FRIDAY April 18th– Furniture Re-Finishing

Friday night April 18th Alan Noel will present before TWA's regular meeting an over-view of furniture re-finishing and cover the highlights of the two-day course to be held over the weekend.

Alan Noel will be giving a two-day workshop on furniture re-finishing, starting Saturday April 19th and completing on the 20th. The course will take two pieces of restorable furniture through disassembly, repair, reassembly, and preparation for finishing and final finish with a French finish. Location of the workshop will be announced at a later date.

Alan is the proprietor of Noel's Woodworks in Atlanta, Georgia and has been a professional furniture restorer for over 25 years. He has extensive experience in a wide range of finishing techniques. He writes regular columns for *Finishing and Restoration* magazine and for *Highland Hardware* in Atlanta's *Wood News Online™*, he has taught courses at *The Marc Adams School of Woodworking* and has also written for *Wood* magazine. Alan has taught his skills throughout the Southeast and has served as a finishing consultant for various furniture manufacturers.

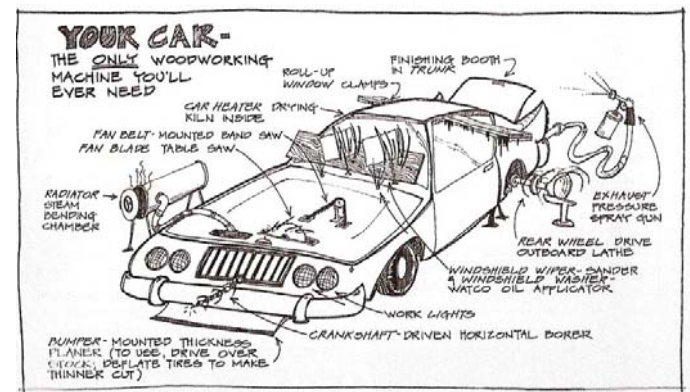
Dog Plaster Paw Print Boxes Wanted

Tuesday July 15; Workshop: None Program Topic: Show 'n Tell Speaker: Various Members

This year's show and tell will feature some of our member's best works. We are asking members to share with the club how they went about design, building and finishing the project. Of particular interest are items that make good gifts. These could range from a simple clock to an elaborate jewelry box. Everyone is encouraged to bring one of his or her favorite projects whether you or someone else made it. Host: Fred Ford

Tuesday August 19; Workshop Saturday August 23 Program Topic; Hand tool Sharpening.

At the Tuesday night program Bill Anderson will demonstrate sharpening of chisels and plane blades using a combination of diamond and Japanese water stones. There will be a discussion of the sharpening techniques for other tools including spoke shaves, drawknives, and scrapers. Bill will show some of the more useful sharpening jigs and guides to aid in getting a sharp edge. You are encouraged to bring your dull tools and your questions for a group discussion on solving those difficult sharpening situations.

The Saturday Workshop will be a hands-on program. Participants are encouraged to bring tools that they want to sharpen including planer blades, chisels, scrapers, or any other woodworking tool requiring a sharp edge. The morning portion of the workshop will include instruction and demonstration on the basic techniques and principles of preparing a sharp edge on a tool. This will include flattening the back and determining an appropriate bevel. We will cover water stone, oilstone, diamond stone, and sandpaper sharpening. We will use a grinder to rough shape an edge and then explore the quickest and most efficient means to achieve a final edge. In the afternoon participants will work on their particular tools and to evaluate their results on some wood. Host: Brian Wagner

Tuesday September 16 Program Topic: Social/Toys For Tots KickoffSpeaker: Jeff Mills

Our September program will be the kick off for our 2008 Toys for Tots campaign. Advanced Dovetail Joinery

Dates: April 5

This workshop is for those with previous experience in dovetailing. Choose from variable spacing, houndstooth, mitered half blind, mitered full blind, Japanese styles. We will focus on two advanced joints, although we will study a number in detail.

Advanced Mortise and Tenon Joinery

Dates: April 6 Cost: \$80

This workshop is for those with previous experience in mortise and tenon joinery. Choose from through pinned or wedged, tusk tenon, mitered slip tenon, half lap tenon, etc. We will focus on two advanced joints, although we will study a number in detail.

