Two Groups Will Benefit from Apes in the Arts 2012

Two great organizations to receive funds raised at this event are the following:

Lola ya Bonobo is the sanctuary of the NGO, Les Amis des Bonobos du Congo (ABC). Since 2002, the sanctuary has been located at Les Petites Chutes de la Lukaya, just outside of Kinshasa in the Democratic Republic of Congo. Lola ya Bonobo means “paradise for bonobos” in Lingala, the main language of Kinshasa.



As of 2007, Lola ya Bonobo is the home of 52 bonobos who live on 30 hectares of primary forest. At Lola ya Bonobo, they rehabilitate orphaned bonobos and care for them mentally, physically and emotionally and then introduce them into groups of adults and juveniles. Eventually, it is hoped they can be released into the wild.

Lola ya Bonobo also plays the very important role of educating the local people about conserving the forests they live in and the animals that also call the forests home.

Goualougo Triangle Ape Project focuses its efforts on an intact ecosystem with important biodiversity in the Congo Basin.

The overall goal of the Goualougo Triangle Ape Project is to promote the long-term conservation of both chimpanzees and gorillas through applied conservation research, enhanced protection of important ape populations and their habitats, and strengthening of local capacity to implement conservation programs. By combining scientific and conservation objectives, Goualougo has been able to successfully protect and study the apes and the forest where they live.

Interesting Reading:



June 17 is Father's Day. Did you know that "Silverback Fathers Can Be Motherly Too?"

A gorilla infant is heavily dependent on its mother for the first several years of life, needing nourishment, warmth and constant protection from the elements.

Less commonly showcased is the father/offspring bond that can occur when the mother prematurely

leaves the group through either a transfer or death.

In this circumstance, the bond can become unusually strong, as the silverback may step in as the infant's surrogate mother. If an infant loses its mother within the first or second year of life, the chance of survival is extremely low.

However, if the youngster has graduated from infant to juvenile (around the age of 3) by the time of separation, it has a higher chance of survival. In this situation, researchers have observed that the youngsters tend to forge a bond with a silverback rather than with other females in the group. This creates a special relationship between silverbacks and their offspring, and there have been many memorable pairs over the course of the mountain gorilla monitoring conducted by the Fossey Fund's Karisoke Research Center.
