We had a great turn out for our last meeting – 112 people turned up to enjoy Roy Underhill's presentation and they were not disappointed. Roy's slide show and commentary on the evolution and early



manufacture of screws was erudite and entertaining and his reminiscences of his uncle – the radio woodworker – was, well, highly entertaining. We were very fortunate to be able to secure The TV Woodwright as a speaker and I must thank Bill Anderson for arranging this.

The large number of visitors attests to the diligent publicity work by Larry Hendrick who had notices published in all the local news media editions. Recent publicity has also netted us several new members and if you see anyone with a colored spot on his badge holder then he is a new member so please make him welcome. (Or her if it happens not to be a him).

Toys for Tots season is drawing near and it's not too early to start thinking about what you want to make. If anyone is prepared to host a workshop – or two or three – for group toy making sessions please see me as I am scheduling production.

Jim McNeill appealed for donations of handmade items for a silent auction to be held on June 27th to support the restoration of the Panther Branch Rosenwald School in Wake County. I personally had no idea what a Rosenwald school was and perhaps I am not alone in this. So I looked it up.

The Julius Rosenwald Fund

In the 1910s, Chicago philanthropist Julius Rosenwald, president of Sears, Roebuck and Co., prompted by Booker T Washington, became aware of the sad state of education among African Americans in the rural South. His response was establishment of a fund that provided architectural plans and matching grants that

helped build more than 5,300 schools from Maryland to Texas between the late 1910s and 1932, over 500 in North Carolina. In the 60s/70s many of these were abandoned, fell into disrepair and some disappeared altogether.

Jim's group, JLBC Community Alliance, Inc, is undertaking the restoration of one of these schools locally hence the appeal for donations to support the effort. This is a worthy community project and if you have any handmade item you would care to donate – large or small – bring it along to the next meeting on June 16.

When I read my comments in last month's newsletter about leaving projects unfinished I was frankly embarrassed and had to face my conscience squarely. Minutes from the TWA meeting May 19th, 2009

Mike Reddyhoff: TWA received a letter of appreciation from George Thomas, Director of the NCSU Craft Center for our work on the woodshop tool crib. Leon Harkins made a wooden plaque which will be affixed to the crib, acknowledging TWA's contribution.

Fred Ford: The Toys for Tots program has been going on for 23 years now, with a total of over 53,000 toys made by the membership for needy children. Fred showed some of the toys that had been made. Sign up for workshops will be next month. Mike Reddyhoff will coordinate the sign up for these workshop and Scott Miller will handle the logistics and getting of needed materials and parts.

Paul Rolf: Paul discussed his upcoming furniture carving workshop. The program will be on the regular Tuesday night meeting (June 16th), and the 2-day workshop will be the following weekend (June 20th-21st). Enrollment in the workshop is limited to 6-7 people. A waiting list will be established. If there is enough interest for a second session of this workshop, Paul will consider this (note: currently 7 people are signed up for this workshop).

Mike Reddyhoff: Mike sent around sign up sheets for a registry of possible mentors on any subject. This registry would include the person's name, their skills, and their willingness to travel. This would be a resource for members who are looking to learn a particular skill.

Jim McNeil: The JLBC Community Alliance Inc, a 503c entity, is working to restore the Rosenwall-Panther Branch Grant School. The Rosenwall schools were established in the 1900's in rural locations for the education of Blacks. Panther

Branch was built in 1926 and is a State Historical Landmark (listed in 2001). On June 27 (10am to 4 pm) there will be a community day at the school to get the community involved in the restoration of this school. There will also be a silent auction for fundraising purposes. Contributions to this silent auction are tax deductible. Jim is asking TWA members to contribute handmade items for this worthy purpose. bill Anderson introduced **Roy Underhill**, who presented a wide ranging program of historical notes, and amusing stories. The first half of the program was a historical review of the origin of screws and screwmaking devices, particularly as relates to wooden bench vise screws. Of particular interest was the image of a French sawmill of 1235 based on a screw. The 3D and animation of Roy's presentation was spectacular. After refreshments, Roy regaled the audience with amusing stories and demonstrations. Roy demonstrated a reproduction of a passer drill which was used to make the inlets for the ornate brass inlays of squares. The program ended with a rousing call (straight from a tent revival) to just say "No!" to power tools.

UPCOMING WORKSHOPS

EDWARDS MOUNTAIN WOODWORKS

fine handtool woodworking: creating and teaching in wood

Please note: Members of TWA, WGNC, MWTCA and EAIA are eligible for a discount on workshop fees.

Classes are limited to a maximum of 3 people and generally are intensive exercises on a topic, lasting one or two days from 9 am to 5 pm. Each student has their own workbench. A tool list and a class manual accompany each class. Lunch is provided each day. One day workshops are \$80 and two day workshops are \$160. Generally, all tools and materials are supplied, though there may be an additional materials fee for some classes.

Wallhung Shelf with Handtools.

June 27-28 We will construct a simple French cleat hung shelf, with a through dovetailed frame, handcut dadoes, tongue and groove backing set in hand cut rabbets. We will use molding planes and scratch stock to apply decorative edges. Some handcut dovetail experience would be very useful. This workshop is conducted at the Woodcraft Store, Raleigh NC. (http://www.woodcraft.com)

Sharpening and Using Handsaws. May 31

Hands on experience sharpening rip and cross cut handsaws. We will explore the anatomy and purposes of various types of handsaws, how to clean up and restore handsaws. We will look at various types of jigs and gauges useful for sharpening, and evaluate different types of sawsets. We will spend part of the day developing handsaw skills using rip, crosscut panel saws and rip and cross cut tenon saws, as well as using saw horses and bench hooks for sawing.

Fan Back Windsor Chair. July 10-17 Construct a fan back Windsor chair entirely with hand tools while honing tool skills and learning joinery techniques. Split a log, shape the crest and spindles with drawknives and spokeshaves, hollow the seat using inshaves and travishers, and assemble the chair using hand drills. This workshop is conducted at John C. Campbell Folk School, Brasstown, NC. (http://www.folkschool.org)

The annual Midwest Tool Collectors Association (MWTCA) meeting will be held at Ed Hobbs' Farm in Raleigh on Saturday July 25 2009. As in the past, all TWA members that are not MWTCA are invited to attend. Over 275 people attended in 2008 including a number of TWA members and friends. For those of you who may not be aware, MWTCA is for more than just tool collectors. M-WTCA offers everyone who is interested in antique/traditional hand tools an opportunity to learn more about tools, to buy and sell tools and to interact with others that share this interest.

This year's meeting will begin officially, rain or shine, at 7 AM (some early birds will get here at daybreak) with tool buying/ selling/trading. We will have about 45 dealer tables set up under a tent and an equal number of people tailgating under the shade trees. You will be able to find a wide variety of antique and traditional tools for sale at reasonable prices. There are plans for a "reverse auction" where the tools will start out at a certain price and the price will drop each hour until all items are sold!!

A program of interest will be held beginning at 10 AM. After the program, there will be a good old catered pig picken with all the fixings. Coffee, donuts, water and soft drinks will be served in addition to lunch which is included in your registration fee. When lunch is over, there will be a regular tool auction open to everyone.

Our policy for guests is to allow them to attend for \$15 for one time to see what goes on and to find out about the benefits of belonging to MWTCA. If you have attended as a guest before and wish to attend again as a guest you are welcome, however, you will be charged the full meeting cost of \$20.

To ensure we have adequate food, beverages and facilities, we are again requiring pre-registration. Please complete the form below and send it in so it is received by July 18.