Traditional Molding Plane

Dates: May 3-4 Cost: \$160

Make a simple side escapement molding plane using traditional tools and floats. Students will make and fit a plane blade and will use this plane to cut a piece of molding. We will explore several different methods of shaping the profile of a molding plane including scratch stock, mother planes and a variety of other types of planes. We will also cut and shape, harden and temper the blade for the plane.

All About Chisels

Dates: May 10 Cost: \$80

We will explore the types and uses of many chisels including bevel edge, registered, dovetail, sash, mortise, paring, dog-leg, in-cannel and out-cannel and Japanese. How to sharpen chisels, how to restore or modify flea-market finds, and what to look for in purchasing a set of chisels.

Hand Cut Moldings

Date: May 11 Cost: \$80

The focus of this workshop is to be able to make short lengths of moldings and apply decorative edging to workpieces using molding planes and specialty planes. These skills will allow you to reproduce any profiles you might desire, and to modify them to suit your purposes. We also work with scratchstock to achieve these ends as well.

Bench Planes Skills and Techniques

Dates: May 31-June 1 Cost: \$160

Explore the range and usefulness of bench planes for handtool woodworking. Hands-on experience will cover scrub, smooth, jack, try, fore and jointer planes and all types of block planes. Restoration, sharpening, tune up of planes is covered in detail. For students taking the Special Planes workshop, we will dimension lumber for a project to be completed in that workshop.

Minutes of TWA meeting March 18,2002.

63 members in attendance.

President Fred Ford opened the meeting at 7.30 and introduced new members and guests. He referred to the new layout for the meeting which had been prompted by negative comments in a recent thread on www.ncwoodworker.net and thanked the members who had contributed additional tv monitors and speakers and those who had constructed the new viewing platform.

Rick Cornell handed out name badges to new members. He also introduced the idea of creating separate special interest groups (SIGs) that would meet at different members' workshops to pursue specific occupations – scroll saw for example. This would enhance an individual's skill level and create a bond between members. Rick referred to the practice of meeting for dinner prior to the monthly meeting as another opportunity to bond with other members.

Mike Reddyhoff asked for volunteers to assist with making about 50 small boxes to contain plaster casts of dog paw prints. These have been requested by the "Bark Around the Park " organization at Millbrook Exchange Park.

Cecil Raynor reported an insufficient response to the Kaleidoscope making workshop and if he did not receive more checks tonight the workshop would have to be cancelled.

Charles Main referred to the number of committees in Wake County Council each of which held meetings and presumably required a gavel and block. He suggested that the purchasing authority for the council might be receptive to having locally made gavels of local wood and thought that making them might be a suitable and profitable club activity. Charles agreed to make further enquiries in furtherance of this idea.

Mark Keglars reported that he and some other professional shops were holding a Woodworker's Yard Sale of surplus tools and equipment at his shop on April 5. Flyers advertising the sale were handed out and a tentative list of items was circulated.

Brian Wagner reminded us that the April meeting will be on Friday 18 and said our speaker, Alan Noel will be presenting a program on Furniture Refinishing. He described the work of the presenter and circulated a sign-up sheet for the workshop which will be on April 19 & 20 at Dave Mackie's shop.

Fred asked those not wearing their name badges to stand and admonished them. He explained what actions the club board was taking to improve the club and referred to our involvement in the North Carolina Woodworking Showcase to be held at Klingspor's Woodworking Shop on April 26.

Fred went on to demonstrate the preferred method of hanging chairs after the meeting.

Bruce Wren introduced our speaker Gus Stefureac who was perhaps best known to the club as the Apollo spray systems demonstrator. Gus talked about the history of scroll saws, showed samples of work done and described his experience in several years of exhibiting at NC State Fair and demonstrations nationally. He strongly recommended Hegner scroll saws and suggested a #5 reverse tooth blade tuned to middle C to produce cuts that did not require subsequent sanding. Fred thanked our speaker for his talk and the meeting ended at 9.00.
