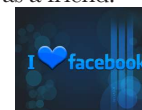

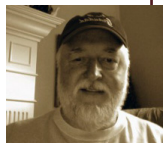

Thankfully, we are blessed with an outstanding group of dedicated members who have stepped forward, some for multiple years, to carry on the myriad of details it takes to run this club. It is this type of unselfish dedication that makes TWA successful. One example is Allan Campbell. A special thanks to Allan for his most accomplished leadership as President the past couple of years.

- ❖ In 2005 NASA satellite imagery estimated there are 400 billion 246 million trees on planet Earth or approximately 61 trees per person.

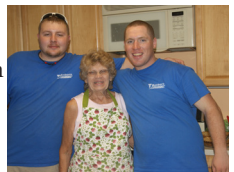
