# Meeting Minutes

October President Diane Philyaw greeted members and guests and started the meeting with her traditional meet & greet.

#### Announcements:

Next month (November 9th) is last T4T (Toys for Tots) at Bill's workshop, Sue Eckard is "closing up shop".

Kay Baker is working very hard to institute a new policy for calculating attendance at the TWA by having us turn in our badges at the end of the meeting.

We now have a card reader to take credit cards for memberships and donations.

Members agree that it is "welcoming" to have Kay at the entrance to Klingspor handing out the (collected) badges and greeting every person coming through the door.

Don't forget our speaker is Mark Todd next month, a nationally known woodworker.

Our calendar nearly complete for 2014 including 4 workshops. See newsletter page 6 of the newsletter.

We are collecting donations for T4T tonight, the goal being to collect \$200, which Mark Keglers will match. Kegler has a co-op shop of 11,000 square feet in Raleigh with multiple craftsmen, Mark specializes in architectural moldings.

9 lifetime members, 3 are active. Diane, Ed & Tina Mastin are active. The wife of one of our founding father is kept up to date with club activities. The policy of lifetime members ended with Diane's induction in 2001 there are no plans to enroll anyone else in this program. Lifetime members are not a club liability

#### Show and Tell:

One of our new members Mac McCarson brought a show and tell for us, a device called a jack clamp-a hoist, a jack and a clamp made by the Lerner Thomas tool company.

Diane demonstrated a handy socket wrench that has multiple size apertures enclosed in a small hand-held device.

Pete Bucky introduced the topic for the evening of "Mistakes We Have Made and Corrected".

First demo was Mac's double locking mortise and tenon table with accessory shelves/bench. It was made as an accessory to a changing table. It was a very attractive piece easily disassembled and assembled.



Fred Ford demonstrated a step stool made with hand cut dovetails-a gap in the mortise can be filled with a wedge of wood that is tapered and forced in the gap.

Fred also brought his furniture restoration kit, he places a glass plate on any

furniture (wood) he is refinishing and mixes the color to match on top of the glass. Ingenious! He uses oil based artist paint to get the match.

> Diane brought a plaque started by her dad that needs carving/finishing, she needs advice on how to proceed.

#### We broke for refreshments.

Bernie Brogdon next demonstrated a woodcarving problem,

involving a knot (as an aside he mentioned that it is often easy to deviate intentionally or unintentionally in carving) and a gnome. The knot in the wood extended to the eye he

was creating and left a defect. He thought of several fixes and presented this to the membership for a vote! Bernie will carve a "pirate" eye patch for the defect! He put in a plug for the Woodcarver's Association, which meets on the 2nd Sunday of

the month at Klingspor from 2-4pm.

Jeff talked about the damage he did to his cutting board with a tool and discussed patching: important issues are grain and color, inlay, also the shape of the inlay. Important to consider the finishes affect on the wood too! Laminating the surface will hide the defect, Cecil Raynor contributed. Making the problem symmetrical will also some-

times conceal the defect.

Pete demonstrated a table he made for his house. He said the top was from a piece of wood that had split and he had glued,

but you could not see the split in the finished piece. He also spoke about his error in measurement as the width varies from end to end. The moral of the story is as usual, don't rush, measure twice and

> dry fit everything! You couldn't tell from our angle.

During Bill's life his passion for wood pushed him to opened his own business which he named "Bill's Woodshed". For many years Bill and

Bill's love of God and his family helped him create a line of both religious items and children's toys. Wife Sue and daughter Diane (our club president) kept the business alive for many years after Bill's passing till both were struck with health issues.

Bill passed in 1998. He was a very active club member and was devoted to the T4T program.
