steel blades (such as jointer and planer knives) are held by an electromagnetic chuck. A new accessory is a rare-earth magnet which is strong enough to hold solid carbide blades like this shaper knife.



One of the green saw blade sharpening machines below is set up for triple-chip blades and the other for ATB blades.



Sharpened blades are coated with plastic to protect both the teeth and the handler.

Carbide teeth are replaced at this station and Raleigh Saw tries to keep the cost to less than 1/3 the price of a new blade.



After tooth replacement, the replaced teeth are ground approximately to size before sharpening.

Bandsaw blades are butt welded and annealed on this machine:

# **New Hand Plane**

#### The End of the Plain Plan By Robin Banks, Woodworker's Journal

Park yourself in front of the TV for a bit, and you are sure to see ads for the latest thing in shaving comfort; razors with two, three, even up to five blades, all touting their ability to cut closer than one. It's easy to imagine Lance A. Boyle, the founder and owner of <u>Mock III Tools</u>, sitting and staring at the tube when the inspiration for his company struck.



"You guessed it," admitted Lance when I asked. "That was indeed my inspiration for the Mock II plane, the precursor to my current Mock III. My final decision to attempt it came after going to a woodworking show and seeing wide belt sanders with two and even three drums. Their first drum would make a rough pass and the second would follow with finer paper. Why not make a plane that does that?"

That is precisely what he did. "The first iteration was a plane with two blades, one set just behind the other. I made one, tried it out and said to myself 'if two is good, three is bound to be better,' so I made a three-blade



version. You set the first blade for а serious hogging cut, then set the second just a hair lower to take a fine cut, and the third one takes a hair's breadth shaving. One push of the plane, and you can go from a rough surface to an ultrasmooth one in just one pass. It not only saves time, it saves money, since one

plane takes the place of three."
