

Whether they are toddlers or teens every child deserves a little Christmas!



Christmas is a holiday that begs for wooden craft decorations. The Christmas season provides the perfect opportunity for wood craftsmen to practice their art. With the number of woodworking projects appropriate to this time of year, the hardest part for wood craftsmen is choosing which projects to work on. The good news is that it's never too early to start Christmas woodworking projects. Starting early will ensure you have these special holiday wood crafts done in time.

Some ideas:

Christmas Bells: Bells are a big part of the Christmas celebration. Bells made from wood make great decorations and are suited for handing down from one generation to

Ornaments: Personalized Christmas ornaments for the family make great gifts and can be hung on the tree each year. Use a wood-engraving pen to add Christmas patterns and family names to the ornaments you make.

Santa and Friends: Make wooden representations of Santa Claus, Frosty the Snowman, and Rudolph and the gang. Add a wooden sleigh packed with Christmas gifts to the mix.

Yard Decorations: Yard decorations for Christmas are easy to make. You can use large pieces of cheap plywood to draw life-size images of Santa, a snowman, a reindeer, an elf, or any other Christmas character, then cut them out with a power saw and paint them. Use stain to make your decorations resistant to weather, then attach wooden stakes to the back of them and plant them all over your yard.

You can purchase plans or make your own. Use your computer or freehand your drawing. A really good resource for character crafts for the holidays is coloring books. You would be amazed at how many good ideas there are on coloring book pages.

Don Stevenson Birdhouse workshop 25th January with our General Club meeting Friday the 24th. We are building a replica of the Mordecai toolshed (the original is at Peace College). Don will be leading the workshop -- his bird houses will cost us \$30/ they sell for \$250. The workshop will be the last TWA event held at Sue & Diane's shop in Creedmoor.

Roy Underhill will come to our party for Christmas, **HOORAY**. Laughs will be had.

Pete Bucky announced that Gus Stefureac is not doing well. He was a very active long time member of TWA and is in the hospital.

Mark Keglers has several hundred board feet of maple and cherry and white ash up for sale. Also he is adding another 12,000 square feet of space, he may have room for 3 more individuals to locate to (he has cabinet making capability and a spray booth). His contact # is 919-608-7220

Auction tonight will be a Jet bandsaw (start bidding \$50), other donations drawer lock, and door building bits, several gates, and bandsaw blades of assorted sizes.

Show and Tell:

Mike Payst had show and tell-he made a prototype of a portable leg vise that will stand by itself very similar to his bench mounted leg vise.

Chuck brought in a tool to identify, it was a little mysterious. Looked like a huge plumb-bob.

One of our other members made a beautiful table out of scrap wood

Program:

Mark Todd is our speaker, he is a co-owner of Hill Country Woodworks in Chapel Hill.

Topic is Designing Furniture with Curves, Furniture with Simple Curves, and Curves that are Sinusoid (need center point), Circular and Elliptical Arcs. Organic Curves.

There are cut and bent curves (dry bending, steam bending and bent lamination). Can curf cut wood. Mark uses MDF to make patterns for bending

He gave us the formula to calculate the radius of a circle x2+y2/2y=r. Mark uses often. CAD programs will calculate this for you.

To draw an ellipse, use a string held between 2 nails on a hard surface.

You can use an elliptical jig for measuring and for cutting with a router. Mark's advice is to play around with it if you want to make a jig.

Hardest part of S curves is to get the 2 parts to join smoothly in the center. Draw a line, place the end of your compass at the end of the line and then put the pencil on the spot where the circle meets the line, then move your compass point to the line and draw away. Keep the length of the compass uniform. Mark has a "square" FOR CIRCLES.

He uses poly urethane glue (both surfaces) for bent laminations and yellow glue for other joints. Yellow glue allows creeping. You might use a plastic resin.

Long discussion on glues ensued.

After the refreshment break we talked about bending plywood, there are several kinds.

General Finishes armaseal (urethane oil blend) is Hill Country's favorite finish.

Seal project with 1/2 pound shellac in 1 gallon alcohol, then coat with General Finishes. Last coat wipe on and wipe off and buff to fill in steel wool sanded coat.

Everyone was pleased with the presentation.

Terrific design of interlocking posts with head and foot board and bed bottom interconnecting with rails and stiles in a mitered corner. Turned ball on posts with recess in bottom of posts for stacking (2 beds can be stacked as bunk beds... albeit that wasn't a primary goal)

Don Stevenson Comes Back To Teach The New And Enhace The Old

Some of you will remember Don Stevenson's visit in 2001 when about twenty of us made a birdhouse from the design of the *Rutherford County Hen House c. 1897* once near Forest City, NC. Mine remains in prominently displayed on my back porch. Although these priceless reproductions are designed as birdhouses, they are really too good to be

subjected to the weather. Retail prices go from \$225 (for the birdhouse we will make) into the thousand's (\$\$'s) for birdhouses that Don will give you the skills to make.

I am happy to announce that Don has agreed to come back to give the skill needed to construct these unique copies of history and to expand on the skills from our last workshop. These bird houses will make excellent presents to your family, friends, and any club members you love.

The Mordecai Herb Garden Tool House has been selected to build at this workshop. That structure will give those who were in the earlier workshop some new approaches to replicating a structure...a clapboard structure with a rived shingle roof. This is a bird-house...the actual building stands at the rear of Mordecai Plantion in the fenced herb garden near Peace College.

This tool house has an important Raleigh/Wake County connection.

The unique three dimensional line and form of Don Stevenson's hand sculpted birdhouses and bird feeders, all scaled replicas of old buildings from our vanishing rural roadside scene, are skillfully crafted with Stevenson's knowledge of early rural construction methods, and his study of applied primitive hand tools. Each of these works of contemporary *American folk art* present the visual effects of those hand tools together with the hand painted effect of decades of weather and decay as evidenced on the exposed surface of each building's exterior; an artistic visual accomplishment in miniature detail.

Don Stevenson's work is a preservation of these treasured rural icons: barns, farm outbuildings, rural churches, country stores, law offices, old wells and spring houses, all true representations of generations past and heirlooms for generations to come that can be

found in valued collections throughout America.
