STODDARD-WAITE MONUMENT REDEDICATION CEREMONIES

Our rededication of the Stoddard-Waite monument on May 18, 2013, was a great success, with five members of the Stoddard family in attendance, and one from the Waite family (see photos below). In addition, there were several other attendees who were descendants of pioneers, and some of those pioneers participated in the original ceremony. Joe Fondy's grandmother was there in 1913, and that event was overseen by Gregg Gridley's great-grandfather, John Brown, Jr.

The "Santa Fe and Salt Lake Trail" Monument in Cajon Pass, dedicated in 1917.

After we left the 1913 rededication site, we went to this 1917 landmark, which commemorates pioneers Stoddard, Waite and others who came to Southern California by way of this route. The marker is located east, and a little bit north, of the Stoddard-Waite Monument, just a few hundred yards away. After we took a break for lunch, I gave a talk on the 1917 monument and the Brown Toll Road.


