From King Tut's Tomb to the tea and spice trade, mid-century Denmark and Ikea, \$5,000 Christian Dior handbags to the carriage that Prince Harry & Meghan Markle rode off in a couple of months ago, chair caning was and IS a THRIVING art. You will get up close and personal with a variety of styles of weaving and materials. This is an interactive presentation with some hands-on weaving of laced cane, Danish cord, and Shaker tape chairs. (You are welcome to bring your chair or a photo of your chair for advice!)



TWA GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING—SEPTEMBER 18, 2018 TURNING CHRISTMAS TREE ORNAMENTS — ALAN LELAND

(meeting minutes: Janet Batker)

Jeff Leimberger introduced Alan Leland, our speaker and esteemed member, who demonstrated how to turn Christmas ornaments. He recently taught a class in Wilmington, and you can email Alan at alan@alanleland.com if you want a handout of this procedure. Alan is observant of safety rules and usually wears a face shield and glasses when turning. He started off fashioning a globe which he hollowed out (he

likes a 1 3/4 globe). Then he rolled a bead with bevel contact on either side of the center of the sphere. A turning tip: woodturners should move around a lot and not stay still for long. Small movements are ok, like isometrics. Alan then drilled a hole into the cap with the tail stock. He scraped the inside and the end. He uses Scotch-bright pads as a backing pad and uses up to 1500 grit sand paper and

automotive scratch remover to sand. His finishes are glistening. Finally, he pushes the bit through the end and the globe is complete.

He then proceeded to make the icicle, which is the piece de resistance. He centered it on a handmade center finder (you can use a center jig. He made a cylinder first. He used a cutting gouge for this with a 45-degree bevel. He made a tenon in the end with a parting tool: once he made the tenon he put it in the

chuck and the piece rested on the shoulders so that he could undercut the shoulder with the skew. He took the cylinder down to a cone shape to get the cap and icicle using a spindle gouge. He then removed the spindle stock.

When turning the spindle icicle, Alan lets the motor do the work and uses just a light touch on the gouge or bevel of the tool. Denser wood works better for the icicle, SO IT HAS LESS CHANCE TO BREAK. He sanded the tip when he was about 1 1/2 inches in from the end. When he reached the top, he created the tenon and cut it off with a parting tool. Then he finished the cap and drilled a hole in the top for the screw eye. He parted the end off with a tenon.

In addition to his passion for woodcarving, he also teaches classes in Chip carving, Relief carving and Carving in the Round. His program will touch on all three of these and he will also demonstrate Chip carving. Additionally, he will have a demo area set up where those who would like to try their hand at woodcarving.
