November A relatively large gathering was present, and the meeting was called to order promptly at 7 p.m. by Roger Sanwald, Vice President

Announcements:

2014

Roger reported on the Interest Survey - passed around at the October meeting. Survey results show that the topic that interested most of us is HOW to do things. Knowledge is empowerment and TWA members want "a take home message".

Steve Wall Lumber Company in Mayodan, NC was mentioned as a possible presenter. The owner, Steve, hosted a program about 2 years ago that was well received. Visit the website for his company,

Fred gave a status report on Toys for Tots. Because Creedmoor has "gone away" we have 12 Workshops operating elsewhere. Our meeting in December is on the 9th at our normal Klingspor site; we will host a pot luck at that time, and review the toys produced and share in fellowship. A sign up sheet for food for this event was passed around.

Pete Bucki has 12 tickets left for the \$250 gift certificate to Klingspor's (to raise funds for T4T). There are only 50 being sold.

Everyone should have gotten an e-mail about tonight's meeting and subject. Because our newsletter editor is also our president we all



know and understand why the newsletter is coming out so close to our meeting date. We should feel lucky it is coming at all. Till she is able to return to getting the newsletter out the first part of the month we will send out an e-mail to all registered club members about that months meeting.

Show & Tell:

Kick started tonight by Bob Allen, who reported on a series of UNC (PBS) programs called A Craftsman's Legacy. He received a good tip for gluing - when a glue-up slips, sprinkle a little salt in the glue.

Drogram:

Fred introduced Jay Cash our speaker who works for Finish Pros. He will share his tips for turning out a great looking project. Jay gave a handout on finishing. Finishing is a complex endeavor. Apparently you shouldn't just grab a can and go! It's really quite like applying makeup when you get older! A finish needs to be built up, and you need to practice this. You have to understand the chemicals and how they interact. And you must learn from your mistakes. Jay encourages spending more time on finishing, it is the first thing noticed about a piece.

You should start thinking about your finish when you pick out your wood. For instance, if your piece of wood has 2 different shades or colors, do not discard the wood but color it to match. Exotics are hard to stain, they are often full of oil. You can wash them with diluted acetone, then put on a coat of Shellac (sticks to everything). 50-50 denatured OH and shellac (dewaxed shellac) (Zinsser). Use Naptha on a regular wood finish and shoot it with Shellac, this will clean it up.

How will your piece of wood be used? Is it a dining room table that could get wet? Jay brought out a Taklon brush (very fine) for use with shellac. You need a brush that will hold lots of fluid. An even better brush is a badger hair brush. All brushes need to be "charged" before you use it. High gloss finish demands perfection in flattening the finish. Use up to 3500 grit sandpaper and then use a buffing compound.

Consider the stain color desired. Light woods like maple and cherry will blotch if not properly prepared. Start with light colored undertone, seal it and then start deepening the color.

We moved on to sanding techniques. Jay emphasized that you cannot skip grits, you need to get out ALL the scratches. Time consuming... yes ... BUT... necessary, all you need to get to is 180 grit on the surface (note, the color is equalized if you go 1 grit higher on the edges, up to 220). Never cross grain, watch pigtails, or pressing too hard with sander, and keep your equipment clean -- it does matter. You can tell you are done sanding if you mark the finish with a pencil and then sand and repeat.

At the break, Mike Payst drew the winner of the regular \$25 raffle, #849, Bob Gabor. The winner of the \$250 T4T gift certificate was Craig Mitchell. Congrats to both!!!

Jay moved on to wood preparation. Always study your wood! For instance, knots that figure the wood, accidental dents. etc. Jay uses wood epoxy sticks to fill in wood and tries to color it about the same color that the final product is desired to be, they will pick up SOME stain. There are a lot of markers on the market for coloring. There are burn in sticks - a little knife (Mohawk) blade is heated and melts the product into the defect. It's like a butane lighter. We discussed blotchiness, the size of the pores in the wood is what produces the blotching, if the pore size of the wood is uneven, then the pigment is absorbed at different rates.

One of the cardinal rules of finishing is *repeatability*. Jay writes his recipes on the back of his wood samples and saves them for future use. He gave us numerous recipes for mixing colors. He gave us the characteristics of topcoats as well. If you read and can understand the charts he gave us it will help in predicting the outcome of certain products. At the end of the presentation he was asked if he would be willing to return and add a workshop. Finishing is a hot topic and Jay is knowledgefilled on the subject.

Thanks to Paul Holzworth, and with Mr. Cash's permission, the handouts from his most excellent presentation on finishing are posted in the Member's Only area of the TWA website under the "Presenters Area" page.
