# July Meeting – Build a Bandsaw Box

Hosted by Kay Baker, the July speaker, D L Ames, is a TWA member and an Administrator for www.ncwoodworking.net. He describes himself as an avid woodworking hobbyist with a broad range of interests in the craft. Currently residing in Fayetteville, D L has been serving our Nation as a member of the U.S. Army and will retire after 30-1/2 years of service. D L will discuss design considerations and techniques for building and finishing various styles of band saw boxes ranging from traditional to freeform. He will follow this presentation with a 2-day workshop on Saturday and Sunday (7/21 & 7/22) where participants will have the opportunity to design and build a band saw box in either the traditional or freeform style. His workshop will cover material selection, design considerations, stock preparation, layout, cutting, and assembly with a closing discussion on finishing techniques.

# Getting to the Point – An Opportunity!

Judy Grill needs a woodworker soon to make knitting needles for her business on an ongoing basis. She makes beaded tops for the knitting needles and doesn't need to have wooden tops made for them.

Here's the info on what she needs for the knitting needles:

1. The point and the slant is the most important part about the knitting needles.

2. The knitting needles need to be very smooth, otherwise, they'll cause the yarn to drag and slow down the knitting process.

3. The knitting needles need to be straight & not at all curved.

4. The lengths can be either 10" or 12".

5. The thicknesses can be 10mm, 9mm, 8mm, 6.5mm, 4.5mm. The most popular & needed thicknesses are **6mm**, **5.5mm**, **5mm**.

6. Please use a knitting gauge to get the correct mm sizes. Knitting projects use patterns specifying the exact size for the knitting needles to be used.

7. They may have to be made with a hand plane instead of a lathe. The woodworker can decide.

Woods to be used for the knitting needles:

1. The woods to be used need to be busy-looking, like pearlized or striated.

2. Use straight grain lumber so the knitting needles don't break.

3. The wood used cannot be endangered woods.

4. Some suggested woods are: curly maple, Texas Mesquite (not other mesquites – here's a website to get Texas Mesquite:

http://www.carlinkranch.com/B&B%20Lumber%20Photo s.htm#MESQUITE), palm wood, ebony, rosewood, Spanish cedar, ancient Kauri wood, curly bubinga

5. Maple, bamboo, birch, paduka, bloodwood, oak, wormy maple are not to be used because they're too plain or unusable in some way.

She can pay about \$10 per pair without tops. However, if one of the woods is a lot more expensive than another, it's okay, she'll pay for the difference and prefers better quality knitting needles.

Please contact her if you're interested in making knitting needles for her business.

From that modest beginning, Capitol City Lumber has grown immensely over the past 60 years and serves builders, contractors, woodworkers, DIYers, and many other customer types. The building above houses the showroom, sales counter, administration, and main office.

The current general manager is the founder's grandson Edward Nicholson who succeeded his father Cheyney Nicholson (a longtime TWA member).



Ed first worked at Capitol City Lumber in 1984 and has worked there full time since 1992. Some of his initial duties were delivering and working at the counter. His father Cheyney is still active primarily as a buyer and his sister Edith Morse does outside sales. Capitol City Lumber has 16 employees. Capital City Lumber Company is located in west Raleigh at 4216 Beryl Road, their web site is <u>http://www.capitolcitylumber.com</u>, telephone (919)832-6492, and fax (919)833-1011. Beryl Road runs parallel to Hillsborough Street across from the NC State fairgrounds. From I440, take a Hillsborough Street exit, go one block east, and then turn right onto Beryl Road.

TWA members receive a discount that varies from about 7% to 15%.

Here is the showroom as viewed from Ed's office doorway:



The showroom has a large selection of tools, components, hardware, finishes, and much, much more. One example of specialized components is this display:



The hardwood building has a vast selection of hardwood lumber varieties including afromosia, alder, aromatic cedar, basswood, beech, birch, bloodwood, bocote, bubinga, cherry, cocobolo, ebony, hickory, holly, imbuia. jatoba, iroka, lacewood, leopard wood, lyptus, mahogany, maple, padauk, palm, pink ivory, poplar, purpleheart, red oak, rosewood, sapele, spanish cedar, teak, tupelo, walnut, wenge, white oak, yellowheart, zebrawood and more.





Several other buildings hold products like dried treated lumber, redwood and fir, cement products, mouldings, and Dricon non-combustible dimension lumber and plywood.

Next door in the bottom floor of the Fiber Complex building, Capitol City Lumber is now offering a custom woodworking service. With this new offering you can get services ranging from cutting a piece of plywood to size to getting a complex staircase built to order.

# **Annual MWTCA Meeting**

The annual Midwest Tool Collectors Association (MWTCA) meeting will be held at Ed Hobbs' Farm in Raleigh on Saturday July 28 2007. As in the past, all TWA members that are not MWTCA are invited to attend. Over 275 people attended in 2006.

For those of you who may not be aware, MWTCA is for more than just tool collectors. M-WTCA offers everyone who is interested in antique/traditional hand tools an opportunity to learn more about tools, to buy and sell tools and to interact with others that share this interest.

This year's meeting will begin officially, rain or shine, at 8 AM (some early birds will get here at daybreak) with tool buying/selling/trading. We will have about 45 dealer tables set up under a tent and an equal number of people tailgating under the shade trees. You will be able to find a wide variety of antique and traditional tools for sale at reasonable prices. Coffee, donuts, water and soft drinks will be served in addition to lunch.

A program of interest will be held beginning at 10 AM. After the program, there will be a good old catered pig picken with all the fixings.

When lunch is over, there will be a tool auction open to everyone. We have a collection of about 120 good tools (mostly Stanley planes) There is no buyer's premium. A list can be obtained via e-mail by letting me know.

Our policy for guests is to allow them to attend for \$15 for one time to see what goes on and to find out about the benefits of belonging to MWTCA. If you have attended as a guest before and wish to attend again as a guest you are welcome, however, you will be charged the full meeting cost of \$20. Also, please note that beginning this year there will be a \$5.00 late registration fee added for anyone that has not pre-registered.

To ensure we have adequate food, beverages and facilities, we are again requiring pre-registration. Please complete the form below and send it in so it is received by July 14. ## Shop-Made Center Finder for Round Stock

Hints from the web!

I made this jig to easily find the center on round stock, such as dowels. It's just a triangular frame with a thin plate attached over one half that's used as a marking guide (*Photo, right*). To find the centerpoint, you simply butt the round workpiece into the 90° corner of the frame and



mark a line. Then rotate the stock, and draw a second line. The intersection of the lines is the center of the



stock. The frame and the plate are both made from  $\frac{1}{4}$ " plywood. Lay out the angles on the frame as shown below. Then cut it to shape with a jig

saw or scroll saw. The plate is simply cut to size and then glued to the frame.
