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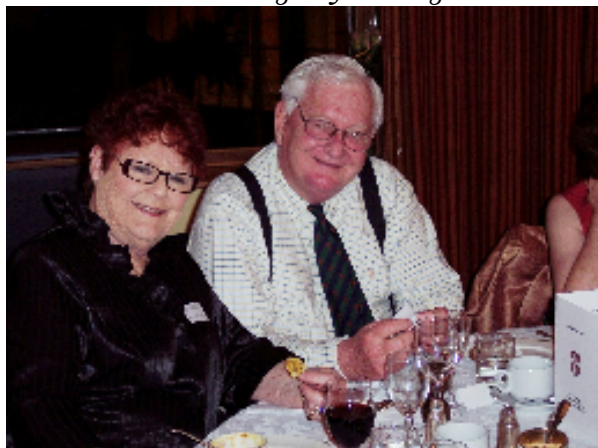
CAMSOC Winterfeast 2007

The Speaker for the Winterfeast was the Honourable Barry Cohen A.O. He was introduced by Sergio Sergi, who had been his Principal Private Secretary during the first four years of Barry's time as Minister for the Arts, Heritage and the Environment.

Barry entertained the diners with anecdotes of his long career in politics. Many of these stories were amusing, some uproariously funny, but all revealed the human side of politics; they are just like us only more so.

The most enjoyable were the tales involving Gough Whitlam, and Barry does a creditable impersonation of 'the living legend/great man'. These stories included Gough's visit to Papua New Guinea, where he was presented with a staff with a large knob on the end of it. He turned to Mick Young and enquired 'Comrade, do I lean on it or strap it on?' Mick Young's reply was not recorded.

Another great story involved having shirts bespoke made for the truly large 'great man'. Barry used his contacts in the menswear business to facilitate this task, but the shirtmakers kept on making the sleeves too short as they could not believe the length of the 'Legend's' arms.



Trade Union Officials, Labor party 'hard' men, Barry Jones and foreign dignitaries were all given the Cohen treatment. There were even some stories of John Howard, notable the audience learnt of the time that he was Parliamentary Secretary to Billy McMahon when he was P.M. Howard entered the Prime Minister's Office to prepare him for a speech, but was told to come back as McMahon had mistaken Howard for a member of a visiting Japanese Delegation that was about to call on him.

And so the evening rolled on: there was even a sartorial question from the floor about Malcolm Fraser's trousers.

Barry and his wife Rae were made most welcome by the members present at the Dinner and were also particularly pleased with the quality of the hospitality of the Union and Schools Club.

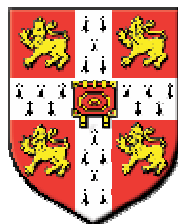
2007 AGM

2007 CRICKET MATCH

Cambridge and Oxford alumni played a good day's cricket at St Paul's College Oval, Sydney University, on Sunday October 7. The match was the first in 20 years. Organised by Cambridge's John Rothnie-Jones, who also

captained the Light Blues, it was both competitive and friendly. Each team had a smattering of ex – Blues of varying vintages, which added to the interest.



Cambridge started well, the top order of Hodge, Steele and Bilinsky contributing 103 runs in total. Each was out to a difficult catch. Our opponents seemed to have coated their hands with the syrup from Fitzbillies Chelsea buns as they plucked balls in mid flight with ease.

Then our middle order dug in to add another 62 with Lyons, Stuckey-Clarke and Katter contributing. Price, a four time Blue and expected high scorer, was very unlucky to be run out for a duck.

With the score at 6 or 7 for 170 or so and quite a few overs to go (the record is a little vague on this) the scene was set for a series of swashbuckling cameos by the tail. Alas, this was not to be as the ball dipped and swung in the air and moved violently off the pitch to have the final 3 or 4 batsmen out for next to nothing.

Delia, the skipper's wife, and Geoff Lovell, the Oxford captain, had organised a lovely lunch which was taken between innings. The sides discussed tactics over salad, rolls and cakes and then took the field again with renewed energy.

We were quickly rewarded when young Steele took an early wicket, trapping the opener, Scruby, plum in front. Unfortunately, the next 2 batsmen, Jeh and Lovell seemed intent on proving that the only way to get them out was to let them score the maximum allowed 50 runs and retire, which they did in due course, Jeh with a mighty 6 back over the bowler's head.

Ashley added a delightful 43 not out, dismissing the bowling attack as a Don would dismiss a badly behaved boy at an important tutorial. White was out to an unbelievable catch in the descending gloom by Ian Ross who was moving, panther like, at mid off, and then it was a simple task to overhaul the Cambridge total with 3 or 4 overs remaining.

Steele the Younger, Stuckey-Clarke and Bilinsky all took wickets for Cambridge while Price consistently beat the bat with flight and turn but was not rewarded with a wicket. Steele the Elder bowled with great economy.

All in all there was a lot for Cambridge to take from this match despite the loss. Had we not conceded 25 sundries, had we been more circumspect in our running, had the tail applied itself to the task more diligently and had Michael Jeh not been able to find the ground, then victory could well have been ours.

Values and objectives

The Cambridge Society of New South Wales is a social association of Cambridge University alumni in New South Wales and achieves its aims through formal and informal social functions where members and their guests can meet fellow alumni, maintain and renew old friendships and make new ones, bonded together by their heritage of the world's finest academic and intellectual institution.

The financial operating objectives of Society are simple.

- 1. Breakeven on functions.***
- 2. Obtain sufficient membership fees for the year to cover the fixed costs.***

With regard to functions total revenue for 2007 was around \$35,500 and net profit was \$111.15. This can only be regarded as a fine example of precisely meeting an objective. A corollary of this objective is that for functions are booked on a variable per head basis and to ensure the cost of the function is covered the Society must have the cash in hand prior to the start of the function. People who arrive speculatively on the night should expect to pay in cash or cheque immediately and also expect the hospitality to be pot-luck.

There has been no increase in membership fees for a number of years and as inflation has returned to Australia the AGM voted to raise membership fees by the princely sum of \$5 to \$45 for the 2009 financial year. Also members should be aware the membership of the Committee is only allowed to Society Members who are financial at the start of AGM.
