

Announcements:

Roger requested that all of us fill out a Program Interest Survey so we can start scheduling speakers for next year. Roger did let us know that Brian Boggs is on board and Michael Fortune will possibly be here next year (he was supposed to be here this Friday). We also have a fourth generation cabinet maker from Va. coming in May 2015, a well known artisan from the Heath family. We are planning to send an e-mail to each member prior to our meetings with an update on the upcoming topic. (This is in addition to the newsletter). Next month Jay Cash will present on finishing.

Pete Bucki announced he would auction off some items tonight on behalf of Toys for Tots, along with the \$250 raffle and the \$25 auction. Up for auction were a Chippendale cherry cradle, a mahogany jewelry chest and an oak clock. He also thanked Terry Brown for helping to get that large lathe that had been donated to the club to Pete's house, where it was stored and later sold for \$550. (It was worth approximately \$1750). This money will benefit the Toys for Tots program. Incidentally, workshops for this program are already up and running.

We are now getting more used to collecting and turning in our name tags at the door, and Kay and Judy appreciate our cooperation.

Mac McCarson suggested that all of us bring a buddy to meetings, in particular young persons, to help support and expand membership. There was general agreement about that and a discussion opened up about how to increase our membership. Having great programs is a result of not just the hard work of the programs committee, it could not happen without dues.

Show & Tell:

Show and tell was a good one. Bob Allen presented a replica of some railings (along with pictures) he recently installed in his

home of a contemporary nature. It represented 4 months of steady work and looked masterly.

Bernie passed around some articles of interest to us of a creative nature including an interesting one on boxes used to house cremains.

Jim Wilder mentioned that there is a company known as Renovo that is building parts for old (Delta) equipment. www. renovoparts.com

Program:

Mike Payst was introduced as the evenings speaker. Although he was a replacement for our previously scheduled speaker, he came well prepared. Mike has been a club member since the 90's so he has had plenty of time to develop and share his many vices. I mean vises. He is always working on improvements (sic) to his vices. I mean vises. He spoke tonight about Wooden Jawed vises with metal hardware. Leg vises are the largest and tallest vises. The Moxon vise, more of a bench vise, was invented by a Frenchman in the late 1600's. Vive la France. Mike expounded on the leg vise anatomy. Mike's first leg vise was made in 2010! He was not happy with it. For details on making these leg vises you must attend one of Mike's workshops. His major piece of advice is to remember that one clamp is a pivot but 2 are needed to hold a board still. His first vise was from a Woodsmith Publication, it was quite nice for holding large objects for planing. Mike has pioneered the use of bearings as opposed to nuts for allowing the long screw that tightens the vise to move smoothly. He has been generous with sharing his ideas with others and his workshops are always well attended. He and other members of TWA have lent their vises to workshops that the club has hosted and they have proved invaluable.

During the break Pete held the auction and bidding was more spirited than in the past. The kits were very desirable. Diane bid on and won the cradle for \$45 and Joe won the mahogany jewelry box for \$70, the oak clock went for \$100 to another member (name?). I'm sure our treasurer Jack Kite got his name!

Mike continued with his demonstration of the bench vise he made. He demonstrated how the two Moxon vises he brought operate. To totally understand these instruments you should make one, at least. The beauty of these vises is that they can clamp tapered objects easily and the use of bearings in holding the screws allows for freedom and smoothness of movement. They just make some work easier!

Mike's presentation was very interesting and his workshops will be well attended. We all would like vices like his. I mean vises.

Program Interest Survey Results

$m{A}_{t}$ our last TWA meeting we conducted a brief survey asking members to rate their interest on a scale of 1-5, with 5 being greatest) in each of the following types of programs for the coming year.
"How to" presentations on woodworking techniques (joinery, dovetailing, glue-ups, etc.)
Informational programs on topics such as finishing, wood selection, glues, etc.
Carving techniques, types of carving, decorative arts, etc.
Woodworking hand tools – selection, use, care, etc.
Woodworking power tools – selection, use, value, etc.
Information and skill sharing among members
Project design in woodworking

Our objective in conducting the survey was to use the results to provide direction for Program Planning for the coming year.

We calculated the percentage of responses for each interest rating for all of the proposed program types. The results of the survey can be summarized as follows.

The program types most frequently rated highest (5 or 4) were the following:

- (88%) "How to" presentations on woodworking techniques
- (83%) Information and skill sharing among members
- (75%) Informational programs on topics such as finishing, wood selection, glues, etc.

Responses to the request for specific program suggestions were quite helpful. We now have a long list of suggestions to generate ideas for program planning.

Thanks to everyone who responded to the survey questions. This information is extremely valuable, as our goal is to maximize the relevance of TWA programs to our members.
