

#### Subject: Handcrafted Windsor Chairs Speaker: Elia Bizzarri

Elia builds Windsor chairs the old-fashioned way, like the 18th century way! This incredibly gifted chair maker works out of his shop near Pittsboro, NC. He teaches Windsor chair making at various schools, including the Woodwright's School in Pittsboro. His chairs are amazingly comfortable, and in this presentation he will show us how he shapes and bores the seats that are an integral part of that comfort.



 $\sim\sim\sim$  On a clear autumn morning, a friend and I search the woods for the perfect windfallen oak or hickory log. We cut the log, split it up

where it falls and haul it home. The wood has hardly missed its leaves before it finds itself part of a heautiful chair.

The woodworking tools and techniques I use are many centuries old. All the items I make bear the marks of my hand tools. The quiet of my shop is reminicent of a pre-industrial country woodshop. Like 18th century woodworkers I use safe, non-toxic finishes that protect your health, my health and the health of our planet.

The feel of a razor sharp drawknife slicing pungent oak shavings from a chair spindle... the sight of long ribbons of fresh maple flying off the lathe to land in a pile of curls at my feet... these are the pleasures of my life.~~~

presented by Jerome Bias. Thomas Day was a master cabinet maker and a free man of color in the antebellum south, not exactly the best place to be. Mr. Day not only managed to overcome the short comings of his position and survive but he also built a very prosperous business and was considered to be an outstanding member of the

community. Jerome covers all of this and more, highlighting his skill in the design and build of furniture and homes. The North Carolina Museum of History has an excellent display of Mr. Day's furniture some of which even include the original bill of sale. The presentation has over one hundred examples of his work and will be on display thru November. The display is well worth the trip to the museum.



## Leg vise Workshop

At the May meeting, I showed a wooden leg vise that I designed and several members asked "When's the work-shop?".

In response, Cecil Raynor and I (Mike Payst) are planning a two-day leg-vise workshop during July or August at Cecil's workshop in North Raleigh.

The proposed cost will be around \$75 with wood and hardware included. We will have a sign-up sheet at the June TWA meeting. Attendance will be limited to six participants.

Attendees can choose between a wooden flywheel actuator with a knob (as shown) or a conventional wooden tommy bar. Vise height and parallel guide (the board with the many holes)

location can be varied to suit your existing or proposed bench. The vise leg is 5" square and made of 4 plies of SYP.

Wooden leg vises had been used for centuries and then fell out of favor. I got hooked on leg vises after building a Ruobo-style workbench (see Oct. 2010 TWA newsletter) that included a leg vise last year.


My first leg vise did not work as smoothly as I would have liked and since then I have been refining the design. Changes include an Acme screw, two ball bearings, and a wooden flywheel actuator. The vise chop hangs from the screw on a ball bearing thus unloading the chop's weight from the parallel guide.

After the workshop, what would you do with what you built? Here are a couple of ideas:

You could build a bench around your leg vise by sawing a tenon on the top and adding two mortices for your base's rails.

Or, I clamp my leg vise in my workbench's end vise and use it as a face vise. Also, I can hold long boards


