Joel Beyer and his family come from the Kansas City area, where he sold his flight school to come teach at Trinity. He holds a BS in Aviation from Utah Valley University, and has gained a wealth of experience from training pilots over the years. Joel has stepped right into the role of Chief Flight Instructor for TAA. He's already seen some excitement here and gotten to meet our Federal Aviation Administration representatives firsthand.

Joel writes:

Since moving up here to Washington in January we have seen many examples of how God takes care of us. They say that if you are not being attacked by the enemy you must not be walking the path God has for you!



On April 23 we had an incident with our Piper Cherokee that parked it in the middle of a field 7 miles short of Eatonville. After seven years of working with more than 80 pilots without an incident, this was a first for me.

This incident involved a student pilot flying solo, which means the responsibility fell to me as the instructor, and rightfully so. I was the one responsible for making sure this student was fully prepared to fly this airplane solo on a cross country flight and I was responsible for their safety. I had made the judgment call to sign them off (and I would do it again). Because of this, I received a letter in the mail from our friendly Seattle Flight Standards District Office stating that my ability to hold a flight instructor certificate was being questioned and that I would need to do a reexamination with an FAA inspector to be able to continue to instruct. The day came for the reexamination and my nerves were all strung out. This was a test that would determine if I was still going to be able to do the very thing God had brought me and my family up to Washington to do. I knew what God had spoken, but was I in for a time in my own prison like Joseph in Genesis, not able to do the vision God had given me? I arrived at the location 20 minutes early and got everything all set up. As the examiner walked through the door he looked at all my material and smiled. The table was set like I was taking my initial Flight Instructor

test again with charts spread out and books piled up ready to go. I wanted to be well-prepared for this.

As we got started, the examiner explained what the test would entail and checked my paperwork, then asked me to explain what had happened. We talked about the student's prior flight training with other instructors and with me, the preparation for the flight, what happened during the flight, and how to keep it from happening again. I finished with a statement about how we are always learning and I have learned a lot from this incident. There was a long pause. A really long pause! Reaching into his folder he pulled out a typed letter on FAA letterhead. He placed it in front of him, signed it, and looked at me across the table before pausing again. He sighed and said, "We are done." The paper was my notice that the reexamination of my ability to teach students had met standards. "You are a good teacher, I can tell that. You have been doing this for a while and you have a great record. Keep up the good work."

After less than an hour it was all over. God took this situation meant for evil and turned it into His good. It has been so clear through this incident that God has had His hands in all of it. We have seen His hand move and make connections, show character in a short amount of time, and provide everything we have needed. He is so good and I am excited to see what else He has in store for me and for Trinity Aviation Academy. *-Joel*

We have new students that are to arrive here in the fall. Our facility construction is moving along, but our greatest need is the funding for the septic system. This will be for both the dorms and the staff housing that was moved to the property last year. The staff family that was living there have had to move 45 minutes off site, and our students are living in RVs and other spaces right now. It's not clear where we will house the students that are arriving. The slow pace of finishing our facilities has been discouraging for us all at times, but the Bible says in Galatians 6:9 *let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up.* We have no intentions of giving up! We have plans to sell the Cherokee (the plane that was damaged in the above crash) to cover the cost of the septic, but the repairs on it are not yet completed.
